"Wakizashi" and "Wiggle" Win Hempt Elims, Rematch Set

Currently the top two 3-year-old male pacers in the sport, Wakizashi Hanover and Wiggle It Jiggleit will have a rematch of their North America Cup battle in next Saturday's Max Hempt Memorial finals at Pocono Downs. Both won their elims last night, among the highlights on an action-packed, sloppy and interesting card at the Central Pennsylvania track.

A look at what happened last night at Pocono, race by race:

3rd Race, Beal Elimination: | race replay |

Habitat, the top 3-year-old male trotter in the Ron Burke barn, broke stride at the start at 2-5, turning this race upside down. Cruzado Dela Noche picked up the pieces for driver Dave Miller and trainer Nancy Johannson, winning at 3-1. The news wasn't nearly as good for Johansson's father, Jimmy Takter, whose Walter White also broke and finished fifth out of six. As was the case throughout the card, the track was sloppy on a miserable wet night in Wilkes-Barre.

4th Race, Lynch Elimination: | race replay |

Stacia Hanover took them down the road for trainer Steve Elliott and driver Scott Zeron, winning by 1 3/4 lengths over Bettor Be Steppin. The daughter of Western Ideal went in a lifetime best 1:51.3 in what was her first start with Lasix.

5th Race, Beal Elimination: | race replay |

Takter's surprising struggles with his arsenal of 3-year-old male trotters continued as 2014 Dan Patch Award winner Pinkman was defeated by Wicker Hanover by a half-length. It was the first defeat this year for Pinkman, who had no excuse after getting to the half on a comfortable lead in 57 after a 28.4 second quarter. The entry of Pinkman and Whom Shall I Fear went off at 1-10. Wicker Hanover, the third straight Hanover bred to win on the night, made a statement after stepping up in class off two straight Pennsylvania Sire Stakes wins.

6th Race, Hempt Elimination: | race replay |

On paper, this looked like a two-horse race between Artspeak and In The Arsenal and that turned out to be the case. Coming off two straight losses, including a fifth-place finish in the North America Cup, Artspeak rebounded to win by a head in a sparkling 1:50. Artspeak took over approaching the half and then held off In The Arsenal, who had a perfect pocket trip but just couldn't get past his rival despite finding room in the passing lane.

7th, Ben Franklin Elimination: | race replay |

Luck Be Withyou made amends after breaking stride as the 11-10 favorite in the Battle of Lake Erie. Driven by George Napolitano Jr., the son of Western Ideal scored a surprisingly easy win as he grabbed the lead right from the start out of the eight post and never looked back. He won by 1 3/4 lengths over Vegas Vacation. Everyone's favorite 11-year-old, Foiled Again, finished fifth and did not make the final.

8th, Hempt Elimination: | race replay |

While this was a far easier assignment than the one he faced in the North America Cup when second behind

9th, Ben Franklin Elimination: | race replay |

State Treasurer looked like a lost cause as the field headed into the stretch for the final time. Though in career best form, the 6-year-old was sixth and had a ton of ground to make up. But he did it, closing with a flourish for Dave Miller to win by a neck over Dynamic Youth. He did so despite drawing the eight post.

10th, Hempt Elimination: | race replay |

Wakizashi Hanover is for real...but you already knew

that. The overachiever by Dragon Again owned by a sextet of Nova Scotians, lost the lead when Lost For Words jetted by him to take the lead on the second turn. Driver Tim Tetrick refused to get into a battle and yielded. Tetrick found room along the passing lane and scooted right by for a

comfortable win, his third straight, including the North America Cup. With Wiggle It Jiggleit and Artspeak also winning Hempt elims, next Saturday's final is shaping up as a terrific race.

By the way, a wakizashi is a traditional Japanese sword worn by samurai warriors.

11th Race, Lynch Elimination: | race replay |

The Show Returns may not be the most consistent filly pacer in the game but when she's on she's on. Driven by John Campbell, she took the early lead before allowing JK She'salady to gain control. Sassa Hanover took off and got past JK She'salady. Meanwhile, Campbell made a three-wide move on the far turn and mowed down the leaders. What's wrong with JK She'salady? The 2014 Horse of the Year finished fifth, losing for the third straight time.

12th Race, Elimination: | race replay |

Jimmy Takter's top Hambletonian threat may just be Uncle Lasse. At least that's the consensus opinion after he did what several stablemates failed to do in recent races, come through. The full brother to Shake It Cerry advanced to the finals with a narrow win over Crazy Wow, who also put in a good effort. By Donato Hanover, Uncle Lasse is 4 for 4 on the year. The bettors were so convinced that this was a two-horse race that both Crazy Wow and Uncle Lasse were odds-on.

13th Race, Lynch Elimination: | race replay |

Momas Got A Gun scored an upset over Divine Caroline for trainer Virgil Morgan Jr. and driver Brett Miller. Sent off at 6-1, the Somebeachsomewhere filly just edged her rival after a long stretch drive that came down to the two fillies and no one else.

happens. A couple of days will go by and I will be fine. Then I'll have a day like (Saturday). I woke up this morning feeling great and then did a little yard work. Nothing hard. I was doing fine but an hour later my body stiffened up. It's kind of discouraging."

The surgery was to work on lingering problems that occurred over his career, and Pierce didn't think the operation would sideline him for long. He originally said he would be out about five weeks.

"It's taken two months longer than I thought," he said. "When you talk to the doctors about these injuries initially, before you have the surgery done, I think they tell you what you want to hear, kind of like a car salesman. It's definitely taking me a lot longer than I thought."

Pierce's goal is to make it back by the Hambletonian. "That would be ideal," he said.

Meadowlands Baby Race Report By Meadowlands Media Staff

EAST RUTHERFORD, NJ - Overcast skies plagued the Saturday morning June 27th edition of Breakfast With The

Babies. Temperatures hovered around 70 degrees with just a hint of a breeze as the morning faithful feasted on bagels shipped in from Manhattan courtesy of Murray Brown.

Trotting fillies led off the babies and the first winner of the day was from the (surprise) Jimmy Takter barn. The Muscle Hill homebred

rode the pocket for Jimmy through easy fractions, fanned off mile cutter Skara Brae's back then dueled that one to the wire, prevailing in 1:58.4 with a 28.4 final quarter. She's owned by the Silver Linden Farms of Indiana.

The second race demonstrated that the gloves are officially off for the babies with stakes racing on the near horizon. Caprice Hill already had a big rep off her 1:58 Gaitway win and was making her Big M debut for Yannick Gingras, Tony Alagna and owner Tom Hill.

Gingras settled Caprice Hill in the pocket behind Takter and Hollywood Hill as that one sailed through the three quarters in 1:29, tipping her out as they straightened up and going by for the 1:56.4 win. Caprice Hill is a Kadabra filly from the good race mare Bramasole who cost Mr. Hill \$55,000 at Harrisburg last fall.

Memories of the great trotting mare Peace Corps were relived as John Campbell and Tommy Haughton combined to win the third race with New Leaf. She is a Muscles Yankee homebred that Haughton is training for Joe Thomson's Winbak Farm, she held the late charging Monarchs Sequel at bay in a 1:59 / 28.2 effort.

Dave Miller drove Radiant Beam to a 2:02 win for trainer Andrew Harris and owners Arrhythmic LLC. She's a

Holiday Road that has turned out to be a \$7,000 Lexington bargain purchase.

Bar Hopping sure looked good this morning for Takter. He was making his third morning appearance this time driven by the trainer, he followed along through a 1:31.1 three quarters then zipped past the leader while tacking a 27.3 end to the 1:58.4 mile. Bar Hopping is a son of Muscle Hill that was sold to Christina Takter, Bud Hatfield Stable, Marvin Katz and Al Libfeld at last year's Harrisburg sale for \$190,000.

Takter cut the mile with his Cantab Hall colt Cantabra in the next race through a 1:31.1 three panels before Manofmanyimages tipped out and trotted by, then broke as he crossed the wire, the mile in 2:00. Manofmanyimages is from the first crop of Manofmanymissions, a \$70,000 Harrisburg buy for Richard Gutnick, TLP Stables and Joseph Lozito. He is trained by Ed Hart.

"Tyson and Zlayton...Zlayton and Tyson...Zlayton!" was track announcer Sam McKee's call in race seven as Jimmy Takter won another. This time it was with Zlayton, a \$37,000 Muscle Mass colt that he bought on behalf of his longtime patrons Mrs. Takter, Fielding, Fielding and Liverman. The mile was covered in 2:01.2 with the final quarter in 28 seconds flat.

Thatsoveryverynice was an impressive 1:54.4 winner for Tim Tetrick in the first of the pacing races. She left for the lead, settled third then moved first over from third off the final bend and went by with the last quarter on the board in 27.3. Thatsoveryverynice, from the first crop of Vintage Master, is owned and trained by Tony Alagna.

JK Fannie won in 1:56.4 with Tetrick driving much like the previous race, leaving for position then fanning wide in the stretch to get up through the 28 flat last quarter. Always Covers snaked through late with good pace for the place. The winner is a homebred Rocknroll Hanover lass from the 3 Brothers Stable. Nancy Johansson is the trainer.

Some sharp looking colts took the track for the tenth with Talk Show leading the field throughout to win in 1:55.1/26.4 well in hand to John Campbell. He's an Art Major \$40,000 Lexington yearling trained by Steve Elliott for Pegasis Investments, Team S Racing and Barbara Bongiorno. Highlandbeachycove followed the winner right through the wire with pace and the Cancelliere Brothers homebred Uncle Nicky actually gained into the fast last quarter to be third. Key race.

The fastest race of the two-year-old season thus far was the 1:53.4 mile by Tommy's Delight, a Roll With Joe first cropper driven for trainer Casie Coleman by Dave Miller. He shot from the gate and set fast fractions throughout under mild Miller urging. American Passport and Rock Power also impressed with late pace closing in near the wire.

Voracity went well this morning, winning in 1:57 from the pocket for Scott Zeron into a 27 flat final quarter tracking down a game Katies Rocker. The Sportswriter colt races from the Tony Alagna barn for his interest as Alagna Racing with partners John Fodera and Brad Grant. Voracity cost the group \$47,000 in Lexington last fall.

A few interesting qualifiers were part of the day's activity including World Champion Mission Brief returning after a short break following her NJSS final win. Yannick Gingras put her on the lead and was clearly letting the filly trot as she opened a long lead but missed a step or two heading into the stretch where she eventually rolled off on to the gallop.

JK Endofanera had a public 1:50 flat workout at day's end for Yannick as he led by many at every call versus two overmatched rivals.

Myron Bell Moving Forward With His Race Series Concept

Owner, breeder and racing advisor Myron Bell reports that he is making progress on his idea of grouping together



several major stakes races. In an effort to emulate the thoroughbred Triple Crown, Bell wants to put together a series of races that will include huge purses and will pay a hefty bonus to anyone sweeping

the series.

"The title we have come up with is the 'Grand Slam of Racing," Bell said. "We absolutely have to have something like this in our sport. We do no marketing and this could be a great marketing tool."

Bell said he has had recent talks with executives at the Woodbine Entertainment Group and received nothing but positive feedback."

Originally, Bell had wanted to limit the series largely to races on "big tracks" and said the only exception would be

the Little Brown Jug. He now said he would like to include races from Yonkers and Pocono Downs.

"To make this happen, everyone is going to have to band together and work together," he said. "This is something that could really help this industry. Everyone has to contribute and help, the breeders, the owners, the racetracks and, yes, the drivers. We all have to pool our resources."


Much of the money for the series would come from payments the breeders would have to make to make their horses eligible. Bell anticipates that could be as much as \$1,000 per horse.


"Someone like Jim Simpson at Hanover, where they have 300 or so yearlings every year, may say they can't afford that," Bell noted. "My counter-argument would be that they can't afford not to do this. Being eligible for this series will make someone's yearlings a lot more valuable and they will sell for more."

Bell also said he anticipates having a carryover component to the series, where some, if not all, of the bonus payment that would be given to someone sweeping all the races, would carry over from year to year until someone runs the table.

Different Equals Bad. But Often Enough, It Doesn't

This past weekend the U.S. Open golf tournament was

concluded at Chambers Bay, in Tacoma, Washington. The course - a new venue for any PGA Tour event - produced a magical last round where Jordan Spieth beat Dustin Johnson, but it had its more than usual detractors.

From sportswriter

John Feinstein on the Golf Channel website: "To be fair, players whine about the Open every year, it's as much a tradition as the claret jug is at the British Open. This though was different. There was clear disdain in the comments being made, not just by players, but by media members and TV analysts. People in golf simply aren't ever comfortable with DIFFERENT. They would prefer to see the game played the way Old Tom Morris played it and any deviation from what is considered the norm brings gasps and major head-shaking. Remember, it wasn't all that long ago that the thought of letting caddies wear shorts created a scene at the PGA Championship. It's been three years since Augusta National began admitting women and less than a year since the Royal and Ancient Golf Club followed suit. "

Golf, an old sport (it's been played since the 1400s), doesn't lean much to change, despite change often times being a good thing. Different, well, that's bad.

Last week the whip rules were changed in Ohio, and when we look at the changes, they are far from unreasonable. In fact, most look not only fine, but needed in today's environment.

From the release, the new rules forbid 'excessive, indiscriminate, visibly injurious or abusive use of the whip' and states, in part, that drivers must:

"Keep a line in each hand from the time the driver is behind the starting gate to the end of the race;

"Whip only with elbow or wrist action and not raise the whipping arm above the driver's shoulder height;

"Not move whipping arm in an exaggerated manner and shall ensure the line remains reasonably taut during the

race:

"Not use the handle of a whip on a horse;

"Not use the whip on a horse that is tired, not visibly responding or on a horse not in contention in a race.

That's different - not a whole lot different, since it is about the exact rule that's in place in Kentucky and Ontario - but it's different in Ohio. And it does not matter if it worked fine for a record handle in last week's North America Cup at Mohawk, it doesn't matter if 35,000 fans bet twenty million on last month's Elitlopp in Sweden (where these rules are even more stringent). It's different than we're used to in the Buckeye state, so it's bad.

Lowering takeout rates is different. It's apparently bad, too.

"We can't lower it to 10% because it's 22% everywhere and that's the price."

"Why is that the price?"

"Because, it's the price."

"Is it set by a market?"

"I don't know, but it's the price!"

In 1907 when pari-mutuel wagering was first tried in Kentucky, the takeout was 5%. In 1923 or so, some state needed a little more money, so like increasing the rates on a hydro monopoly, they asked for another 5%. Then, a few years later, the horsemen and tracks said, if they're getting 5% we need 5%. In the 1950's the takeout rates were 15%. Then it went up a few more times, for no apparent reason certainly not because the 'market' set it - and here we are, with this strange phantom number of 22% that everyone wants to protect like it's on display at the Smithsonian.

Lowering takeout is different, and although the academic and business literature says it makes sense, well, it's bad because it's different. Got it?

I read a letter to the editor last weekend in Harness Racing Update that focused on judging, in this case at the Meadows. The letter writer brought up, in detailed fashion, that leading driver Dave Palone dropped his feet and struck the horses leg "50 or more times" that he saw, documented and sent to the judges, and there wasn't a fine for even one of them. Not wanting to take his word for it, I watched some races, and sure enough, there it was.

"Kicking" is, like takeout rates, somehow a protected thing in racing, despite it being against a written rule. The agrarian nature of the sport is predicated on doing things the way they've always been done, and giving a horse a reminder - a "nudge" as even some in the media call it - is just the way it is and everyone seems to fall in line. Other judges don't call it, so why should we?

Fining and suspending a driver for not following a written rule in racing should not be considered going out on a limb.

But doing so would be different and different is bad. Assimilate. Conform. Harness racing is apparently run by Kim Jung Un.

Short fields sporting a heavy favorite (with the best post), is a staple for harness racing. If you have 12 entered on a mile track for an event - even a smaller one - that's considered too radical; it's too different. You see, harness racing throughout its history mainly raced on half-mile tracks with no trailer. Nose on the gate is the norm,

anything else is sacrilegious. So, we need two six-horse eliminations - that no one wants to bet - to whittle a field down to nine or ten, which can give the best post to the best horse the following week when the big money is on the line. Then, a lot of the time, like in the eliminations, no one wants to bet the chalk-laden final. That's worth a gold star harness racing. You are racing for a good amount of cash in an event you want to showcase, and you made people not want to give you their money.

Whip rules, takeout changes, punishing kickers, or putting on proper races to yield more revenue for the sport and its purses, is not radical. But to even find insiders that speak forcefully about changing these issues is like a blind squirrel finding a nut.

Different does not necessarily equal bad. Being a non-conformist is not a sign of weakness. In fact, as John F. Kennedy once said "Conformity is the enemy of growth." There's a road to growth for the sport of harness racing but it can never be traversed without breaking free of the shackles that seemingly have its grips tight around it. Until different is looked at as an opportunity and not as a foreign concept, the sport will likely continue to tread water.

The end result is that this claimed horse was "dancing on the walls" for the next two weeks, so where does this situation leave us, if we do not support someone, such as Mr. Gural who is honestly attempting to improve the sport?

I urge everyone to support decisions, which although not always seemingly correct for everyone- to send your good horses to honest trainers, make the owners accountable, and to help our business improve by supporting Mr. Gural and his efforts to keep harness racing alive. If you say, "No," then do you honestly believe harness racing as we know it will be alive 20 years from now? Do you want something good for your family to enjoy, or do you want to keep silent allowing the cheaters to win, until the sport dies? It is your choice, see something - say something

When we decided moving the horse was not a good option we asked for our staking money (\$4,400) back, the answer was no. Joseph M. Fusco

Better Ways to Spend That Money

In my opinion, the boosting of the PASS Finals and Consos will only "make the rich richer." While I understand it is an attempt to stimulate yearling sales, I believe this will only reward the existing wealthy investors, many of whom join together to bid on the upper echelon yearlings. It will not attract significant new money into the industry. And the same super-trainers will end up competing in the majority

Instead, invest some of this money in enhanced drug-testing, a private investigator, and perhaps, thinking outside the box, offer to fund a special prosecutor's office for several years. Only the fear of jail time can possibly deter the small percentage of trainers who flout the laws and who put their racehorses at severe risk of disability or death. Especially pertinent given that the Pennsylvania tracks seem to attract trainers who are banned in New York, New Jersey, and Canada.
