Corey Callahan is Hot and Hoping to Get Hotter Bv Bill Finlev

Just about everywhere you look, driver Corey Callahan is No. 1. He leads North America in wins and in earnings and he's running away with the drivers' race at Dover Downs. But the most significant number may actually be a five, which notes where he stands in the drivers' race at the Meadowlands.

For Callahan, the goal is no longer just to win a lot of races. It has become forcing his way into the elite category of drivers, which includes names like Tetrick. Gingras and the Millers. He admits that he's not there yet, but his ascension at the Meadowlands and his overall numbers for 2013 show that he's well on his way. America in wins and earnings pps Making the most of his opportunities. Callahan trails

only Tetrick, Gingras and Andy and Dave Miller in the standings.

"My thing now is to really concentrate on the Meadowlands and trying to be a top tier driver and getting better horses to drive throughout the summer on the Grand Circuit," Callahan said. "My personal goal is I want to try to have a \$10 million season. I'm more focused on money than wins."

With \$7.39 million in earnings, last year was Callahan's best vet.

Callahan, a late bloomer who didn't start driving until he was 25, has been a major force in Delaware the last several years, but didn't have much of a presence on the national scene. That started to change when he gave the Meadowlands a try last summer. By the end of the 2012 meet he had 35 winners.

"I had a good meet there last year and felt comfortable


driving there and felt I could compete there.," he said. "My To make that happen, Callahan had to overcome perceptions.

"When I made the move to the Meadowlands last year trainers and owners saw that I could compete at that level." he said. "Before it was, 'hey, that guy is a good driver, wins a lot of races at Dover, fares well at Chester, but we're not really sure he's a Meadowlands guy.' I think I proved that I was last summer and the result is that now I'm getting a lot more work."

He also picked up the assignment on Googoo Gaagaa, a horse with low-profile connections that came out of Maryland to win the Colonial and the Beal.


When the Meadowlands opened in late December, the reception for Callahan was better than ever. Yet, he still finds himself driving a lot of long shots. He won three races last Saturday, with horses that paid \$93, \$13,80 and \$37. He's been adept at winning with horses that Tetrick, Gingras and others take off of in races where they have more than one call.

That's part of the progression, making things happen with enough 30-1 shots that trainers with 3-1 shots start to take

The next step is to get 3-1 shots not just in overnight races, but in the major events on the racing calendar. Callahan knows that when it comes to that department he has a way to go.

"I am happy with the way things are going and I think I am proving to lot of people that I can be a top five driver," he said. "Am I one of the top five drivers in the country now? No. There are still other things that I have to prove. I have never won a Hambletonian or a Meadowlands Pace. I need to prove that I can win some of those bigger races. I don't see why I can't be one of those top, top guys. But today? Probably not."

Googoo Gaagaa is among the horses that could help take him to that elite level. Last year, the crossbred trotter was only staked to a handful of major races, which limited his success. Callahan said he will be eligible to most big races this year and is scheduled to make his 2013 debut in the May 4 Meadowlands Maturity Final. He also hopes to wins some big races along the way with 2012 Sweetheart winner Jerseylicious and Lauderdale, a Jonas Czernyson-trained 3-year-old trotter who he thinks can have a big year.

He doesn't plan to do anything that different in 2013. He hasn't been driving at Dover on Sundays because he says he likes to reserve that day for his family. And he's not going to trek all over the place to try to win the dash title. He expects that when Dover closes his numbers will start to slack

But when it comes to Saturday nights at the Meadowlands in the summer or any other night at any other place where there are big stakes, he hopes to be there. This is the year where he wants to do more than win. He wants to win where and when it matters.

Guida: I Have No Choice But to Stick It Out in Italy

With Italian racing in shambles, owner Lou Guida would like to find a way to get out, but he says doing so is far from easy. In fact, Guida says he has no option other than to keep his Italian stable intact.



The Italian government has not paid any purse monies or commissions since last summer and with tracks also not getting paid several have either shut down or are about to close. Horsemen have taken to the streets in recent days, waging

protests that have included blocking major roadways.

"For all intents and purposes, Italian racing is finished," Guida said.

Guida was the dominant owner in the sport in North America for much of the eighties when owning stars like Mack Lobell, Niatross, Nihilator and Forest Skipper. But he soured on U.S. racing and shifted his focus to Italy. As bad as things have become in that country he said there is not any practical way to cut his losses.

"You can't sell your horses because no one wants them," he said "What's happening is the same thing that is happening all over the world, racing's importance has slipped to the point where it's at the bottom of ladder. Only one percent of gambling in Italy is done on racing. Things could not be worse. We could go to Sweden but that's a major move. I have a lot of really good horses, have no place to race them at and have no buyers. The only thing we can do is hang in there. But I am hanging in there because I have no other options."

Guida said there's some chance the situation could improve later this year if elections bring in politicians more sympathetic to racing's plight.

One option that Guida quickly dismissed is a return to U.S. racing.

"I'm not interested in that at all," he said. "That's because racing is not what it used to be. Racing is not important any more. Jeff Gural is doing a great job but none of the other racetracks are. There's too much competition. You need slot machines to stay alive and they're starting to take that away from us. Thank goodness for Jeff Gural but he has assholes giving him a hard time when he's trying to do the right thing."

The White Colt is Growing Up

He has a name. The white colt born last year at Fair Winds Farm in Cream Ridge, New Jersey has been named White Bliss by majority owner and breeder Pete Congilose.

Congilose has also sold an interest in the horse, to Peter Venturini. Once ready to race, the now yearling colt by Art Major will be sent to trainer Mark Harder.

Congilose intends to race the horse himself, calling owning a white standardbred a "once in a lifetime opportunity." But he admits he'd be curious to see what the colt would bring at auction, wondering if his uniqueness would drive the price up well beyond what would be normal.

In the meantime, White Bliss is taking it easy at the Central New Jersey farm, hanging out with other yearlings in a paddock. Though it's far too early to tell what kind of race horse he'll be, it's a matter of so far so good.

"He is a very nice colt and very athletic," the owner said. "He's certainly growing the right way and his conformation is good. I think he has a world of potential."

White Bliss was the first white standardbred born in North America since Historically Unique in 1998.

Racing Can Learn Something From Advance Deposit Wagering

I think Nick Salvi of the Big M loves writing press releases. And lately, he has a lot to write about.

The Meadowlands handle has been fantastic this meet, and it shows few signs of slowing down. Almost each week there is a release trumpeting the handle for an evening, and rightfully so; if the Meadowlands is on its way back, for gosh sakes tell people.

A couple of weeks ago a funny thing happened, though. Sure there was the usual Salvi release talking about another \$3 million dollar night at the Big M, but out popped another press release, this time from Yonkers.

"\$1 Million Plus Handle on Tuesday" the headline screamed. It seems someone out there wants people to know that Yonkers has been doing some good things, too.

Further, on the heels of the Jeff Gural interview published at several industry websites where he mentioned he offered some incentive to large players if they take a dip into the Meadowlands pools, another Yonkers story came out. This one about giving rebates to players who play Yonkers, and a new betting deal with Ebet. The hopes, of course, are to increase handle.

This competition is good for Yonkers, and it's good for the Meadowlands. It's also good for harness racing, because one of the biggest knocks on the sport is pool size. When handle is increased, pool size goes up. This allows harness racing to benefit not only by selling themselves to thoroughbred players who need pool size to wager, but also to existing harness bettors who want to increase their volume.

This represents a new way of thinking for harness racing. For many years the benchmarks for success was not the betting handle, but was the racing product itself. If you had nice stakes races you were a good track. If you got a slots deal with the government, you were the bomb. If you got people out on a Saturday - no matter if they bet any money or not - you were doing great things.

In my time following racing I have never heard of a track owner giving an incentive to an executive or manager that's related to handle.

"If we hit \$800,000 in average handle this year Tom, your bonus will be big!"

"If you hit \$1 million this year Tom, your bonus will be bigger"



When you think about it, Lucky Chucky and the commonwealth of Pennsylvania are almost a match made in heaven considering how the 2010 trotter of the year excelled over the five eighths tracks that dominate the Keystone state.

At two, one of Chucky's better efforts came in the \$450,000 Valley Victory at what was then Harrahs Chester winning easily in his richest victory of the season.

Then at three, Lucky Chucky set a record with a totally dominant 8 length 1:53 score in the \$500,000 Colonial over the same course.

Later on, Lucky Chucky would win the \$970,000 Canadian Trotting Classic and was voted trotter of the year for 2010.

Lucky Chucky, like likely Horse of the Year for 2012 Chapter Seven is by Windsong's Legacy the first trotting triple crown winner in over 30 years.

Lucky Chucky will stand for \$5,000 at Perretti Farms of Pennsylvania.

This industry tends to complain about ADW companies "stealing our customers", but if you look at the ADW structure, and culture, incentivizing handle growth is exactly what they've been doing for years.

An ADW owner, large or small, does not make money if he or she get a slots contract, if the box is filled, or if they offer a free gym bag. They make more money if their handle goes up, because they get a percentage of each dollar wagered. If they get Bill from Brooklyn to bet \$100,000 a year, they may make \$4,000. If they get him to bet \$200,000 a year, they make \$8,000. \$8000 is greater than \$4,000, so they try their best to get Bill to change his ways as a player.

With 20% takeouts an ADW owner who pays, say, 10% for a signal, and has operating expenses of 3% of handle, can keep 7% for him or herself as profit. That's great, but 7% of a small number is not overly worthwhile. They need more volume. To get that volume they incentivize their players with lower takeout, player rewards and innovations like conditional wagering, or watching four track videos at the same time. They also try to help their clients win, by offering free handicapping tools, like Pacefigures or Thorograph.

This is why innovations have occurred in computer wagering at such a quick pace and also why rebating has emerged. These companies reinvest their profits into the player to get them to bet more.

The result has not been surprising. If you give a player 5% back at the end of the day, and help him or her win, they have extra money in their account, and they rebet it. Much more than that, however, is this 5% can turn a losing player who gets tired of reloading and thinking about poker, into a break even player. A break even player thinks he can beat the game, and he plays more, and concentrates on racing more.

What ADWs recognized early on, is that it's not only big players this works well with. It's small players too. I received an email from a smaller player who discovered a rebating ADW for the first time. He had played racing for years and stopped because he was losing too much money trying to beat the massive takeout, but he decided to give it one more shot playing from home. He wrote: I registered for the account and I must say I am impressed. I like the smaller tracks like Monticello and Northville. I even tried a place ticket on a 3-1 greyhound. The best yet, though, is that I started with \$100, betting frivolously and stupid, I blew it all, but the next day I had 23 dollars in my account. Then last night I got the \$23 all the way back up to \$100 (and then blew it all again). But anyway, I managed to bet about \$700. Now they throw \$35 back in my account! I'm

This is a customer who played racing for years and found he had no shot to beat the game. In the old days he would lose the \$100 and go home from the track. The track would make their \$18 or so on his wagering and that's that. With the ADW owner incentivizing him to play more, he bet over \$700 on his initial \$100 load and he was still in the game.

back to the slow grind.

I love what Yonkers and the Meadowlands are doing. They're following what online wagering providers have been doing for years - trying to up their handle. It's about time they did.

Race 7, A-2 Pace

WESTERN TSUNAMI continues on his form spree and that was a heartbreaker he lost last week. Used hard multiple times throughout, this one wore down the race leader in deep stretch only to get nailed by a Burke horse that shook free. Not far removed \$20K claimer has proven he can go with these. TRANSCENDING makes his second start backed and prepped nicely against Abelard Hanover; will be sure to take tote action. VOICE OF TRUTH disappointed in his last from the improved post; tough luck horse. MUSSELSFRMBRUSSELS seems to be up against it from out here; would need his very best to find a way into it, win. RESCUE PLAN might have been sharp enough to beat these types a few weeks ago, now I'm not so sure. At least has Tetrick. MALICIOUS is a class horse that's been here before; Callahan seems to get along well with I FOUGHT DALAW.

Race 8, B-1 Pace

PERRITO CALIENTE jogged two back in his debut here and then was caught last week by a decent enough Allard trainee; no problem. I still think he'll be racing at levels higher than this in the not too distant future; one more shot as an obvious short priced contender. Burke heating up. OSCAR OSCAR suffered a tough DQ a couple back and then ran into A J Corbelli last week; overdue for some type of luck. BAKIN ON THE BEACH is another that has offered excuses in way or another this winter; drops after a hard try against better but now Tetrick opts to ON THE RADAR. I'm a little surprised by that. SILVER EAGLE has been empty in his last pair but Pierce does stick tonight; comes back to life on the drop? IDEAL CHAMP has last week to acclimate back over the track; I'd expect more coming now.

Race 9, B-2 Pace

D GS WOODSTOCK was one that I liked last out when making his second start down in these parts and nearly lasted at double digit odds; only to have been bested by the tripped out pocket sitter. He was stung by a :26:2 opening panel in that race and there shouldn't be any

question about similar tactics coming tonight. Hard to believe Allard is just under 10% here on the year; will start heating back up. RECENT NEWS gave it an honest shot in his most recent against a sharp first time Burke winner who came back to almost repeat at a higher level. Speaking of first time Burke; OUTRAGEOUS ART came down from Canada last week and cruised as expected against lesser; takes the next logical step. LAWGIVER HANOVER has had his chances previously and now lands post 10; I guess FREDDY DAY HANOVER just isn't as good now as we've seen him before. SCOTTY MACH N is yet to fire off the claim but this drop could help.

Race 10, C-2 Pace

TAKESHIGEMICHI always seems to lure me in spots like this. He returned to qualify against the likes Feeling U and Shoebee's Place and wasn't terrible that morning; Simon Allard's choice as a shot from an inside starting slot. TROUBLE HANOVER won here two back and then last out left into a :26:2 opening quarter, was shuffled and still was moving forward at the end. That was a game try and now he gets a big driver change to boot; another 15/1 morning line with a shot. WHERE'S WALDO was parked a long way through quick fractions last out and if not for the additional sixteenth of a mile might have still won; going for the hot barn. COME ON RIDGE brushed to the lead past a :55:1 half in the version of this race last week; the winner of that race was well meant. EXPENSIVE TOY makes his third start back; might be an early pace factor.
