Wynne Tries To Win Over Ontario Horsemen *By Perry Lefko*

ELORA, Ontario--The new Premier of Ontario unveiled plans on Friday to address the future of horse racing in the province, but provided few concrete answers to the many questions still swirling around racing in the province.

In fact, after hearing Kathleen Wynne offer a somewhat murky message at Grand River Raceway in front of the media, horse racing people and a member of an opposing provincial party, not everyone came away thinking it was a Wynne-win situation. If anything, Wynne only created more uncertainty by saying a lot but not revealing salient details to soothe the anxious industry.

Wynne said Western Fair, Clinton, Hanover and Grand River have reached tentative transitional funding agreements with the province that will allow those tracks to race in 2013. A similar agreement had already

been worked out with the Woodbine Entertainment Group, which operates Woodbine and Mohawk and is the biggest operator of racing in the province, but it has had to significantly slash purses and reduce its payroll as part of the uncertainty going forward concerning SARP

Whether or not Rideau Carleton, Flamboro, Kawartha, Dresden, Georgian Downs and Sudbury will race in 2013 remains an important and unanswered question.

Last year under the existing SARP which began in 1998, the 17 Ontario racetracks and horsemen collectively received \$345 million from their 20% cut, while the province took in \$1.1 billion. The program had been working favourably for the tracks and horsemen, providing jobs for the 60,000 people working directly or indirectly in the horse racing industry. The program ends March 31.

Wynne would not publicly reveal the specifics of the on-going negotiations with the tracks because she wants the talks to proceed in good faith, but is confident there will be a

positive resolution. The six racetracks represent about 80 percent of all the wagering in Ontario last year.

Wynne said 14 of the 17 racetracks that operated in Ontario last year have agreements in place to rent the existing slot machines on their premises. The racetrack in Fort Erie, which along with Woodbine are the only ones to offer thoroughbred racing, Windsor and Sarnia had their slots shut down last year by the Ontario Lottery and Gaming Corporation.


Wynne also announced that following recommendations from the Horse Racing Industry Transition Panel Report and in consultation with the Ontario Horse Racing Industry Association, there will be a plan to integrate racing with the provincial gaming strategy to ensure future revenue streams. Furthermore, there will be complete agreements with interested race tracks in the coming weeks to provide transition funding for the next three years in order to ensure the future of horse racing in Ontario.

Up to \$30 million will be available from the Horse Improvement Program in 2013. The Horse Racing Industry Transition Panel, the Ontario Racing Commission and members of the province's breeding industry are discussing how those funds will be allocated.

"The good news is we've got six agreements in place and we'll continue over the next few weeks to include other agreements," Wynne said, but repeatedly wouldn't reveal specifics of the negotiations. "The owners and the operators will have to make a decision whether they are willing to be part of the new modal, but that's

a conversation that is happening now...What we're saying is we understand there needs to be a transition period in order for the industry to adjust to a new model. I think that's the sober second thought. That's what the transition panel allowed us to do: to have an opportunity to work with the industry; to move it to a different modal and I think it will be a more sustainable modal over the long term."

Nick Eaves, President and Chief Executive Officer of WEG, said his company is "pleased" Wynne personally intervened to ensure that Ontario's horse racing industry and breeding industry will have a sustainable future.

"The new Premier clearly understands the critical importance of a vibrant horse racing and breeding industry to the province's economy," he said in a statement. "Her commitment to ensuring its sustainable future by reintegrating it with the province's gaming strategy is meaningful and a welcome policy change at WEG."

Brian Tropea, general manager for the Ontario Harness Horsemen's Association, attended the government announcement and told Harness Racing Update he received a lot of conflicting things from what he heard.

"One of the things I struggle with is the fact they're saying the industry needs alternative sources of revenues when we already have one," he said. "I don't know why it's bad public policy to have a slot program at the racetracks which generates a \$1 billion a year in profit for the government and sustains the horse racing industry but somehow it's good public policy to have some other form of gaming at the racetrack. With the agreement of the four racetracks outside of (WEG), what we have now is if nothing changes between now and April 1 you have only one B track racing in Ontario. Every horse that isn't WEG caliber will have to race at Western Fair if nothing happens between now and April 1. There's so much uncertainty right now, people are trying to determine where to go."

Taras Natyshak, the NDP Member of Provincial Parliament for Essex Country, attended the announcement and said the Liberals may be changing their tone realizing they are in trouble with rural Ontario.

"They've taken such a hard-line approach," he said. "For the last year and a half it has been the stick approach when it came to those in the horse racing industry. This morning we saw the Premier feed some carrots to the horses. Apparently they're trying the carrot approach. I don't think it's going to work in rural Ontario and I don't think it's going to work for the future of horse racing. The Slots At Racetrack Program was never a subsidy. It was a partnership that was developed to help that industry sustain itself in competition with a provincial mandate on expanding casinos."

Wynne stressed that a sustainable horse racing industry needs to be smaller.

"That's a reality that I know the industry is confronting and I know we're going to work through this," she said. "I think there was an arrangement in place, that arrangement is changing, the industry is evolving and we are going to work with them. I don't think labeling or parsing the semantics around particular words (notably subsidy) is going to be helpful at this juncture. I think what we need to do now is say what is in the best interests of the industry, how do we make sure we protect the animals, how do we make sure we protect jobs and how do we make sure we have a viable industry for the people who want to take part in that industry; who want to do enjoy it. It's about jobs. It's about tourism. It's about the vibrant industry that has been in this province evolving to a place where it can be sustainable. We know as government we've got a role to play in this."



Cal Expo Shooting for May Debut of Exchange Wagering

The debut of exchange wagering in California hit a minor snag but officials at Cal Expo remain confident the form of



wagering that is popular in England will be up and running sometime in May.

The California Horse Racing Board has already adopted rules

allowing exchange wagering, but those same rules must be reviewed by the California Office of Administrative Law before going into effect. Cal Expo management was hopeful that the OAL would adopt the rules quickly, but instead decided to make a few tweaks. The process was delayed about 40 days.

Chris Schick, the general manager of Cal Expo, said he doesn't anticipate any further problems and believes the OAL will approve the Racing Board's regulations any day now. If that happens he said exchange wagering should start in May.

"Assuming the Office of Administrative Law accepts the Racing Board rules, which is usually the case, the path will clear for the Racing Board to accept applications to conduct exchange wagering in California," Schick said.

Cal Expo has aligned itself with Betfair, which will run its betting exchange.

The Cal Expo betting exchange can only accept wagering on harness races and only California residents can take part. In addition to taking wagering on Cal Expo Schick is hopeful to add races from other North American harness tracks. He said he has yet to have any concrete talks with other tracks but said that in informal talks Meadowlands management has expressed an interest in exchange betting.

"We would be the California host for other harness tracks on the exchange," Schick explained. "For instance, we would need a three-way agreement among ourselves, Betfair and the Meadowlands in order to take Meadowlands racing. All three parties would get a cut."

Blais to Go Easy on Intimidate in 2013

Breeders Crown winner Intimidate has been nominated to only a handful of major races this year as owner-trainer Luc Blais is determined not to overtax his gelding.

Blais said his major goals for the year are the Maple Leaf Trot, the Credit Winner and the Breeders Crown. Intimidate has not been nominated to major races such as the Nat Ray, the Meadowlands Free-For-All Trotting Championship or the Allerage at the Red Mile.

"We don't want to travel left and right with him," Blais said. "Last year we had lots of time to prepare him

for the end of the year and began in cheap races and built up from there. It will be his first year against older horses and that's tough. We don't want to take too many chances with him."

Blais said Intimidate is doing well as he prepares for his 4year-old campaign.

"He looks great," he said. "We've just started training him and I got him down to 2:20 Thursday. If everything continues to go well we'll race him at the beginning of May, probably at Woodbine."

Broad Bahn Comeback a Sign of the Times

When Broad Bahn crossed the wire in front in the 2011
Hambletonian owner Leif Alber no doubt had dollar signs dancing in his head, and they were a lot bigger than the \$750,000 his horse had just earned for winning the sport's most prestigious race. Hambletonian winners become stallions and the

stallion market is supposed to be where the real money is.

After Broad Bahn finished third in the Matron at Dover in

his final career start the then 3-year-old was rushed off to stud, because that's what people do with horses who are obvious stallion candidates. Alber might have thought all he had to do was to sit back and wait for the money to roll in. If so, he couldn't have been more wrong.

In his first year at stud Broad Bahn was bred to 43 mares. His listed stud fee was \$7,500. Let's give him the benefit of the doubt and assume that no discounts were given and that all 43 mares delivered live foals. Even in that case all he would have brought in would be \$322,500.

Alber came to the obvious conclusion that he can make more money racing Broad Bahn than breeding him. He pulled his horse out of retirement and sent him back to trainer Noel Daley. The son of Broadway Hall could make his first start this year in the Cutler in May at the Meadowlands. It's hard to imagine he won't make at least \$322,500 on the racetrack.

To some, Broad Bahn's return may be a reason to cheer. The older male trotter division, which also includes 2012 Hambletonian winner Market Share, is loaded and the group figures to put on some great shows in races like the Nat Ray, the Maple Leaf Trot and the Breeders Crown. Broad Bahn can only make the group stronger and deeper. Jeff Gural, for one, is probably pleased. He has long complained about how the stars of the game depart

far too early and has instituted rules that will keep them on the track through, at least, their 4-year-old years.

Yet, there's plenty that is troubling about this development. That a Hambletonian winner struggled so much to make it as a sire and got only 43 mares in his first year at stud is another sign that the economics of the industry have made breeding a horse a sucker's game.

The commercial breeders provide the sport with something indispensable, the horses that fill up the racing cards. These are the same commercial breeders that are getting hammered at the sales, where the buyers have become so selective that only the very best bred, best looking horses attract serious money anymore. Everything else winds up on the discount rack, selling for so little that the breeder has to accept a nasty financial hit.

You can only lose money for so long. Breeders are cutting way back or getting out of the business and the result has been that the recent foal crops have dropped to alarmingly low numbers. Where are the horses going to come from to fill the races in 2016, 2017 and beyond?

This is a huge problem and it's largely being ignored. The economics of the sport have to change in order to make it more profitable to breed horses. The obvious way to do so is to stop devoting so much purse money to claimers and other mediocre horses and divert it to races for young horses, particularly stakes events. It's become impractical to pay \$50,000 for an untested yearling that may or may not make it when you can claim a proven money-maker for the same amount and expect an immediate return on your investment.

For the very, very best horses, the Somebeachsomewheres, the Muscle Hills, this isn't going to be a problem. Their offspring are in demand and their owners can make a lot of money breeding them. But Broad Bahn was not Muscle Hill. The market for the offspring of A minus and B plus stallions has all but dried up. The Broad Bahns of the world are better off racing. There are some positives in that, but a lot more negatives.

OUTRAGEOUS ART is 3 for 3 since moving to Burke and continues to shoot right up the ladder. Won in 1:51 when last seen here; second finisher from that race already came back to win. Faces tougher foes tonight but it would take guts to leave him out of any P4 ticket.

MUSSELSFRMBRUESSELS is another that hasn't raced in two weeks; obvious looking class dropper on paper. Allard was solid here last Saturday. SIR ZIGGY'S Z TAM sports two straight rallies, will be coming from off the pace again with Lachance. Offers a price. OSCAR OSCAR makes his third start for Weaver and was nailed last out when ODIN BLUE CHIP shook free late; that one debuts for new barn off the claim.

AREZZO HANOVER looked much more smooth in last Saturday's nightcap and was used hard throughout in that 1:51:2 race.
