Meadowlands Roars Back Into Action

When asked what sort of impression he hoped he had made on his Meadowlands patrons last night, Jeff Gural didn't hesitate to answer.

"That we are trying," he said. "That we are really trying hard."

Whether or not the Meadowlands will thrive under its new leader, Gural, remains to been seen, but it was evident last night as a new era began at the Big

M that the

management team was going to pull out all stops to make things work. The turns at the track had been reconfigured in hopes that that would lead to more competitive racing, fans did not have to pay for admission or parking and the racing department had put together a card that featured 12 races with full fields.

"I feel better about this place than I have in a long time," driver John Campbell said. "With Jeff Gural here there is so much that can be done that never could have been accomplished when the state ran the place."

The handle for the opening night card was \$2,166,584. The Meadowlands opened on a Tuesday in 2011. On the first Friday night card of 2011 the handle was \$2,266,921, but there were 13 races that night. On-track wagering was \$380,499 vs. \$245,139 the previous year, a 55 percent increase.


One of Gural's big hopes for the meet was that the style of racing would change with the banking of the turns. He believed that racing at the Meadowlands had become too speed oriented. Last night's races included a little of everything, with horses winning on the front end and coming from off the pace. **Reilly's Daughter** (Sportsmaster) won the first closing from fifth, but winners **Silent Swing** (Northern Luck) and **Western Graduate** (Western Hanover) would win in gate-to-wire fashion, proving that you didn't have to come from off the pace.


"The track is absolute great shape," driver George Brennan said.

One of the highlights of the night was the win by Silent Swing in the "We're Not So Young Anymore" Pace for 10-year-olds and upward. The overwhelming favorite at odds of 3-10, the Mark Ford trainee romped by 4 ½ lengths for his 51st career win.

Andy Miller was the driving star on the night, winning four races. He swept both halves of the early double with horses trained by his brother, Erv.

Dining with about a dozen friends and members of his family, Gural watched the action from the trackside restaurant. He had accomplished the near impossible saving the **(continued page 2)**

Banca Banned at Meadowlands, Mulls His Next Move

Trainer Richard Banca has been informed by Meadowlands racing officials that he will not be permitted to compete at the meet. It appears that nine or 10 trainers have been banned at the Meadowlands, a list that also includes 2010 and 2011 leading trainer Lou Pena.

"This is something I never expected," Banca said. "I've been racing there for years and have never had a problem. They didn't tell me why, just that it was in the best interests of the track."

Pena has filed suit against the Meadowlands seeking an injunction that will allow him to race. A hearing is scheduled for Monday on the Pena matter, and Banca said he will be watching with interest.

"I don't know what I am going to do," he said. "I'm just not sure what steps I will take. Right now, I'm pretty upset by this."

Banca had 32 winners from 117 starters in 2011 for a winning percentage of 27.3.

Sears To Stay at the Meadowlands

Driver Brian Sears, who had said he was giving serious consideration to driving full time at Yonkers, said last night that he will remain a regular at the Meadowlands.

"This place means a lot to me and there's nothing like driving here," he said. "It's also close to my home. I am totally behind what Jeff Gural is trying to accomplish here and he has my support. I know the purses are going to be better at other places, but there are other things to consider, like the fact that so many top horses come out of here, especially later in the year."

Sears was the leading driver at the Big M in 2011. He said he will continue to drive at Yonkers on nights when there are not conflicts with the Meadowlands.

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Drivers Comment on Shorter Races at Yonkers

Yonkers Raceway recently announced that it would revert from 1-1/16-mile races back to the standard mile distance. The added-distance was designed to give horses a longer distance to the first turn at the Hilltop track and thus give horses drawing outside posts a better

chance to be competitive.



George Brennan enjoyed great success in 2011 at Yonkers and other tracks and he prefers the 1-1/16-mile distance because it's done what it was supposed to do---give a fighting chance to the horses starting outside. "In a mile race, those horses in posts 5,6,7 and 8 are at a big disadvantage, " said Brennan.

"We're right into the turn after the start. And then those horses often have to race from behind."

Brennan said he's had success driving both distances, but he said that some horses, particularly trotters, are more likely to stay on gait if they have a longer distance to the first turn.

"You can just sort of slide out of there and let a horse get set before you ask him for any speed," he said. Brennan said he thinks that bettors would prefer the longer races as it would give more horses a chance in each race.

"I know that Yonkers has publicized how many winners have come from the eight hole from time to time," he said.

Driving whiz Jason Bartlett agrees with Brennan in preferring the slightly longer races.

"The 1-1/16 races gave more opportunity to the horses on the outside," said the Maine native. "In a mile race, you had to leave really hard with an outside horse to get him into the race at Yonkers."

While the inside horses have a significant advantage over their rivals in a mile race, that edge disappears in a longer race.

"The one horse doesn't really have a big advantage in a 1-1/16 mile race," Bartlett points out.

Bartlett echoed Brennan in saying that the extra distance gave him the chance to steady a horse away from the gate before he had to grab into his horse going into the turn.

"One thing that might have been confusing to bettors were the times," said Bartlett. "They would see a mile in 2:05.3 with a final quarter in 35.3 and that would confuse them. They didn't know how to compare it. Basically, you just subtract seven seconds to compare it to a mile time, but that might have presented problems for people when horses shipped in that had been racing at a mile."

Bartlett speculated that Yonkers may be going back to (**continued**)

the one mile distance as an experiment to see if it affects the pari-mutuel handle.

Jeff Gregory was currently golfing in California and was surprised to learn about the change of distance at Yonkers, but doesn't see it making a great difference.

"It's six of one, half-dozen of the other," he said. "The 1-1/16-mile distance makes a big difference to the horses with posts six, seven and eight. They can really get a jump on the field going to the first turn."

By contrast, Gregory said that the 1-1/16 mile races hurt the horses on the inside.

"You really had to leave really fast with those inside horses to try to keep someone out," he said. "The outside horses had a jump on you."

He pointed out that the wire at Yonkers is so close to the first turn that the starter has to let the horses go well before the wire even in one-mile races.

Gregory saw the races going a second or second-and-a-half slower at the mile distance because the horses left so much faster in the 1-/16-mile races.

"They were getting down to the first quarter between 26 and 27 seconds," he said.

Added-distance events were once quite commonplace at Yonkers. In fact, in the first eight years of the Yonkers Trot (first known as the Yonkers Futurity) the race was contested at 1-1/16 miles as was the Cane Pace (then Cane Futurity).

The International Pace at Yonkers, the counterpart to the International Trot at Roosevelt, began as a one mile event, then bumped up to a 1-1/2 mile test. The Good Time Pace, a longtime Yonkers feature in its early years, was primarily a 12-furlong contest.

Put On A Show Is Coming Back

Put On A Show (Rocknroll Hanover), sidelined since 2010, is back in training and is eyeing the Overbid Series at the Meadowlands, which kicks off March 2.

She was the champion 3year-old filly pacer in 2010 but was derailed when needing surgery to remove a chip in a

knee. She has not started since finishing second in the Nov. 13, 2010 American Nationals.

"We are confident that she'll be every bit as good as before," trainer Chris Ryder said. "If we didn't feel that we wouldn't be bringing her back. We don't want her to come back and do poorly. We're very happy with her at the moment. Knee surgeries are knee surgeries, but everything is good and we are optimistic."

Ryder said the Overbid was selected because it is held early enough in the year that Put On A Show could still be bred if her comeback does not go well.

"There was a small amount of consideration given to

retiring her," he said. "The owners' decision was to not retire her but to give her the time off and bring her back to race. The idea of bringing her back in the Overbid is if things go wrong there still be time to retire her and breed her. I am definitely excited. Horse like that are very hard to come by."

Put On A Show was 12 for 16 in 2010 with earnings of more than \$1.1 million.

Take your pick between WESTERN SHORE and GOLDEN RECEIVER; one way to go could be to put more emphasis on whichever one offers more value nearing actual race time. The former makes his first start since September, but has been a monster here in past winters. He comes off a strong qualifier and should be put in play at some point from the rail as Campbell's pick. The latter has had two months to freshen up, and left 2011 by beating the likes of Rockincam, Vlos and Silent Swing. That recent qualifying came with trainer Harder in the bike too; now gets Sears. ANNIESWESTERNCARD was used tremendously hard in a number of those Chester races from over the last couple months, I'm curious to see how he does now. VINTGAGE MASTER was in less than peak form when last seen and now is stuck outside; FOREIGN OFFICER and **VLOS** should be going forward early.

Race 7: N/W \$10,000 in Last 5 Starts

There are three millionaires in this field and a number of others loaded with talent in their primes, but based on form these are a lot of suspect looking horses. MICKEY HANOVER is one that offers intrigue although I'd be wary of any short price. Went wire to wire from post 10 over Rollwithitharry in his recent qualifier; Dube should be gunning from the start for the high percentage winning Allard barn. ASTREOS FLASH should have been much better in his last at Chester; now gets Bouchard and should at least offer a square price to see if he can bounce back. GET IT

NOW invades here for Burke off a lone qualifier; this one has been here before and that 1:49:4 mark was taken over this surface the year before last. **DEFIANCE N** was third last out to Gallant Yankee over at Yonkers; that one would crush these and is a longshot possibility. I think HYPNOTIST is on his way down the ladder; ditto for **BLUERIDGE WESTERN**.

Race 8: Preferred

Trainer Alagna put up Sears on **DOUBLETROUBLE**, but since he opted to the horse on his immediate inside we get Pantaleano; no problem. This one raced very well a number of times here last year, showed solid pace on both ends of that qualifying mile, and should have a say in this as a double digit chance. **GO GO SOLANO** is an obvious short priced contender with Brennan. Is the classiest on paper, and you can be sure he'll be on the engine. **SAND SUMMERFIELD** has been sharp since the Robinson claim; and **NOB HILL HIGH** has rounded into his better form for Saunders. I don't recall **ANDY ROO** having raced much on the mile sized tracks; conversely **LIVEFREEORDIEHARD** has gone a number of big miles at Woodbine and Mohawk in the past; that was a very strong looking sweep to take his last at Chester.

Race 9: Claiming Price \$30,000

ALL SHUTTLE gets the very tepid call in a field that you might as well through a blanket over. Claimed by Allard in November, this one was used hard multiple times in his most recent at Yonkers to come away with a gutsy and well earned win. Is obviously no stranger to this track and will look to be the controlling factor. WHITE MOUNTAIN TOP makes his first start for Buter. Had no shot last out in that blitz by Strange Hanover; and prior to that was chasing Delivered From Zin. COME TOGETHER almost shocked at 30/1 from post 8 at Yonkers, now draws all the way inside here. **DEAR MAC** drops to the proper level now for Surick, and it's hard not to think that Coleman won't have LETTHETROCKBEGIN ready to go. Her and Dave Miller were a good combination all last year. CESSNA FLIGHT is tough to feel good about tossing because of the barn, but is generally an underachiever.
