Are online horse auctions pushing in-person mixed sales toward extinction?

David Reid and Eric Cherry on the growing prevalence of online horse sales.

When it was announced this past week that the upcoming Tattersalls Winter Mixed Sale at the Meadowlands was canceled, the news was disappointing, though not entirely surprising.

In many ways, the Tattersalls Winter Mixed sale is representative of other live mixed sales, and the decline in entries in recent

years has been a consistent trend across the industry. Using the Winter Mixed sale as an example, the high number of entries between horses and stallion shares over the past 10 years came in 2015, with 269 entries. Since then, entries each subsequent year were 258, 233, 221, 150, 128 and 90.

Though somewhat deviating in opinion as to the extent of how online auctions have impact live mixed sales, industry sales giants David Reid of Preferred Equine Marketing and Eric Cherry of **onGait.com** both acknowledge online sales have had an impact on live auctions.

"Obviously there's been online sales for a number of years and COVID came and it accelerated it, and after the 2022 January sale last February, Preferred Equine launched their online site (**Preferredequineonline.com**)," said Reid, who is also the sale manager of the Winter Mixed Sale. "That's important to note because I've long publicly stressed that the live sale format is important to the industry, and the public spoke louder than I did because of the number of sales being transacted online

now. I'm disappointed that we had to cancel the 2023 Winter Mixed Sale and at the same time, I am a supporter of both types of marketplaces.

"There's consistent trends we're seeing in the mixed sales entries and results. Just in the mixed sale portions, entries were down at Harrisburg, our Tattersalls entries are down, and same with the Blooded Horse Sales company. This has been a trend for at least 2-3 years. But what you also see is that the sale average prices at Tattersalls last year at the Meadowlands and this past year at Harrisburg were very strong. There's fewer horses being sold, but the quality horses are still being offered and the prices have been holding up very well. I strongly feel that the yearling marketplace will remain intact just because of the physical inspection of horses carrying a greater importance, but you can't refute that there's been a change in the traditional brick and mortar sales; it's just that we're going to have to go back to the drawing board at Tattersalls and how we can revive a live mixed sale and have future ones at the Meadowlands, because of the importance for it to the overall industry."

In addition to online commerce, which Reid concedes has certainly made an impact, he notes other factors too as the racing game continues to change. Specific to Tattersalls at the Meadowlands, Reid notes an influence on the marketplace is the racing calendar.

Eric Cherry says online auctions make the most sense.

"For the Meadowlands sale, the Meadowlands used to be the winter capital of racing for years and years, with the top conditioned horses, free-for-all series, the Presidential, Exit 16W, Clyde Hirt, all these series for younger horses and you had racing opportunities at all levels for all age groups and both gaits. And unfortunately, that's changed," he said. "The Meadowlands only races two days a week and they don't offer the series anymore. Operations that used to gear towards winter racing for those series don't have those opportunities anymore and so our sale has changed as the Meadowlands has changed."

Whereas Reid sees a continued need and a place for live sales in the industry, Cherry, the co-founder of leading online seller onGait.com is far from sold on that notion. He equates live sales going the way of the landline telephone and suggests that the major yearling sales will continue to remain in place if only for the fun and social component of the Lexington sale and because of Hanover's physical proximity to the Harrisburg sale.

"At the end of the day, what are you really having a live sale for?" asks Cherry, rhetorically. "It's more expensive and you don't get paid [for one month]. You have to ship your horse and risk getting your horse sick since they're all now in the same place. And for that 'privilege' you pay three times the money. Certain things in this industry are needed, but why is a live sale needed.

"It hit me a few weeks ago that we always talk about the convenience of being able to sell a horse quickly, but it's much more than that. on Gait has changed horses to a different asset class altogether. If you think about it, we've actually made a horse a commodity as opposed to an illiquid asset. In the past, your only options were to go to three or four times a year,

you could have your horse claimed, you could use an agent who sometimes could get your horse sold, or you could sell to someone you know. But you could never count on selling 10 to 15 horses next week if you really wanted to. Now today, you could sell your horse and have your money in days. And you'll get a fair market price because of the high volume of registered bidders.

"And what this does is that it puts the money back into circulation quicker, so people could use it to immediately buy another horse. If you go to a sale and sell your horse for \$100,000 – and forget for a minute about the \$12 or \$14,000 that comes out of that until you get done with everything – you may have to wait 60 days to see your money. Well, not everyone is in the position to buy a horse without needing that money first. And so, because the turnaround times are so quick, these horses are truly now in a different asset class than they had been."

The extent that live sales continue to be adversely affected by the increase in the ever-expanding online sales medium remains to be seen, but based on recent trends, as well as buyers and sellers becoming more comfortable in the newer setting, it would seem much of the momentum is on the side of the virtual marketplace.



Tim Tetrick on his journey from Illinois to the Hall of Fame

For as long as he can remember, Tim Tetrick wanted to spend his life driving harness horses, specifically being a catch driver. His dad Tom, an old school horseman from the days when trainers drove their own horses, was opposed to his son's desire. He felt that to some degree catch drivers were nothing more than hired guns who were sometimes lacking in loyalty and integrity. Little did he know that he was to beget two excellent representatives of the profession: Tim, who many consider to be the very best



of North American reinsmen, and Tim's younger sibling Trace, who has become the perennial leading driver in Indiana and one of the leaders in the Midwest.

For Tim it is now 13,172 wins and earnings of \$255,270,418 since he first competitively sat behind a horse.

Though you are only 40, it seems as if you have been around the industry forever. Please take us briefly through your career in harness racing.

"Harness racing has been all that I've ever known or done. I was raised on a farm in rural Illinois. I started sitting behind horses before I was even a teenager. I began driving at the Illinois fair tracks as soon as I was old enough to be allowed to compete there. From the fairs I went to the Chicago tracks where I was one of the youngest drivers racing. I did pretty well. Eventually I began to get some stakes and fast class drives. As the number of winners grew, I thought it might be time to head east where I might get to drive some Grand Circuit stock and be able to compete at The Meadowlands against those that I thought were the best in my chosen profession. I got lucky and did fairly well. Here I am."

In your evolution were there any drivers that you patterned yourself after?

"I wouldn't necessarily say patterned after, but I would say that the two drivers I initially learned the most from were Tony Morgan and Dave Magee. Both those guys were not only exceptional drivers, but they are also great horsemen.

"If I were to compartmentalize what I learned from them I would say that Tony helped me in actually becoming a catch driver. He taught me how to conduct myself with trainers and owners. The number one lesson I think I learned from him is when I'm put down to drive more than one horse in a race to go with the one I think is the best. I've tried to do that, but my choices have not always been on the money. I once booked off of Royalty For Life and he went on to win the Hambletonian for Brian Sears and his trainer George Ducharme.

"Dave, more than anyone else taught me how to drive and teach the young horse. I've never been much of a whip guy and neither was Dave. With a small number of exceptions, horses will respond more from repetition and kindness than they will from being pummelled."

Who are the best horses you've ever seen or raced?

"With pacers I'd have to go with Bulldog Hanover. The races he hung up this past year were incredible. To stay as good as he was through five races over a month was without equal in our sport's history. For 3-year-olds I'd have to go with Somebeachsomewhere. For 2-year-olds Captaintreacherous was an exceptional colt. Another one that I think I need to mention was Southwind Tempo. I'd be remiss if I didn't also mention Shartin and Lyons Sentinel who are two of the best pacing mares ever. I'm sure there are others that I've left off. To their connections, I apologize for the oversight.

"With trotters, the greatest trotter both at 2 and 3 was Walner. I suppose that most people might say Muscle Hill because he raced more and won the Hambletonian. I would disagree. We never saw how good Walner really was. I believe if he had stayed sound, he would have broken every trotting record there ever was. The best older trotter that I had anything to do with was Buck I St Pat. She was a truly marvelous mare who came to do battle every time she raced. There have been others of course. Two that come to mind are Market Share with who I was fortunate enough to win the Hambletonian and Chapter Seven who I believe was the best trotting colt that year, but, unfortunately, he was not on Hambletonian day. Another great trotter that I was privileged to drive at both 2 and 3 was Check Me Out."

Speaking of Chapter Seven, have you been at all surprised by his fantastic success in the stud?

"Not really. He was a really great horse who was the best of his age group. I think two things might have hurt his perception. The first was that he wore hobbles. I'm guessing that might have offended some purists. I don't believe he really needed them-especially not at 3 and 4. He would have been every bit as great without them. The second was that he stood in New York. Whether justified or not, there are a lot of breeders, especially those that breed for the market who just aren't going to send a valuable mare with a young foal at foot to New York and back in a truck. His success has been so great that I believe those same breeders might be now willing to take that chance. The quality of his mares has risen. I believe so will his success rate as a sire as he continues to get the best of the breed to his harem."

What has been your greatest thrill in racing?

"That would have to be winning the Hambletonian with Market Share. What a great and honest trotter he was. What was a great day, nearly turned out to be a super great one. Check Me out was going to win the Oaks as well, but she out trotted herself and made a break on the last turn."

Tell us about your Hall of Fame induction?

"I was simply overcome with emotion. In my greatest dreams I never would have allowed myself to think that one day I might make it to Goshen. There was a time that I would have thought it unlikely that I'd ever win even a thousand races. Now I've won over 13,000 of them. That was the greatest of all days. Here I was surrounded by friends, family and my peers on the racetrack. It was too much to comprehend. I just about broke down. It was a perfect storm matching happiness and the incredulity of my being there."

Tim, based upon your present numbers, it isn't farfetched to think that sometime in the next decade or so you will surpass John Campbell as the all-time leading money winning driver ever.

"Surpassing John Campbell in just about anything would be an incredible feat. In simple terms, he is the greatest all time driver the sport has ever known - our GOAT. It isn't something I have as a specific goal. If and when it comes, I will be most grateful for the opportunities given to me on the road to getting there. There isn't a day that goes by when I am not appreciative of the many people, who have been instrumental in helping me get where I am today. Without the many trainers and owners who have placed their confidence in me, there would be no way I would have reached the status that I now enjoy."



A boundary-breaking 25th year for Horseplayer Interactive

Part 2 of our conversation with Woodbine's Chris Lush.

Woodbine Mohawk Park conducted its first live races of 2023 on Monday evening (Jan. 2), beginning the new year on a positive note: Last month, the Campbellville, ON track announced that its annual all-sources wagering for 2022 had gone over the \$400 million (Cdn) mark for the first time, exceeding its previous record of \$364 million, set in 2019.

In **last week's column**, Woodbine Entertainment's chief technology, innovation and wagering officer Chris Lush shared some developments from Horseplayer Interactive's 25th anniversary.

HPIbet.com and the newer, AI-focused **darkhorsebets.com** remain Canada's only legal ADW sites for horse racing; both are intellectual property/brands of Woodbine Entertainment.

"We built [HPIbet] in such a way that it's extensible," Lush told HRU. "When we initially built it, it launched in Ontario, with Woodbine being in the Ontario market. But then there was value for us to be able to offer it to any of the partners for us in the Canadian jurisdiction. So it kind of went out on its own and became a brand across Canada."

HPI.bet offers signals from horse racing worldwide, with regional availability of specific tracks decided by the home market area (HMA) of each HPI customer. "We just work with the HMA, or whoever runs the HMA in each jurisdiction, to ensure that whatever they are allowing into their home market, we offer that same product mix through HPIbet," he said.

"If a customer is betting into a pool for Ontario racing, any one of the tracks in Ontario, you're betting into a Woodbine pool. We host those pools. If you're betting a race in BC, we actually host those pools as well, because it falls under our hosting agreement."

Lush said that HPI customers across Canada ("probably 76 or 78 per cent of all of the wagering") favor big American tracks: "They're playing Gulfstream; they're playing Belmont; they're playing Santa Anita... and of course Meadowlands standardbred. They enjoy playing into those big pools."

Canadian dollars wagered online are commingled with the U.S. pools.

"Somebody else is hosting those pools," said Lush. "If it's actually one of the existing tracks with Monarch Racing [e.g. Santa Anita, Gulfstream], they use the same tote as us [i.e. AmTote International, the Stronach Group-owned tote company], so technically it's kind of a shared pool."

He added that HPI offers certain international tracks that do not themselves allow commingled pools.

"We host separate pools for the Japanese Racing Association [JRA]; they don't let international parties bet into their pools directly, but they export their signal and let other countries host a pool. So, in North America, Woodbine actually hosts the JRA pool – 80 per cent of the wagering is actually American, in that pool, but a lot of Canadians also enjoy betting on the Japanese racing. We host the pool that's only for North American customers, all commingling into a pool that doesn't include the Japanese.

Harness Racing Update

"The flipside of that is Hong Kong, which has the largest pools in the world, and they also allow a large contingent of international partners to commingle into their pools, so as an HPI customer, if you're betting on Hong Kong, we're placing your dollars into that Hong Kong pool. It's a massive pool."

Canadian tracks offered via HPI always have commingled pools, said Lush: "It's never just Canadians. It's always a big mix with the United States customers [and] HPI customers across Canada."

Lush told HRU that Horseplayer Interactive is not yet a partner with PMU (Pari Mutuel Urbain), which controls France's betting market, but discussions were ongoing. PMU is number one in Europe and third in the world by total wagering on horse racing, bringing in €6.0 billion in 2021, a year-over-year increase of 13.2 per cent.

"There's a lot of complexities with how we're allowed to wager and how we're allowed to import signals. We have what are called 'joint venture agreements' with international racing parties. Through that joint venture, we're both jointly going into a pool and then we're each retaining a portion of the pool for our takeout or our fee. The complexity with us right now is, we have to do it that way; it's the only way that we're allowed to offer those signals. We haven't got to a point with PMU, who run the French racing, on the import of those signals. We've had some great conversations lately, and we're hoping to be able to offer their product; even better, we're actually hoping to offer


our [Woodbine/Mohawk Park] product to PMU customers. If we had France wagering into our live pools, the liquidity of the pools would just increase astronomically."

(In this context, "liquidity" means a consistently-high volume of wagering activity.)

In the domestic market, Canadian horseplayers have strong preference for certain tracks.

"I can tell you the most popular track, bar none, is Woodbine Mohawk Park," said Lush. "That's a very easy one to answer for you. Our HPI customers enjoy a lot of other Canadian racing... Between Flamboro Downs and Western Fair, those would be the [next most popular] by wagering. Meadowlands still attracts a fair amount of our customers; we always think of them as sort of the 'other' big track in North America. But when you look at the gross wagering on Woodbine Mohawk Park versus Meadowlands, actually more money is bet at Woodbine Mohawk Park into the pools, so from that perspective, we always like to think it's the biggest [harness] track."

In 2022, single-game sports betting was legalized in Canada. Woodbine Entertainment, Ontario's only company with a parimutuel license, did not receive a license to offer online sports wagering. Since then, Lush and his team of "well over a hundred people" handling technology across the Woodbine organization have worked to adapt to the new gaming landscape.

"With fixed odds coming into the market, especially with sports betting being legalized, we in the horse racing industry had to look at that and say, 'Okay, what is the risk and what is the opportunity?" he said. "How do we actually get our product in front of all of these customers?

"We're actually working with the CPMA [Canadian Pari-Mutuel Agency] and in Ontario, with the AGCO [Alcohol and Gaming Commission of Ontario], to look at approving the ability to integrate our product through HPIbet... into these [sports betting] operators. So if you happen to be a customer of FanDuel or bet365 or BetMGM – one of the big players – we want to give you the ability to place a wager on a horse race."

"What we're actually going to be doing is integrating the back end of HPI to their front end [i.e. the sports betting site], so that when [customers] place a wager, it actually comes through our [HPI] systems, into our pools, through our tote system, and that way, the industry is still operating the horse racing but we're also attracting a whole new customer base and it's generally a younger demographic. So this is our way of opening up the [horse racing] market and allowing other partners to offer product, but at the same time, ensuring that we have control over how that's offered and that there's money going back to the horse industry."

Innovation helped boost Woodbine Racetrack and Woodbine Mohawk Park's handle, even with new rivals for the Canadian betting dollar, during the COVID-19 pandemic.

"We finally breached that \$1 billion mark [in 2022], which is incredible," said Lush of the combined handle of Woodbine's harness and thoroughbred products. "You know, a lot of that

stems from the digitization of wagering: Believe it or not, when COVID first hit, and we were able to get racing started back up again, upwards of 80 per cent of the North American market was all on digital platforms. And when you're on digital platforms, as opposed to OTBs or tracks, the exposure to your product is almost the same as anyone else's. For the first time, people saw the product that we had, the Woodbine thoroughbred and Mohawk standardbred, and said, 'Wow!'"

Numbers backed up the enthusiasm: 38,000 HPI/Dark Horse customers placed wagers in 2022; 6,800 new customers signed up.

"The quality; the pool liquidity; a lot of things just attracted those customers, and it stuck. We've seen growth for the last three years now. We're really happy with those results, and I guess they set a high water mark I need to beat next year," he said.

Woodbine's "digital assets" were a major part of the winning equation that brought \$592 million in wagering (\$447 million originating from Ontario) to HPIbet in 2022, as of Dec. 29. "Innovation, in my mind, has mostly been focused on wagering," said Lush. "Different technology; different ways that you can do different things; and of course providing value to our customers. At the end of the day, one of our biggest goals is finding a way for our customers to win, which is very different from most gaming partners."





Hemingway and handicapping: For whom the challenge tolls

(Editor's note: Long-time horse racing handicapper and columnist Frank Cotolo has opted to start a new iteration of his previous HRU column Alternative Actions for 2023. He's now calling his column Among Ourselves, one of many translations of the French term 'Pari-Mutuel.' Cotolo promises to incorporate harness (and t-bred) thoughts and memoirs on betting and journalism, personalities, friends, bettors (big and small) and so much more.)

Ask any horseracing handicapper, professional or amateur, whether Ernest Hemingway had anything to do with betting on the races and odds are long the person answers correctly.

The revered author was a student horse race handicapper during his early years living in France. He wrote about it years later. Not much about it, but just enough to get my attention.

In his memoir, A Moveable Feast, Hemingway wrote he found horse racing "beautiful." But, "It was not really racing either. It was gambling on horses," and, "To make it profitable was more than a full-time job and I had no time for that... It is complex and difficult to keep track of it all."

He called attention to "the racing paper," which presented facts and figures for handicappers. He called it "the best fiction ever written."

How much information Hemingway thought was enough to make betting the ponies worthy of his time is disputable. But his comment affected me greatly in the early 1980's as I applied it to my own handicapping methods. What became evident to me was not the importance of accuracy in the information available; it was how accurately could I measure each element's importance per race. That was and is where the fiction is created and passed on from each lost generation to the next lost generations, per se.

I reached out to fellow handicappers. I asked each one how they calculated basic handicapping elements like speed, class rises and drops, surfaces, post positions, etcetera.

At dinner one night, interviewing Andy Beyer in Los Angeles for *Gambling Times* magazine, he swore his speed figures weighed the heaviest of all other elements when he made his wagering decisions. Though, he also said the figures were miserable guides during his West Coast betting campaign as opposed to their success at eastern tracks.

So much for that.

Professor Alexander [Delaney] of UCLA told me making such calculations as Beyer was doing could not possibly be accurate due to a fundamental mathematical relationship called "the uncertainty principle." Delaney said it had to do with the quantum world of particles, a phrase never appearing in a Dick Francis novel.

So much for that.

Most of the nighttime punters I asked while strolling the apron at Hollywood Park Western Harness Racing were certain about how they measured handicapping elements.

"It's the driver, always, that wins a race" said one.



"Finishing times," said another.

"The quarter times," said another, "because in harness racing it's not like the runners. They go as fast as they can always. Harness horses are rated in each quarter."

"Post positions," said another. "A horse travels more ground the farther out he starts."

And then there was Al Lewis, the actor known for his roles in the TV sitcoms The Munsters and Car 54, Where Are You? He looked at me and said, "I don't measure nothing."

So much for that.

I have my own theory about Hemingway's retreat from horse racing, one that fits the lifestyle he chose and everything we know that is true about him.

He admitted to having an uneasy relationship with horse racing as a handicapper and bettor. Unlike his calling to write, he could not exercise control as a handicapper. This made him feel weak; and that was not a comfortable pose for him. Horse racing of any kind was too mild and meek a sport for Hemingway. He was a man placing great importance upon brawn over brain.

Over the years, which included being a hospital driver on battlefields of World War I, he developed an old-fashioned machismo. Male superiority. A state of mind thriving on sports displaying sexual prowess, definitive results for the high and mighty, so to speak, those fueled by negative cognitions and emotions.

He was drawn to sports that physically demand male strength and often include violence. He wrote about boxing, bull fighting, deep-sea fishing and hunting wild animals. He participated in a few of those sports, though to what degree we may never be able to prove. Perhaps he did so mildly, almost passively, merely to collect subject matter for the profession he was sure he commanded, writing. And then, writing more fiction than non-fiction, that is, thriving in more passive than active endeavors.

The specific lessons I learned from the Hemingway example allow me a strong tolerance for the lack of particular knowledge others feel I need to trust making comfortable wagers on horse races. I avoid strict handicappers praising their skills when correct and creating fictional excuses for failure. Handicapping is about making decisions using unreliable sources.

As successful gambler Barry Meadow wrote, "We're all guessing."

Stages of glory - A watery grave, Part 1

On May 7, 1915, 11 miles off the southern coast of Ireland, the *RMS Lusitania* sliced through a choppy sea. Indoors, first-class passengers finished their lunches, perhaps a meal of stuffed ducklings with fine French wine. Outdoors, passengers strolled the varnished decks beneath a pleasing afternoon sun.

Suddenly, an alarming thump rocked the vessel. A few seconds later, an explosion scattered passengers and debris. Eighteen minutes after the thump, the *RMS Lusitania* sank to a watery grave, where 1,198 passengers and crew perished.

Among the victims of the German torpedo was the wealthiest man in the world, Alfred Gwynne Vanderbilt, a dashing, 37-year-old playboy. Eyes were always on Alfred. Photographs and reports on his activities were often splashed across newspapers and magazines, making him one of the most recognizable people in the world. Therefore, several eyewitnesses from survivors of the attack recalled Alfred's actions during his final eighteen minutes:

"He appeared as if he was at the races at Ascot."

"I saw him standing at the port entrance to the grand saloon. He stood there, absolutely unperturbed, the personification of sportsmanlike coolness. In my eyes, he was the figure of a gentleman waiting unconcerned for a train."

"He was standing with a lifebelt in his hand. A woman approached him, and I saw him place the belt around the woman. He had none for himself, and I know he could not swim."

Ironically, this was not the first newspaper report of Alfred Vanderbilt's demise in a maritime disaster. The famous American booked passage on the RMS Titanic for a return trip to New York three years earlier. However, for some reason, he canceled late, his name was on the official manifest of *HMS Titanic* passengers, and the press assumed he was a casualty.

The Vanderbilt family fortune began with Alfred's grandfather, Cornelius Vanderbilt. Born in modest circumstances on Staten Island, NY in 1794, Cornelius was an intense and ruthless young soul. During his early years, he acquired the nickname Commodore because his business ferried small boats around the New York Harbor. Moving goods by water led to moving goods via railroads, and railroads were the key to amassing his great fortune.



richest man when he died during the sinking of the RMS Lusitania in 1915.



As the Commodore's fortune grew, the lives of the Vanderbilts became fodder for the ever-hungry press. With scandals, feuds, opulence on an astonishing scale, and breaking into and falling out of high society, the Vanderbilt family did not disappoint. The readers of newspapers and magazines found the family a saga that fascinated citizens of all stations.

Deeply woven into the fabric of the Vanderbilt family was a passion for horses. The Commodore drove his harness horses with the same fury he drove his businesses. Sons, grandsons, and great-grandsons followed in his equine footsteps. They were involved with harness horses, thoroughbred horses, show horses, breeding horses, and all manner of horses. Rare was a Vanderbilt mansion without magnificent stables of fine horses. High society circles went hand in hand with horses. These beautiful animals were, in some ways, another currency for the wealthy of the wealthy.

Cornelius Vanderbilt's eldest son, William H. Vanderbilt (1843-1899), known to many as Billy, had three sons. The most senior, William Junior, died in college. His second son, Cornelius "Neily", incurred his father's wrath with an unsuitable marriage. The rift was so deep that Billy took the drastic step of disinheriting his second son. After the dominoes fell, Alfred, the third son, surprisingly became the chief beneficiary of the fortune.

Like many Vanderbilt heirs, Alfred's love of horses was a focal point of his life, but young Alfred showed streaks of rebellion in his horse universe. His father advised him never to buy greys because they're delicate and won't stay. Like many youths, his father's advice was like a red flag to a bull. Alfred's first purchase was a grey, and grey trotting horses became his calling card in the horse world. While his father and grandfather favored trotting racehorses, Alfred found a slightly different variation.

Alfred found his equine passion in Coaching, sometimes referred to as Four in Hand, a "cousin" of our sport. Quite popular for several decades, Coaching possessed many of the same qualities of harness horse racing — breeding and training trotting horses, harnessing the finest horses to specific vehicles with passengers, and then competing in various events.

Christoforou's rollercoaster ride to the O'Brien's

Just like her star standardbred, Camilla Christoforou is taking everything, including the O'Brien Awards, in stride.

It's a moment she will likely never forget, the one when she found out Safe Conduct was named as one of the two finalists for top 3-year-old trotting colt honours in Canada.

"It's amazing," said Christoforou, now in her second year of training. "We have been so busy, and I didn't even think about it, and then we saw it posted. Just to be nominated is big. I am so happy that he is a finalist. He truly deserves it."

The path to O'Brien recognition was certainly not a smooth one for Safe Conduct, who is co-owned and co-bred by her father-in-law Charalambos Christoforou and driven by her husband Chris Christoforou.

In fact, his stat lines for 2021 wouldn't have suggested better times, literally and figuratively, were in the cards for the son of Archangel, who posted one win in six starts.

But the person holding the training reins had faith in her young, albeit at times, unfocused charge.

"He has lots of personality. I've had him since he was a baby. He's a homebred, which makes it even more special. He's such a wonderful horse. When he went out and won his second start as a 2-year-old, the OSS Gold (a gutsy neck nod over his fellow 2022 O'Brien finalist Twin B Archie in the Ontario Sires Stakes Gold final), he showed what he was capable of. But it's been a rollercoaster, especially when he was two and still a stud. He just wasn't mature enough and he was making breaks. But we all knew he was a nice horse and had lots of speed. It was just a question of time, him being able to put it all together."

A decision after his final race as a 2-year-old would turn out to be a game changer for the horse and his connections.

"When we stopped him at 2, we did geld him. We saw that he wasn't concentrating and that we needed to have him gelded. So, we did that, and coming back, he was a different horse. All of the sudden, he grew up over the months he had off. He was more relaxed. Even training down, he was really good. He came out and won his first start. I was just hoping he would stay flat and concentrate. And that's just what he did."



Safe Conduct continued to roll on from that one-length triumph at Mohawk on May 23.

After stringing together 12 solid starts in a row, he saved his best for last when he lined up behind the gate for the \$225,000 Ontario Sire Stakes Super Final for 3-year-old trotting males group at Mohawk on Oct. 15.

Saddled with post eight in the field of 10 and sent on his way at 10-1, Safe Conduct was settled into sixth early through an opening panel reached in :26.3.A first-over Tymal Tiggs followed by Twin B Archie enabled Safe Conduct to follow cover third over.

Sent four wide, Safe Conduct stormed home fastest of all to win by just over a length in 1:53.3, missing his own lifetime mark by a fifth of a second.

"Especially the last few moments before the wire, when I realized that he was going to win, I was screaming. I was thinking that I was so glad there weren't any cameras on me in that moment because that would be embarrassing. I don't even remember much of the winner's circle. I was just overwhelmed. If there was one race I wanted to win, that was the one."

A storybook ending to a tale with a nearly equal balance of highs and lows.

Even through the rough patches, Christoforou's faith in the trotter was unwavering.

"There were times when luck wasn't on his side, where the races didn't turn out the way we had hoped or he had a tough post position, but overall, I was never disappointed in him. Patient, that's what we have been. We never pushed him. If we felt he wasn't right, we didn't race him. We didn't train him hard. At the end of the season in the Super Final, it was the race where he was at the top of his game. He was not tired, and he raced his best race. I stopped with him when he was on top, and he was the best. Now, he's had three months off to relax in the paddock and recover. We're ready to bring him back in January." It wasn't only a banner year for Safe Conduct.

Christoforou, who won 12 races, along with 19 top-three finishes in her first year as a trainer, followed it up with a strong sophomore campaign, highlighted by 16 wins and just shy of \$590,000 in earnings.

A pair of 2-year-old fillies, namely, Pretty Special and Northern Charlotte, produced solid results on the racetrack.

"Overall, it's been a pretty good year. I don't have too many horses racing. I have some older ones racing and they did okay. I had two really nice 2-year-old fillies, Pretty Special and Northern Charlotte. One made the Super Final and both horses raced in the Gold. Pretty Special was really good that day in the Super Final, but we were disappointed at the result. A horse on the inside of her, they bumped together, and they hit wheels. It was too loud for her, and she got scared, jumped up and broke stride. It's too bad because I think she would have done well.

"Spartan General, he's a really nice horse too. He was racing in the free-for-all ranks, but he had a lot of problems, some soundness issues. He is another nice one, but that's another rollercoaster."

A familiar ride for Christoforou, but not something for her to bemoan.

Not when there is always something to look forward to, which would include the evening of Feb. 4 when Canada's standardbred champions are crowned at the annual O'Brien Awards festivities.

"To see his name as a finalist and know the journey that he has taken to get there makes me so happy," said Christoforou, who had eight horses in 2021, 15 this year and somewhere between 18-20 for 2023. "It's my father-in-law and his long-time ownership partner's horse, so that makes it extra special, to have it be in the family. For him to be my first horse as a finalist, he is the perfect one."

Until then, it's business as usual at the barn, where everything, good days or bad, and everything else in between, are always taken in stride.






Jim Slendorn is 'all in' since returning to harness racing

Jim Slendorn went 30 years between winning races as a driver, but ever since then, the victories have been coming with increased frequency. The 58-year-old Slendorn, a regular in the GSY Series for amateurs, has added 20 triumphs since he captured a conditioned event at Freehold Raceway in January 2021, his first win since 1991 at the same track.

"It's just crazy that I had that span," Slendorn said. "Lo and behold, here I am again. It's really amazing. I can't believe this really happened."

Slendorn was 8 years old when he began jogging horses with his father, Robert, at the family's small farm in central New Jersey.





By the time he was in his late teens, he was driving horses in qualifiers and eventually won a couple races at Freehold Raceway.

Soon though, family and his job as an ironworker became Slendorn's focus, and, for the most part, he stepped away from racing. But he always kept his license and after his kids graduated from high school, some friends suggested he consider driving as an amateur. In 2020, he qualified a horse he co-owned, Vergeofgreatness N, for trainer Kelvin Harrison and the rest is history.

"Once I got the taste again, and the adrenaline behind the (starting) car, that was it," Slendorn said. "It just took off from there. Now, I'm all in. I'm really all in. I think I've got nine horses now. It's crazy. I'm having a little success driving with some of these horses, so I'm going to keep doing it and see what happens."

One of Slendorn's top moments since his return came in June 2021 when he won for the first time at The Meadowlands, with his dad in attendance.

"For him to be there, watch me get a win at The Meadowlands, and be in the winner's circle with me, you can't even explain it," Slendorn said. "The Meadowlands has always been the place to be. It was absolutely incredible."

Slendorn has two drives at The Meadowlands on Friday. The first, in the GSY Series, is with Ferdinand A, a 10-year-old pacer he owns with Harrison. Slendorn has notched eight wins with the gelding over the past two years. The horse was second by a neck in his most recent start, Dec. 30, and is the 3-1 morning-line favorite.

"He's a dream horse to drive," Slendorn said. "He's got a lot of speed and gives you everything he has. He's been nothing but a pleasure."

Slendorn's remaining drive is with another horse he owns, Claytons Bettor N, in a conditioned pace. Claytons Bettor N was second in his most recent outing, a Dec. 16 start in the GSY. He is 10-1 on the morning line.

"I haven't beaten the big guys yet," Slendorn said, referring to The Big M's regular drivers. "If anybody can do it, I think Clayton can."

Slendorn, who won 15 of 116 races in 2022 and hit the board an additional 35 times, spent a lot of his time away from racing watching his sons Jimmy and Kyle compete in wrestling. Kyle was the winningest wrestler in Howell High School history and a two-time runner-up in the state tournament. Now a senior at Stevens Institute of Technology, he is a three-time All-American as well as three-time scholar All-American. He finished fourth in the NCAA Division III tournament last season.

"It's funny," Slendorn said. "I've watched my kids compete all this time, and I would be a nervous wreck in the stands watching them wrestle. Now they're coming to the track and they're

nervous as heck in the stands watching me on the track. The whole thing got flipped."

Slendorn enjoys the competition in the GSY, as well as the entire experience.

"It's a great group," Slendorn said. "We're all pretty close. There is a lot of camaraderie with all the drivers. It's just really fun. I look forward to Friday night. Friday night lights.

"My wife (Maureen) is getting into it too. She has friends at the track. We have dinner. It's a whole night out for us."

As for his future in racing, Slendorn hopes to maintain his level of success.

"I'm planning on trying to do about the same as I did last year," Slendorn said. "I'm just going to try to keep on rolling."





Owner/breeder Ronald Ruggles dies at 82

On Jan. 3, the sport of harness racing lost one of its most dedicated, loyal and longest owners, Ron Ruggles. He was 82 and was living in Pompano Beach, FL.

Ronald Ruggles was known by many as the M.T. Pockets Stable. Starting out in the sport while in his early 20's Ron sustained in the business for over 60 years.

Born in New Jersey, Ruggles was a diehard racing fan who regularly visited Roosevelt Raceway, Yonkers, and the Meadowlands Raceway. Always owning standardbreds named mostly (something) Pockets, it wasn't until he met and partnered with owner and author/writer Victoria Howard that as he said "he went all in."

Over the years, Ruggles has owned and bred many good stake horses such as Georgie's Pockets, Guinevere Hall, Fleurie and Taurasi.

Taurasi was Ruggles' pride and joy. This past year the stakes winning homebred 3-year-old gelding by Racing Hill won eight of 12 starts with earnings of \$183,150 with a record of 1:48.3.

His trainers as of the time of his death were Tony Alagna, Peter Wrenn and Dan Altmeyer/Mike Wilder.

Ruggles was known as one of the kindest, most generous and nicest men in the sport.

At his untimely death, Ron and Howard owned 20 horses.

The sport will deeply miss Ron, but Howard hopes to continue his legacy.

Howard, Ruggles' trainers and friends are planning a race in his honor during the Grand Circuit week at The Red Mile in the fall. There will also be a memorial service in Pompano Beach that will be announced shortly.

She's A Great Lady dies at 31

Diamond Creek is sad to announce that She's A Great Lady has passed away at the venerable age of 31.

When mares like this pass away, it is a hard time for the farm. They are more than just horses to us, they are the building blocks of what Diamond Creek is today. The present cannot exist without the past and these mares represent the history of Diamond Creek and how the farm has become what it is today.

When we tried to find words to memorialize this great mare, we found that Adam had already done so, when he wrote her story for our Golden Girls feature a few years ago.

In his words from then:

"A mare with her credentials barely needs an introduction. She's A Great Lady is so great they actually named a race after her. She also held a world record that spanned more than a decade.

Born in 1992 she became a star on the track, setting a world record at Delaware not once but twice, at 3 and again at 4, records that remained longer than most. Great horses are blessed to have races named after them and "Great Lady" was definitely that great. Earning just shy of \$1 million and taking a mark of 1:50.4, she toured the ovals of North America from 2 through 5 earning respect from everyone she raced against.

After a budding broodmare career that began under the expert eye of Carter Duer at Peninsula Farm and owned by L&L Devisser, she was sold to us in the fall of 2006.

Great Lady's broodmare career spanned 12 years but she only produced six foals and none garnered the fame and fortune of their revered mother. After her final foaling in 2012, Great Lady has remained a fixture in our group of Golden Girls. The mare with a chewed off tail remained an unbreakable spirit, malevolent, dismissive, and otherwise healthy and happy, believing that her horse groupies and not humans care for her best."

Lady spent the last years of her life living in retired mare bliss at our farm manager Gina Dailey's farm, where she was very happy to be left to herself, but would also tolerate the loving attentions of Gina's young daughter.

She is survived by her best friend Armbro Nest, 31, with whom she has spent the last 16+ years with at Diamond Creek.
