Study up before hitting Monday's Winter Mixed Sale

Northwood's Bob Boni, Preferred's David Reid and Diamond Creek's Shaun Laungani talk about some of the notable horses they are selling at The Meadowlands.

Before hitting the Tattersalls Winter Mixed Sale on Monday afternoon (Jan. 17) at The Meadowlands sale manager David Reid said it would behoove buyers to check out the results of horses that raced Friday and Saturday nights.

Updated racelines are available here.

"There's a shortage of horses in a lot of jurisdictions and we've got a lot here that are obviously proven performers and they are racing... If you want a horse that's ready to race, they are here," said Reid, who added that his Preferred Equine Marketing is selling 16 horses that were scheduled to race Saturday, after

this article was completed. "It's a proven marketplace, proven time and time again, and it will continue to do that. It's a good venue and it's a good opportunity and I'm looking forward to conducting the sale."

The auction, which starts at 1 p.m. on the Martin Luther King, Jr. holiday in the Big M paddock, will see some 82 head, as well as some 11 stallion shares or breedings, being offered.

NORTHWOOD'S BEST

Bob Boni said he believes his Northwood Bloodstock will sell the sale topper.

"For me, Whichwaytothebeach (Hip 77) is pretty much far-and-away the best horse in the sale. He would've been the best racehorse in any sale we've had this year. For what's been available this year, he wins races when he's supposed to win, which I think is very important. He made \$450,000-plus racing against the best colts and beat most everybody last year, except a handful. He was competitive with the very best in his generation. He's a versatile horse. He can go a half. Obviously, he can win on a mile. He had a tremendously good qualifier last Saturday in :51-and-a-piece. He's fit, he's sharp, he's by a horse (Somebeachsomewhere) that you don't have to worry about him going on because they all do," Boni said. "He's fresh and he qualified great. He's a tremendous candidate for the Borgota."

Boni also touted Hip 83, Belmont Major N.

"He's a multiple half-mile track winner in :52. He's racing (Saturday), as a matter of fact. He's a proven horse. He really hasn't had that many starts and he made \$100,000 last year and he's really just figuring out racing here – this will be his second start on a big track, off of a very good qualifier that he won. He won in :52 at Yonkers a couple of times and beat good horses doing it. I make him a pretty high-level horse."

On **Hip 67, Ethan T Hanover**, Boni said, the unaltered son of Bar Hopping out of Emmylou Who has, "a big pedigree and is a competitive stakes horse. Again, when you look at the purse structure here, the fact that he's a multiple half-mile track winner, I think it

bodes extremely well for him going forward. Great looking horse on the racetrack – good-gaited horse. On his pedigree, everything points to him going on and continuing. He'd be one, if you looked at him as an open trotter next year and for many years after that, why not? I would be very optimistic about his opportunities."

Boni owns a piece of **Hip 64 As Always** and said the gelded son of Always B Miki out of A List Hanover, "Always looked like a horse with a lot of talent and had some trouble putting it together. He's a big growthy horse. In his last six or seven starts, it looks like he's kind of figuring things out. He's been very good. A couple of races he lost in the middle there, I think you could come up with some pretty good excuses. Last week, he won wrapped up. It was really an impressive mile and he's in-to-go (Saturday)."

Boni also highlighted three mares:

Hip 38 Alwaysthebstplace — "She made \$80,000 last year and could race anywhere. She's got a pedigree, being a sister to a pretty good horse, Always My Place. She's going to have value beyond the racetrack."

Hip 39 Boujee Girl — "She's got a good, solid pedigree. Out of a world champion. She's a sister to a top horse. She's had two starts here and she's finished good in both of them. She's had two good closing starts and she's a mare that can do somebody some good."

Hip 55 Stowaway Hanover — "She's a Western Ideal mare. She made \$100,000 last year and she's right on the page – she's the immediate family of Downbytheseaside. That's pretty hot right now. She's got a fast record and she's just five. She won in :53 on a half last year and just got beat in :51, so she's obviously a legit mare anyway you race her, but she's also got pedigree.

Finally, Boni mentioned a horse selling in the supplement — **Hip 208, Blue Devi** — "He wins. He made \$100,000 last year and he wins races. I'm a big believer that no matter where you race... one of the fallacies in this business has always been to take the horse that's been getting beat up at the Meadowlands or wherever and lets go take him to a slower racetrack. Well, guess what happens to the horse that's finishing third, fourth, fifth at the Meadowlands when you take him to Buffalo? He finishes third, fourth or fifth there, too. For me, it's when they fall into the right spot, do they win?"



PREFERRED HIGHLIGHTS

Reid said he is happy with the quality Preferred has to offer.

"It is a slightly compact sale with plenty of talent and proven performers."

Apart from offering a pair of mares in foal to Sweet Lou (**Hip 1 Firefly** and **Hip 3 Mimi's Lily**) and shares of leading sires, including Muscle Hill and Sweet Lou, Preferred is selling a range of leading racehorses. Reid highlighted:

Hip 85 Captain Barbosa — "A multiple stakes winner, including the Little Brown Jug. He's a multiple sub-1:50 performer."

Hip 87 De Los Cielos Deo – "A winner of over \$500,000 lifetime and a blowout winner in his last start here at The Meadowlands on January 8^{th} ."

Hip 27 Layton Hanover — "He just became a 3-year-old that showed very good ability late last year."

Hip 69 Goodashim – "A full brother to Father Patrick."

Hip 91 Kings County — "A well-bred son of Muscle Hill that has serious ability."

Hip 92 Patriarch Hanover – "A winner of nearly \$400,000 and a fresh runner up at Yonkers in high conditioned event."

Hip 32 Unmistakable – "A good looking daughter from the

sensational first crop of Walner."

Hip 56 Swift Swanda — "An outstanding trotting mare that is a racing / breeding prospect."

Looking for your vote!

I admit to being miffed when none of my pieces made HRU's list of the 10 most read stories of 2021. I was told that a story's value is not judged by how many people read them and that explaining the difference between the phenotype and the genotype is a narrow topic that didn't capture as much imagination as stories about fixed races and incompetent racing commissions.

Well, sir, as Frank Ervin used to say, I could tell a great story about a certain racing commission if I wasn't leery of the response it might get. When you're up against people who have no respect for the truth, it's best to tread lightly, or, to continue with the clichés and remember that you can't fight city hall.

So, in an attempt to become a contender to the Top Ten, let me bring you up to date on the Horseracing Integrity and Safety Act (HISA).

First, the Lord High Muckety Mucks from the thoroughbred industry will no longer have the support and cooperation of the United States Anti-Doping Agency (USADA). That means that their stated goal of great, uniform drug testing across the entire spectrum of horse racing in America likely will not happen.

Then, as questions continue to be asked and not answered as to the cost of HISA, even Ed Martin, the voice and leader of the Association of Racing Commissioners International (ARCI), has expressed concern about what the costs could amount to.

Here a personal note: While the Hambletonian Society has announced its support for HISA, it was not put to a vote of the full board. Had that happened, as the longest serving Society member, I would have voted against supporting HISA. Not that it will stop the earth from revolving around the sun, or the moon from controlling the tides of the Seven Seas, I have always opposed HISA, and always will.

One should understand that HISA was passed by the U.S. Senate as a tack-on to an entirely unrelated bill. This scheme was conceived and carried out by Mitch McConnell, the senior senator from Kentucky. McConnell is heavily supported by the thoroughbred industry in Kentucky.

I think there's a word for people who will sell themselves when there's enough money being offered, but at the moment it escapes me.

For the record, Russell Williams, the president of the USTA, has always seen the dangers inherent in HISA. He is personally financing the lawsuit brought by the USTA v. HISA. Since his litigation was just announced, it's been joined by several racing states and racing organizations. While I have faith that Russell will prevail in court, I think there's also a real possibility that the Hisers will come to their senses, fold their tents, and quietly slink away.

There's also a new complication in the already complicated Kentucky Derby caper involving Bob Baffert and Medina Spirit. For reasons known only to themselves, the stewards involved in the poor horse's positive test have yet to hold the hearing that would move the case along.

Here, a personal observation about Baffert and his flimsy excuses that have been accepted by various racing commissions RE: his numerous positive tests. To criticize Baffert for the slaps-on-the-wrist he's been dealt is to miss the point here. If anyone is at fault here, it's the racing commissions which failed to take Baffert's offenses seriously.

The most egregious example involved the positive test of Justify in a stakes race in California that preceded the Triple Crown. In that case, the California Commission went to great lengths to hide their machinations that resulted in a no-fault decision. That despite the fact the level of whatever the test revealed was, by a big multiple, higher than a level caused by contamination.

My heart quailed when I read the news that Medina Spirit had dropped dead after a work-out. For me, that was a tragedy, although at least the horse didn't suffer. Someone in harness

It seems that now everyone and their great grandfather has jumped on Baffert with everything plus the kitchen sink. The worst of the jumpers is Churchill Downs. They showed the world who they were when they refused to accept an expanded gaming license for Arlington Park in order to protect their nearby casino.

If they had the best interest of thoroughbred racing at heart, a somewhat dubious assumption about actually having a heart, they would have taken up expanded gaming and kept the track running at its usual high level. Instead, they rejected the offer of expanded gaming, and sold the track. With Arlington Park gone, so went thoroughbred racing in Illinois.

If they give medals of honor for hypocrisy, Churchill should be first on the pedestal.

Somehow all this talk about money reminds me of my favorite, legendary girl in the bar. I'm sure you know the one I'm talking about, the girl who said, "I'm not free, but I am reasonable."

The charmed life of Eddie Lohmeyer

How many trainers have you heard of who have kept the same owner for over 30 years? I would guess not too many. Think of this: Eddie Lohmeyer has had two such owners.

Bob Tucker had horses in Lohmeyer's stable for 43 years and John Stoddard had them with him for 33.

If nothing else, that speaks volumes for the incredible performance, outstanding horsemanship, honorable nature and perhaps, most of all, incredible loyalty that this life-long horseman has inspired.

The tale of Ed Lohmeyer traces to Monticello, NY where he was born and raised into a family of life-long horsemen. He credits his uncles, the three Manzi brothers, most specifically brother Al, the father of the renowned Catello Manzi and his dad Ed Sr. for inspiring his start in harness racing.

In 1960, then a senior in high school and shepherded by Uncle Al, Lohmeyer attended the Harrisburg sale. While there he made his first horse purchase. He bought a yearling colt named Sam Mac, a son of the stallion Meade Mac for the price of \$300.

That winter Lohmeyer rationed his time between going to school and getting up early to prepare his protege for that summers racing on the New York fair circuit. The training was done on the back roads where he lived.

"Sam Mac and me traveled the circuit from fair to fair," Lohmeyer said. "I had my truck and trailer. I would sleep in the trailer. It wasn't near as difficult as it might sound. It was actually a great deal of fun. The memories of that summer will last with me forever."

He graduated from high school in 1961 and started racing at Monticello Raceway in 1962.

He began training and racing at Monticello. Shortly thereafter he moved his training activities to Honedale, PA, a 30 minute drive from Monticello. He raced with decent success, mostly at Monticello, for the next three years.

The Vietnam War was at its height. They were drafting 65,000 men a month at the time. Lohmeyer was drafted in 1965, but received a one-year deferment because he was training five head of horses and needed to find new homes for them.

Upon entering the service, he was told that the Marines were short of their allotment. He figured that if he was destined to be a soldier, he might as well be one of the best — the Few, the Proud. Thus, Lohmeyer became a member of the United State Marine Corps.

Shortly thereafter he was shipped to Vietnam where he served for 13 months. On reflection, he says "It was a terrible war and we had no business being there. As with most wars of recent American vintage, it was one manufactured by the politicians for their own benefit. We would probably be best if we tended to our own challenges at home and let other countries take care of theirs."

He returned to America landing at the marine base in Quantico Virginia.

No sooner had he been mustered out of the Marine Corps, than he was asked to drive at the then functioning Georgetown Raceway in Delaware. He didn't even have his colors and had to borrow a set.

He started training and driving at Green Mountain Park, where Joe DeFrank was racing secretary. Back then, Lohmeyer was mostly noted as a catch driver, but is quick to point out that he always had a stable that he trained. He felt then and still feels that DeFrank was the best and fairest of all race secretaries. He soon hitched himself to Joe DeFrank's bandwagon. Wherever Joe became the race secretary, Lohmeyer followed. From Green Mountain, Lohmeyer raced at The Meadows, Freehold, Suffolk Downs and of course The Meadowlands where he was among the invited guests at the track's ground breaking.

He has now entered a new phase of his life, where together with his wife, the noted equine surgeon, Dr Patty Hogan, they have established Pheasant Hill Farms, one of the foremost equine surgery clinics in all of horsedom at the former Perretti Farms.

It was there, after Lohmeyer spent a year away from training horses, that this scribe caught up with him.

You've undergone a big change in your lifestyle, from training and driving horses to managing a 305-acre farm and surgical clinic, considered to be one of the best of its kind anywhere. How has this affected you?

"If I said, 'It has been easy,' I'd be lying. Prior to spending last winter at the clinic, I'd spent 50 consecutive years training horses in Florida every off season. Most of all, I miss the people and the camaraderie of the racetrack. The warm weather was also nice.

"If you've experienced it, you would know what I was saying. If you haven't, then it would be next to impossible to describe. Not having my horsemen friends around, combined with not being able to sit behind one in a cart has constituted a big change in my life.

"But, this new life has lots of plusses as well. I live together with the love of my life in a gorgeous home on one of the

most beautiful horse farms anywhere. I'm still around horses on a daily basis. At any given time there are anywhere from 60-70 horses, mostly equally divided between thoroughbreds and standardbreds turned out at the farm, most of them are patients of Patty's at the clinic. Patty and I still own nine trotting broodmares, together with their foals. As Mr. Churchill is often quoted as having said, 'There's something about the outside of a horse that's good for the inside of a man."

Let's talk about your racing career. I started this story by mentioning the amazing fact that you've had relatively few owners, but those you've had have stayed with you virtually forever. To what do you attribute this?

"Firstly, probably the good luck to have as great a gentleman as Bob Tucker enter my life. Bob was a great man —strong willed, but brilliant and extremely loyal and understanding. To my knowledge, from the first time I had a horse with him, he never had one trained by anybody else. From Bob, I got to know and train horses for John Stoddard. Through Mr. Stoddard, I got to know and train horses for and in partnership with the former Secretary of the Treasury, William E. Simon. I did my best for all of them and they repaid me by sticking with me. They also increased my owner base with a few stock market people who came in on some of our high-priced yearling acquisitions."

717-638-7100 office@diamondcreekfarm.com You mention high-priced yearling acquisitions. Two that stand out were Landslide at \$290,000 and Vanston Hanover at \$325,000. We both know that most high-priced yearlings do not usually work out to the best advantage. These were two that did.

"It's interesting that we bought each of them by making only one bid — the final one. With Landslide we were at Stoner Creek Stud, Bob Tucker, Mr. Stoddard and a few of their Wall Street associates who I jokingly refer to as the Irish Mafia. They brought him out. He was gorgeous. When asked if I liked him I replied in the affirmative. I said that he was the best colt being sold anywhere that year. One of them said, 'Then, let's buy him.' So we did. He tried to bow a tendon at 2. I told them that if we didn't stop with him, we would cause him irreparable damage. They were alright with that. At 3, he was a monster. He won 10 in a row including the Adios. He was then syndicated for \$3.6 million.

"Vanston Hanover was an absolutely beautiful colt. He sold at The Meadowlands for \$325,000 one of the years when Hanover sold a bunch of their yearlings there. He had talent and raced well, but didn't turn out quite as good as we thought he might become. Nevertheless, between what he earned here and what we sold him for to stand stud Down Under, he earned himself out.

"Landslide was a just a moderately successful stallion here. I've been told that Vanston Hanover was very successful Down Under."

You've been around through several generations of horsefolk, who were the best?

"I would have to say through my formative times in the business and to some degree beyond, two names would stand out. It would not be a surprise to know that those names are Stanley Dancer and Billy Haughton.

"I like to reserve the word great to describe people or horses who were actually that. I find the word to sometimes be overused, especially today. But those two men fit that description to a tee.

"Strangely enough, though, they were generally quite different in both their training and driving methods. Billy was as great an all-around horseman as ever lived. His speciality was in never giving up on horses. If you had a problem young horse, there was nobody better at making a good horse out of it than was WRH. As a driver, I would describe him as more of a finesse type.

"Stanley's speciality was in either developing young horses from their yearling stage or getting a good horse and then developing it into a great one. He especially excelled at managing a top horse. The number of horses he had as Horse of The Year leads the list. He was also an extremely astute businessman.

"As a driver, he totally revolutionized the sport. In retrospect, it

wasn't all that hard a thing to discover, but he figured out that the quickest and shortest way around a racetrack was from the top, sitting at the rail.

"In recent years, for some reason those from Europe and Down Under seem to lead the list. Names like Jimmy and Nancy Takter, Brett Pelling, Ake Svanstedt, Nifty Norman, Marcus Melander, Noel Daley are always found at or near the top. That's not to say that we don't have our share of top homegrown horseman such as Ronnie Burke and Tony Alagna.

"I'd also be remiss if I didn't mention my mentor Al Manzi and some names such as Delvin Miller, Ronnie Waples and Erv Miller."

You were particularly close to not only Stanley Dancer and Billy Haughton, but also to members of both their families.

"Yes indeed. The Dancers lived just down the road from us. When I was starting out, I bought a bunch of used equipment from Vernon to help outfit my horses. I need to add they were priced so reasonably, that I might have thought I was stealing. I remember one of the halters had the nameplate of Lyss Hanover, a top Adios colt that Vernon trained and raced.

"Ronnie Dancer, Stanley's son, was and remains not only a good friend of mine, but also the best friend that harness racing in New Jersey has in that state's legislature. I've always thought that if harness racing ever got a much needed commissioner,



that Ronnie would make a perfect candidate for that job.

"Billy and his wife Dottie were wonderful friends and teachers, but the one Haughton closest to my heart was their son Peter. Peter was a great friend and a wonderful horseman. When the Meadowlands opened, I bought a home in nearby Harmon Cove. Peter stayed with me when he raced at The Meadowlands in the winter. He was living in my guest bedroom at the time of that fateful crash that took his life. That was probably the worst day of my life. The evening of Peter's funeral, I drove his horse Cold Comfort to a win in the free-for-all trot at The Meadowlands. I was so distraught, that I couldn't even stay for the winners circle picture presentation."

Let's talk about drivers. Who were the best?

"John Campbell — He undoubtedly would be the best. He dominated for so long. He was great for the sport both on and off the racetrack. He is now taking it to another level as the president of the Hambletonian Society.

"Herve Filion — He has to be my all-time favorite. I learned so much from watching and listening to him. He was part, maybe even mostly horse. He had so much innate wisdom about horses and was such a pleasure to be around. I've never known anybody quite like him.

"Cat Manzi — Not because he is my cousin. He is my uncle Al's son, seven years younger than me. But because he was a genuinely great driver. He had soft hands and was very kind to horses. Even though his numbers are astounding, I feel he sometimes gets lost in discussing the all-time greats.

"Bill O'Donnell — Another of the very greatest. As similar to Herve as anybody that I've seen or known — complete to the wisecracks and great personality both on and off the track. For a period of time, maybe the best there ever was to sit behind a horse.

"Ronnie Waples — He's another who sometimes gets overlooked. Not only a great driver, but a great all around horseman, a hard worker and a great friend.

"Ronnie Pierce — A great driver and a great friend. You could

never discount him, especially when the big money was up.

"Then, of course, there are the modern wonders and they are just that — wonderful drivers. Guys like Tim Tetrick, David Miller, Yannick Gingras, Brian Sears, George Brennan, Dexter Dunn, the McCarthy brothers, George Napolitano Jr, Aaron Merriman and Dave Palone would have been great any time and in any era.

"Two things I firmly believe: 1. Great drivers are born, not made. The same applies to horses. 2. Weight plays a big part in determining greatness in the bike. It is especially a factor in present times when speed is such a factor. Even back then, guys like the first great catch driver Hughie Bell and Tic Wilcutts had an edge because of their tiny size. Today's great drivers are more conscious of their size and conditioning than ever before. They watch their weight. It might not get them a huge edge. But every little edge counts."

Probably the least known fact about you and the one that perhaps you might take the most pride in is that you have been a moderately successful breeder from having only raised a relatively small number of foals.

"I still own a home and a small 38-acre farm on it in Cream Ridge, New Jersey that we have just put on the market. From that little place and owning just a handful of mares, we bred and raised such horses as Pacific Rocket, Pacific Fella, NYSS Champion and the highest money winning 2-year-old of 1972, Eddie Jeff. At the 2020 Harrisburg sale, held at Timonium, we sold the trotting filly Adair Castle for \$12,000. She was the highest money winning 2-year-old trotting film in Ontario winning over \$396,000.

"Patty and I presently own nine broodmares, all of them trotters. We breed them mostly in Pennsylvania at Hanover and also breed a few in Ohio where the stud fees are fairly reasonable. We play at the middle to lower end of the marketplace and try to watch our dollars as best we can."

How about the future for Eddie Lohmeyer?

"I consider myself to have been one of the luckiest guys on the face of this earth. I have the best wife in the world. I live in a beautiful home and manage one of the nicest farms anywhere, surrounded by horses. What else could a guy wish for?

"PS — We are also privileged to share our lives with two of the world's greatest dogs, our Golden Retriever Eli and our black Labrador retriever Jack."

24th win for Bazire's star Elie de Beaufour

Jean-Michel Bazire-trained **Elie de Beaufour** (Royal Dream) claimed his 24th lifetime victory when he made his 34th start in \$102,500 Prix du Forez on Saturday (Jan. 15) afternoon at Vincennes.

The 8-year-old gelding was successful in \$125,000 Grand National du Trot Final in 2020 and it seems like Bazire once again has a high-level performing gelding in his barn, a horse that could be a factor in big races outside of France.

The Saturday win at Vincennes was impressive. Elie de Beaufour chased and caught up to leader Fire Cracker just before the uphill part of the Vincennes' track and when 600 meters remained of the race, Bazire opted for position first over which soon thereafter resulted in front position as the field turned for home. Elie de Beaufour jogged to a safe win in an outstanding mile rate 1:54.2 over 2,700 meters (1.6 miles).

Philippe Allaire's **Hohneck** (Royal Dream) tested the \$135,000 Prix de Croix for 5-year-olds and the Prix d'Amérique-ready colt was outstanding after a second over trip for driver Francois Lagadeuc. With a half-mile remaining in the 1.7-mile-long race, Lagadeuc attacked three wide and Hohneck controlled the field all the way since he came to the lead with 650 meters to go.

The mile rate for Allaire's trotter was 1:58.2 and next objective for the talented 5-year-old is the Prix d'Amérique on Jan. 30.

Sharon Walker – life-long equine enthusiast

From the time Sharon Walker was an 8-year-old girl in pigtails to the present, there have been two things that sum up her love for horses.

The first is the fact didn't like playing with Barbie dolls as a little girl. Instead, she collected a stable of Breyer horses.

"When I was 8 years old, my dad bought me a mini bike but I told him, 'It's the wrong kind of horse power, daddy.' Nonetheless, to make him happy I rode the bike, but pretended it was a horse.

"And recently my husband, Kelly, bought me a decorative couch pillow that says, 'LIFE WITHOUT HORSES?' NOPE! I don't think so! So that pretty much sums up my life and undying love I have for horses."

Sharon was born in Dearborn Heights, MI. Although her family wasn't involved in harness racing, her passion for horses steered her into riding and showing.

"I've been involved with riding and showing horses for more than half of my life. I've had Morgans and Saddlebreds and have shown everything from 4-H Gymkhana classes, training level dressage tests, halter classes, all the way to showing on the green shavings at The Saddlebred World's Championship.

"It wasn't until I met Kelly 21 years ago that I became interested in harness horses, and that was it. I fell in love with Kelly and the horses. Maybe not in that order," Sharon said, laughing.

"I was hooked and it's my entire life for I am not only married to Kelly, but I'm married to the business.

"At that time, a girlfriend of mine who I showed horses with was married to trainer Terry Tomlin of Fowlerville, Michigan, and also Kelly's trainer.

"Every time I went to the barn she kept showing me Kelly's horses, but I now know she had an ulterior motive.

"One night I attended the races at the Saginaw County Fairgrounds and I was introduced to Kelly. That night we ended up bathing one of his horses together, a horse named Perfect Patty and it was perfect, and the rest is history.

"At that time I thought standardbreds were, to put it politely, not as pretty as my show horses. I mean, I could barely see the horse through all the equipment he wore, but I have since learned to appreciate the beauty of a racehorse.

"When I first got involved with Morgan riding horses, I did all my own training. Being a stay at home mom gave me the time to devote to horses. We had a riding instructor come to the house and give my daughter and I lessons. When I switched over to Saddlebreds I also started working as a licensed veterinary technician and went with a professional to do the training. That works so much better when you have a 9 to 5 job."

Although the Walkers run a smaller stable than most, they are some of the hardest working people in the business. They are totally dedicated to the sport and their 'four-legged kids.'

Kelly is also involved with running the family business — a greenhouse and farming business. In recent years, Kelly took a 20-year sabbatical from the sport — due to the loss of his father — and ran the greenhouse and farm. When he returned to harness racing, he became a licensed driver who has represented the USA three times in International Amateur Competition — twice in New Zealand and once in Italy.

He was the USHWA Amateur Driver of the Year in 2011, several times the winner of the Delvin Miller Gold Cup final, the CKG Billings Final, and was both the Michigan and Florida Amateur Driver of the Year.

"Kelly got his first owner's license in 1977 and his first driver's license in 2004. He hasn't been as active in the driving clubs for several years now and has focused on driving mostly at Pompano Park when we are in Florida during the winter."

Today, the Walkers have eight horses in Florida, and two in Pennsylvania.

"We just sold our last broodmare, but still have, as of January 1, a yearling colt and a 2-year-old filly in Pennsylvania.

As far as the Walkers' best horse, Sharon said it was their third homebred, Andheezperfect, an Andover Hall out of Perfect Patty who trotted to his lifetime mark of 1:52.3 when he was 6 and amassed earnings of \$859,513.

"When 'Andy started to slow down we opted not to put him in a claiming race and sent him to New Vocations where they found him his forever home, living out his years in a pasture with a donkey and pony."

In the winter, you can find Sharon at Sunshine Meadows helping her husband jog and train their horses every day.

"I used to ride my racehorses but didn't have the desire to sit behind them at that time. I was used to sitting on top of a horse and feeling the horse under me. The Saddlebreds show with a double bridle. Two thin reins in each hand and two bits in their mouths. I like the super sensitive feeling of reins between my fingers — just a tweak of your wrist gets a response. Well, I found out even though the lines are bigger, it's almost the same thing when you're jogging a racehorse. Now, I look forward to jogging them and especially training day, for I love the speed. I still smile when I hit my quarters exactly on time."

Sharon also drives in a race now and then and has graced the winner's circle at Pompano Park six times in 2021- all in the months of November and December.

"I've learned to adapt to many different ways to enjoy horses. Earlier this year in Michigan, we raced at the Fowlerville Fairground — the place my kids and I learned to show horses in the early '90s. Well, 29 years later, here I am warming up a standardbred racehorse for my husband. I never would have believed that 29 years later that is how I would be enjoying my life. Life is good."







The player, the play and the thresholds that bind them – Part 1

I am not one for New Year's resolutions. However, come every calendar year since I became my own breadwinner, I settle accounts with the previous 12 months of spending and earning and, of course, taxes and I start a fresh personal-and-business budget ledger.

The closest thing I imagine that to a resolution is my conscious aim to earn more in the new year than in the past year as an independent contractor. No definitive means come to mind but I trust it will as long as I stay aware I am not satisfied with my previous year's income.

There were years when I did not have to work harder to earn more because of some windfall project but being aware of wanting to earn more allowed me to take stronger considerations about accepting or rejecting projects. It is necessary for me to balance a work load because adding new work may affect the core work and extra money earned is not worth putting steady projects in jeopardy.

Back in the '80s when I was playing pari-mutuels daily or nightly while sharing work hours with writing projects, there were times when one project negatively affected another and that stained the quality of my work. I swore (though not a resolution) I had to assign priorities to projects no matter how much extra I was offered in a particular year.

One season, my pari-mutuel bankroll was in the process of producing the highest rate of investment (ROI) in my betting career and I decided to up the ante by increasing my wagers — without changing the tried-and-true methods of my wagering plan. It was advice given to me by an excellent money-manager from whom I learned about distinguishing the act of betting from the act of handicapping.

It was time to take the next step, one which would not interfere with my other streams of income. I chose to increase my wagering significantly.

"The racetrack will be happy," I told my money-manager.

"One thing you must remember, though," he said.

"Which is what?"

"You can still lose."

"I know that."

"A lot more than usual," he said, "and if it gets out of hand you could lose your whole bankroll. And the racetrack won't like that one bit."

My money-manager suggested an increase should be far less than I intended while still capping any wager to no more than five per cent of my bankroll. I argued but gave in.

My "money handler" — the pari-mutuel raceway — would still be happy because a steady financial plan kept me gambling, which helped keep the raceway in business.

It was not until the end of that season when the tale of another bettor on the grounds ended badly on his part and the raceway. The situation made me understand how betting thresholds affect the player and the track where he or she plays.

The Delaney Conundrum

A Los Angeles show business newspaper ran a story about a successful writer of television programs who spent much of his time that season at a local raceway (for privacy's sake, we call the writer Delaney and the racetrack Palmtree Park).

Most of us Hollywood in show business knew about Delaney's career; it was strewn with success, including super hit shows of the era. Delaney won Emmys and broke the record for earnings by a novice author when in one season he earned about \$11 million. His lifestyle was in direct proportion to making that kind of money (which was worth much more in the '80s than it is now).

At Palmtree Park, Delaney's friends said he was serious about betting and was an exceptional handicapper. In past seasons he made a decent ROI. Then, one season during the height of his success he experienced, as do all bettors sometime or other, an unprecedented losing streak. With no sound financial plan for wagering but plenty of personal cash to bet, Delaney faced the streak with nothing less than reckless abandon.

A friend witnessed the daily, grinding Delaney defeat. "He would begin to bet, lose, and be unable to stop betting. He was crazy, betting [and losing] thousands of dollars in every race."

Palmtree Park loved him, however, because he was a "churn engine," packing the pools of ordinary races with scads of dough. One official at the track called Delaney the "Tycoon of Takeout."

No one figured there was a bottom to the pocket of a man who drew an enormous salary from making television shows. In Part 2 we finish Delaney's tale and write more about the strained relationship of a raceway and its clients.





MajorConnection and the light at the end of the tunnel

I am a 37-year-old woman named Sarah trying to get comfortable under a plaid quilt blanket in the back seat of a pickup truck destined to get repossessed. The darkness of the apartment parking lot, the broken light on the pole and the rain might allow me to sleep through the night undisturbed. My swollen right knee aches, no doubt some ligament damage. I have not eaten much besides potato chips and beef jerky for two weeks. I think I lost a few pounds, which would be good.

All in all, I'm happy.

Dr. Contour, my psychiatrist at the VA hospital, said that I was borderline OCD with possible schizophrenia. Well, he didn't say it out loud, but I got the drift. And don't let anyone trash the VA hospital system. They do the best they can. After only three years in the service, the VA door is always open, and I never pay a penny. Most of us are just hard to fix.

The past four years were remarkable.

I don't know why MajorConnection suddenly woke up one morning and decided to be a real racehorse. Nobody knows, but this trotter plays a leading role in this story. For his first 15 starts, 10 starts at age 2 and five at age 3, the bay colt just clomped around, picking up small checks for the owner, Margret Phelan, a woman who looks like the green witch in The Wizard of OZ. Mrs. Phelen's trainer is Ross Wilson. I groomed Major for every start. He was just another racehorse, a less than mediocre racehorse. Although he was race timed in two minutes, two and two-tenths of a second, he never won a race in fifteen tries. I didn't like Major anymore or any less than the five other horses I cared for every day.

My boyfriend sometimes slapped me, but let me say this, he never punched me with his fist or hit me with a table lamp. On April 17, four years ago, we were both drunk when he slapped me harder than usual, and my nose began to bleed and kept bleeding. I used a whole box of Kleenex, made quite a mess, and either fainted or passed out.

I woke up in an ambulance, but I was foggy. When I woke up

again, I saw daylight through a window and felt a wad of cotton in my nose. They did not admit me, but the doctor stashed me in a bed in the emergency section. My boss, Ross, picked me up around noon. Ross is a good guy. He's a family guy, but we aren't close. Suitable grooms are hard to find, so he tolerates me and my personality.

Ross and Margret Phalen don't race their horses at the fairs. Honestly, Major had yet to win a race and did not look like he could even make money racing at fairs. I heard them talking early in June.

Ross said, "MajorConnection doesn't look like much. I mean, he looks fine, but he doesn't seem to have the heart. He might be of use to someone who is going to race fairs, but this is probably the time to cut your losses with this one."

She said, "Maybe we could list him on the Internet."

Ross nodded. "Possible, but I don't think you will get more than a couple thousand, and the website gets a piece of that. But your training bills will stop, and it would be addition by subtraction."

I swear I don't know what happened at this moment. I heard my voice saying, "I'll buy Major."

There was no plan. I don't think I ever considered this action unless it bubbled around deep in my subconscious. It was like I heard somebody else talking.

We worked it out. I never actually paid for MajorConnection. We just transferred the ownership papers. Ross took a cut from my paychecks, and I began bunking in the tack room and feeding the horses in the morning for payment. Staying at the stable was Ross' idea. He felt I needed a change of routine, but he probably felt that what I really needed was a brain change.

Since I only have a groom's license, we left Ross as the trainer of record. Willie Davenport, a good guy from the next barn, had two pacers racing at the fairs. When Major was eligible for the same fairs, I hitched rides from Willie and his horses. Willie drove Major at five fairs that summer, and Major earned \$4,843. Earned is a stretch. We drew into fields when only two other colts entered, so we got second and third money for just showing up.

The mystery began as the summer wound down. Fairground racing was over, and MajorConnection was 0-20. To any sane person who understands horseracing, Major was noncompetitive. Sending him out to race at Delta Downs, a real racetrack, looked like a hopeless assignment. But hopeless is a word I had heard all my life, so I entered Major, and he raced well, very well.

The race that changed everything was a maiden, a race for horses who had never won a single race. Major came off the gate and drifted back to the rear of the field. He shuffled along. He was still last at the halfway point when suddenly he popped his head up and began trotting up a storm. Major passed them all and won by a couple of lengths in 1:59. I was so shocked that Willie had to nudge me to get into the golf cart and go to the winner's circle.

Standing for the photo, the driver, Randall McQueen, leaned over and said, "Not terrible."

That race was incredible. Maybe it was a fluke, but it was awe-some. Major and I won \$5,100.

Did you ever hear the saying that good things seem to happen in threes? It might be true.

A month before Major's big race, Dr. Contour prescribed me a different kind of antidepressant, one pill per day that he said to take around suppertime. I filled the prescription right at the VA. The first week nothing happened, I was still jittery, snappy, and scared, but around the start of the second week, a little at a time, I was not so jangled.

The morning after MajorConnection won his first race, the third thing happened. Margret Phalen must have parked her broomstick outside. She strode into the barn in my direction. Aside from nodding hello, we never had a conversation. My back stiffened. I figured she wanted Major Connection back.

She said, "Congratulations on Major's win, what a thrill."

"Do you want him back?"

"No, no, of course not. The reason I'm here is to get you out of that cot in the tack room. You probably know that my husband is a developer. He just finished an apartment complex less than a quarter-mile from here. The project is nothing fancy, built for middle incomes, most of the tenants will work at the new Amazon complex. We employ a backup maintenance person on the premises. We can offer you a small unit at half the rental price if you are interested. The position requires little and should not interfere with your racetrack work."

Now, this was a trifecta. The medicine was working. MajorConnection raced a shocker and a home of my own. After years of couch crashing, splitting with roommates, shelters, and army barracks, my own home seemed like a dream.

I will not bore you with the details, but here is the big picture. MajorConnection raced well for two seasons. He was not a world champion but a horse that climbed the racing classification and was a steady check getter. The new antidepressants made a huge difference. Living in my tiny apartment, free from the stresses of my previous life, was different, not perfect, but different. I even began to go to Trinity Baptist Church and made a few friends.

But this ain't no fairy tale or Hallmark movie. I threw it all away. Doctor Contour calls the self-destructive way I act using fancier terms. He blames things on my childhood and trauma, but it doesn't matter.

My first big mistake was stopping the antidepressant pills. I was getting a little ahead of myself and didn't think I needed them. In a brilliant move, I started drinking again. Then I sold MajorConnection in a lousy deal. I bet you thought this would be a sappy love story between Major and me, but I sold him without blinking an eye. Then some half-assed dealings with the same boyfriend who slapped me. There were debts, an arrest. I lost the apartment.

So here I am. I am pulling the plaid blanket up to my chin, ready for a long night in the rear seat of a truck - same old, same old. But I am smiling. I am not the same old Sarah. I know the pills

work and have already resumed taking them. I know that I can live alone and make friends, and I now have a little faith to fall back on.

Do you know the saying about the light at the end of the tunnel? That always sounded like BS, but these past few years changed things. MajorConnection came along. Now I know the light is real, and I believe I can reach it again.



Amos Finch dead at 85

Amos Finch, 85, of Walton NY, died at home on Jan. 11.

In terms of membership with the U.S. Harness Writers Association, Finch belonged for 64 years, the second-longest amount of time among members at the start of 2022 behind Kaye Kessler, a retired newspaperman from Columbus (OH). Mr. Finch was a founding member of the Monticello-Goshen Chapter of USHWA in 1959, and had served as a national director of the Association.

Mr. Finch began work at radio station WDLA in 1953, as a junior in high school. Twenty-two years later he and a partner would buy the station and operate it and two sister stations until his retirement in 2000. He frequented Monticello Raceway and also announced the harness races at the nearby Afton County Fair. He was involved in civic and community activities, including serving on his local school board.

In 1957, he married the former Sandra Walker, with whom he celebrated his 64th anniversary this past August; she survives him, as do sons David and Donald and a rather large extended family.

Woodbine releases schedule for massive 2022 standardbred stakes season

Woodbine Entertainment has unveiled the schedule for its lucrative 2022 standardbred stakes events at Woodbine Mohawk Park.

More than \$21 million in stakes races, including the \$6.7 million (USD) Breeders Crown, will be contested in 2022 at Woodbine Mohawk Park.

The 39th Pepsi North America Cup and third Mohawk Million headline the stakes calendar at Woodbine Mohawk Park as million-dollar races.

After being rescheduled in 2020 and 2021, the Pepsi North America Cup for harness racing's finest 3-year-old pacers is

set to return to its start of summer position on Saturday, June 18, 2022.

The stacked Pepsi North America Cup card will include the \$450,000 Fan Hanover (3-year-old pacing fillies), \$330,000 Roses Are Red (pacing mares), \$250,000 Armbro Flight (trotting mares), \$250,000 Goodtimes (3-year-old trotters) and \$100,000 Mohawk Gold Cup Invitational.

The third edition of the Mohawk Million is scheduled for Saturday, Sept. 24. The \$1 million race for 2-year-old trotters continues to follow a "buy-in" format with nine slots available for purchase.

Each slot available for purchase in the Mohawk Million is priced at \$100,000 (CAD). The 10th and final slot will be awarded to the winner of the \$610,000 William Wellwood Memorial. The deadline to purchase a slot is Feb. 15, 2022.

The Mohawk Million card is Canada's richest night of racing in 2022 with over \$3.4 million in purses up for grabs.

The \$850,000 Metro Pace (2-year-old pacers) and \$550,000 Shes A Great Lady (2-year-old pacing fillies) remain part of the Million card, while the \$600,000 Canadian Trotting Classic (3-year-old trotters) and \$400,000 Elegantimage (3-year-old trotting fillies) join the rich evening in 2022.

The end of August and month of September remain filled with major stakes action in 2022.

The William Wellwood Memorial (2-year-old trotters) and \$400,000 Peaceful Way (2-year-old trotting fillies) will now take place on Saturday, Aug. 27.
