

Ron Burke: I Don't Cheat

Ron Burke knows what's written on the blogs and message boards and he knows what a lot of people are saying about him. Anyone this good has to be a cheater.



It's an accusation that has hovered over Burke's career, which has been one of the most dominant in the history of the sport. With a massive stable, he won 906 races last year, exactly twice as many as his closest competitor in the standings, Rene Allard. With \$19.69 in earnings in 2012 his total is \$10.5 million more than run-

ner-up, Jimmy Takter. He's gotten off to an equally impressive start this year, particularly at the Meadowlands, where he went into last night's card with 31 wins. To some, those numbers are just too good to be true.

"What it's come down to in this sport is that if you win races everyone says you're a cheater," Burke said. "It's gotten to the point where you have to apologize for winning races."

Burke has grown tired of staying quiet about the behind-his-back talk and took to Twitter last week to defend himself. Asked to expand on his Twitter thoughts Burke had plenty to say. He insists he runs a completely clean operation and that his detractors refuse to acknowledge that perhaps he works harder than some of his rivals and is, quite simply, a better trainer than most.

"What bothers me is that with a successful driver all you hear is what a great driver the guy is, how talented he is" Burke said. "With trainers, at best you are hard-working; at worst you are a cheater. In some people's minds, there's no way that some of us trainers are better than other ones. They think we're all equal; it's just that some of us use drugs."

Burke said that absolutely nothing illegal is happening in his barns.

"There are some people who say I know he drugs horses a little bit but he doesn't do the real bad stuff," Burke said. "That's not it. I don't drug at all. Not a little bit. No drugs, period."

Burke welcomes any opportunity to prove that he runs a clean stable and has no problem with Jeff Gural's contro-

versial efforts to conduct his own investigations. "People are saying that Jeff

Gural won't throw us out because he can't afford to fight us in court," Burke said. "Jeff Gural could buy my entire barn if he wanted to. Jeff Gural doesn't throw us out because he knows we're not the boogeyman. I'd let Jeff do anything he wants. If Jeff would want, I'll pay for his security guard to come to my barn and sit there 24 hours a day. If you don't have something to hide, what would be the problem with something like that?

"I have 16 security cameras running at all times in our barn and they can be accessed by a computer. You can sit at a computer and watch my whole barn. I'll give Jeff and

Burke's New Jersey division is based at Gaitway, which is just down the road from Showplace, the training center that is attempting to put restrictions on Gural's investigations.



Burke said that had Gaitway management done the same thing he would have had a fit.

"If Gaitway did what Showplace did I would have gone crazy," Burke said. "I thought that looked horrible. They're saying they're worried about this and that. That's a bunch of

BS. All they did was to look bad."

Burke revealed that he has been subject to out-of-competition testing and surprise barn investigations in New Jersey, ones conducted by the New Jersey State Racing Commission. He said investigators showed up at Gaitway last year and checked every horse in his stable for signs of blood doping.

"Last year, they came in and did blood tests on my horses," he said. "The state came in and tested every one of my horses and not one of them was bad. They should have released that information. If you're going to do these things, I wish they would tell people that we found that this guy was perfectly clean."

Burke believes that people who have reacted negatively to his success have overlooked some key factors. He says he wins a lot more races than anyone else because he has a lot more horses than anyone else and doesn't think his 2013 winning percentage (26.5 %) is so outrageous that it should be raising eyebrows. He also points to his association with driver Yannick Gingras, who, he says, "is driving out of his mind right now."

"This has been brought on by the blogs," Burke said. "Those people think they are helping things but they're not helping. There are things put on there all the time...'I witnessed this, I know this, I saw this with my own eyes.' I know those things never happened, so how is it possible that someone saw them with their own eyes? How did they see something that didn't happen? There's one guy telling people time into it." I have a helicopter and every night I fly in and treat the horses. That's how stupid people are. "

Burke believes the sport is not as dirty as some have made it out to be, but believes there are in fact trainers who are winning not with superior horsemanship but with illegal drugs.

"I do think there are a select few people that are pushing things," he said. "A few bad apples have ruined things for everybody. Then there are people like Mark Harder. I see what he does and I know how he wins races Julie Miller, I know how she wins races. Mark Ford. Erv Miller, Tony Alagna. They have good horses and are out there working

hard and that's why they win.

"There are a couple of others where I look at what happens and I don't understand how they do it. And do I think EPO is still a problem? Yes.

"The judges should call these people in. Ask them in after a horse has some huge race and ask them what happened? If they don't have a good answer then maybe we have to start looking at you.

"I can explain to you why a horse of mine improved, what we did to make it better. How we do this, it's not brain surgery. Horses leave us, some do better, some do worse. Why would some do worse? It's because I think we're very good at what we do. A lot of these people think that if they work from 7 to 11 every day they're killing themselves. This is not a 28-hour a week job. You have be willing to put the

Despite his claims of innocence Burke knows he probably won't change many minds. But he hopes there are some people who will listen to what he says, see that it all makes sense and change their minds.

"Twenty-five percent don't care," he said. "Twenty-five percent do believe me. Twenty-five percent, no matter what I say will never believe me. Then there is that other 25 percent. You could probably convince them if they were shown the facts and were willing to listen."



Warrawee Needy Qualifies, Aquarius is Next

Warrawee Needy, who figures to be one of the top 4-year-old male pacers this year, qualified yesterday morning at the Meadowlands, winning by 9 ¹/₄ lengths in 1:53.1. Mark Mac-Donald did the driving duties.

The son of E Dee's Cam is currently being trained by Mark Ford, but Ford ex-

plained that that is only a temporary situation.

"I'm just babysitting him on his way by for Carl Jamieson," Ford said. "He came here from Florida for the Aquarius. After that he'll go back to Carl in Canada."

Warrawee Needy had an up-and-down year in 2012, starting off fast but failing to live up to some of the hype that surrounded him early on. From what he has seen of the 4-year-old horse, Ford said a big year could be in the offing.

"This was a little bit of a last minute thing because he didn't get here until Tuesday night, so we were a little pressed for time," he said. "But he seems like a really nice horse. He's big, strong and a beautiful, beautiful horse. He was well in hand this morning and we were very happy with him. It's not an issue of him being ready, it's more that he has to get acclimated to the cold.

"It's hard finding races for 4 year olds, so they'll take it one step at a time, get through this and go from there. He was plagued by 100 little problems last year. It was never anything serious, but I am sure they were disappointed. He raced good, but just didn't make as much as they had planned. He has the makings of a serious, serious horse this year."

The Aquarius kicks off March 2 with the first of three legs. Anndrovette, unraced since her win in the 2012 Breeders Crown, was the other big name among those qualifying yesterday. She finished second, beaten three-quarters of a length by Fox Valley Hermia. The winning time was 1:57.

In what is anticipated to be the first step in an ongoing upward trend, Northfield Park has announced that purses will increase 10 percent starting Friday (March 1).

Although the Hard Rock Rocksino at Northfield Park is still in the early stages of construction, track management is



implementing an increase, which is expected to be just the first in a series of increases as the impact of gaming in Ohio, and specifically the \$265 million gaming and entertain-

ment facility being built at Northfield Park, is fully realized.

Northfield races more than 200 cards per season, with a current live schedule of Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday and Friday nights with post time at 6:30 p.m.

Remembering Workaholic and Armbro Goal By Dean A. Hoffman



I'll never forget when Workaholic won the very first Breeders Crown ever contested at The Red Mile in 1984. Berndt Lindstedt drove him to a comfortable win in 1:57.1. Breeders Crown executive director Tom Charters then yelled, "Get Jan Johnson to the winner's circle!"

Charters wanted trainer Johnson and not driver Lindstedt because the Breeders Crown was a made-for-TV event. Lindstedt's then-limited command of English

wouldn't play so well in live interviews.

Workaholic's greatest win kicked off the Breeders Crown series which is still strong after three decades.

Workaholic died at age 31on Monday at Haras du Pin, the French national stud in Normandy. The very next day, Tuesday, Armbro Goal, the 1988 Hambletonian winner, died in Denmark at age 28.

Both stallions were sons of Speedy Crown and helped cement that stallion's reputation as the dominant trotting stallion in North America. Both were also products of the powerful Continental Farm stable established by Hakan Wallner with the assistance of his fellow Swedes Jan Johnson and Berndt Lindstedt.

Workaholic, owned by a group of businessmen from Maryland's eastern shore, was voted champion freshman trotting colt of 1984,but he was no match for Prakas in the sophomore classics. He retired with 14 wins in 35 career starts and an \$870,869 bankroll.

Workaholic bred 62 mares in his first season in New Jersey, 101 in 1987, and 141 in his third season. He was sold to the French government before his first foals entered training.

From his 159 foals in North America, Workaholic's best was Anders Crown 3, 1:56.3 (\$359,719). His best two broodmares in North America were Lollipop Lies and Brittany's Dream. From just three foals, Lollipop Lies produced CR Pants On Fire 4, 1:55.1f (\$447,335) and Vrahos 3, Q1:57 (\$317,281) Brittany's Dream was a stalwart for Hanover Shoe Farms for years, yielding Brumal Hanover 3, 1:56.3f (\$253,493), Blackberry Hanover 2, 1:56.2 (\$209,314), and Barricade Hanover 7, 1:57.1f (\$156,821).

When Workaholic arrived in France, not all French breeders were convinced that American blood would be a step forward.

"When he came to France a lot of people, (including the leading French owner-breeder of that time Albert Viel, refused to use him," says to French bloodstock agent

Christian Le Barbey. "Step by step their minds changed (except Mr. Viel who never bred a mare to him) after his fantastic first crop."

Workaholic's immediate success contributed immeasurably to the acceptance of American blood among French breeders. He was in such demand that breeders seeking his services had to enter their names in a lottery in hopes of winning a booking to him.

Ultimately he gained his greatest fame as a broodmare sire.

Workaholic's influence is perhaps best illustrated by the pedigree of Avila, winner of the biggest race for 3-year-olds this past weekend. Her sire is Ready Cash, the top trotter in France in recent years. Ready Cash's second dam is by Workaholic and Avila is out of a daughter of Workaholic, giving her a double dose of Workaholic blood up close.

Armbro Goal was born with a royal pedigree as his mother Armbro Flight was one of the greatest trotting mares of her era. He lived up to that pedigree when he won the Hambletonian in convincing fashion, but his path to the Hambo wasn't all a bed of roses.

Larry Rathbone developed him as a 2-year-old and the colt's career started brilliantly with impressive baby race wins at the Big M. He went into the Peter Haughton Memorial elim as a coming star, but suffered interference from Rule The Wind and never had a chance.

That's when he was switched to Continental Farms and picked up driver Bendt Lindstedt. In the \$165,031 New York

Sires Stakes final at Roosevelt Armbro Goal was parked the mile and still drove off to win.

He roared back to the races as a sophomore and bowled over his New York-sired foes and won the Canadian Trotting Classic. But in the Yonkers Trot he jumped while leading in the stretch.

With the Hambletonian less than a month away. Armbro Goal's owners wanted John Campbell to take over the driving duties.

Campbell's test drive behind Armbro Goal came in a division of the Beacon Course (now the Stanley Dancer Memorial) and he won handily in 1:54.4, more than a second faster than the other divisions.

Campbell came off the track, handed the lines to caretaker Susan Lexung and said, "Take away earlier this week at good care of this one. We're going to have a lot of fun in two weeks."

Campbell's Hambo Day fun

was facilitated when Armbro Goal drew the rail and rival Firm Tribute drew post 13. No one needed to tell John Campbell what the winning strategy was. It was simply a matter of, "Go to the front and improve your position."

Richie Silverman and Rule The Wind were parked and pressuring Armbro Goal as they blistered down the backstretch, but Campbell looked over his shoulder and said, "I can't let you go, Richie."

The lame but game Rule The Wind was persistent, but finished three lengths behind Armbro Goal in 1:54.3 mile. Armbro Goal's second heat triumph in 1:55.1 was even easier.

Lindstedt regained the drive behind Armbro Goal's for victories in the Zweig Memorial, World Trotting Derby, and Dexter Cup. But Armbro Goal was abruptly retired to stud before the Kentucky Futurity.

In the breeding ranks, Armbro Goal got solid support and solid trotters. His best was the ultra-fast gelding Fool's Goal, a \$3 million winner with a mark of 1:51.3. Another millionaire by Armbro Goal was Legendary Lover K, a winner of more than \$1.7 million on both sides of the Atlantic.

His son Abundance won a heat of the Hambletonian as well as the Breeders Crown en route to banking \$875,022. Armbro Goal's daughters Winky's Goal and Oolong won the Hambletonian Oaks. Lawn Tennis, another daughter of Armbro Goal. produced the brilliant stakes colt and stallion Credit Winner.

Like Workaholic, Armbro Goal is highly regarded by French breeders, although he never stood in La Belle France. While in Kentucky, he sired Cezio Josselyn and Defi d'Aunou, two important stallions in modern French pedigrees.

Race 7, Fillies & Mares B-2 Pace

ONE NIGHT is one that I willfully and correctly played against at short odds in a number of her recent races, and ironically enough I think she can win tonight while coming off her most poor effort in awhile. That was a sharp winner this one was in against last out, was first over two back and has generally been involved in quicker miles than these. Shocker to start off the P4 for Robinson. CUZ SHE CAN was Tetrick's pick of many; class horse will try to beat these on memory while coming off the layoff. NUTMEG'S YANKEE was no match for the race winner last week but that was still a good try. Obvious short priced contender. HOSTESS LISA is yet to come close to that January 18 mile; could be coming late.

Race 8, A-2 Trot

MONSIGNOR FLAN closed well last out against a similar group and now moves from the outside all the way to the inside. Marcus Miller has been gaining some experience here of late; horse is a bit quirky but capable. FEEL THE PRESSURE looks to have been exposed at this level last out, but Miller does stick (somewhat surprisingly over #7). A cover trip would aid cause. IL MAGO took a good run last week and tired a bit in the shadow of the wire; 4-year-old Kadabra horse picks up dash leading driver in the country. THE CHANCELLOR gutted a win last out against lesser; will need to be even better to repeat against these. Julie Miller has been good so far this meet but not as great as the past couple years. EQUITY might land the favorite role by default; wide open affair. I did think WALDORF HALL had a chance to bounce back last week at a big price and he almost did; not sure I like him as much with the post and shorter price now.

Race 9, B-1 Pace

SWEET HEDGE was a slick looking winner last out when making her second start over the track. This group looks slightly better but no question Allard will be trying to take these all the way; looks best. RAMONA DISOMMA sported a mild rally last week; should be even closer now from the improved post to launch her patented late move. JK FINE ART makes her first start of her 4-year-old campaign tonight and is Tetrick's pick staying loyal to the barn. Might need one? UNRED HANOVER makes her second start back and


surprisingly showed speed last out; will probably be leaving again with aggressive driver. AUTUMN MAGIC always seems to be around; DON'T BLAME HER drops and Borgiorno stays with Flynn.

Tonight's group doesn't resemble the class this one faced last out; will be tough if she minds her manners. BABY BLAZE took all the support last out on the heels of his second place finish two back to Real Babe and then folded; not an easy call. FOOL'S REVENUE makes his first start in almost a year from when he was racing in the Yonkers Opens. Qualified against Quick Deal who came right out to win in a fast time. MACHO LINDY can close late for a share.
