

#### 2. KEEP GOING (LOVE YOU)

Driver/trainer: Mathieu Mottier

The youngster in the field, Keep Going, a 5-year-old, might be the most elegantly-gaited trotter in the Prix d'Amérique this year and he started his big journey by winning the \$325,000 Criterium des 4 ans in September last year. He qualified by winning the Criterium Continental in December. This is the race's big outsider and my quess is that he ends up on the podium.

#### 3. JUSTIN BOLD (BOLD EAGLE)

Driver: Pierre-Yves Verva Trainer: Jean-Remi Delliaux

Justin Bold has belonged in the top of the French J-crop as a 3- and 4-year-old, but it's now been a while since he entered the winner's circle (Aug. 17 2024). He will probably wait further for a win as this task looks too tough. Qualified third in the Prix de Bourgogne.

#### 4. FAKIR DE MAHEY (REVE DE BEYLEV)

Driver: David Bekaert Trainer: Mathieu Mottier

Fakir de Mahey surprised basically all fans by qualifying fourth in the Prix du Bourbonnais and there are few factors that tell that he will end in the top in this race.

## 5. IDEAL LIGNERIES (REPEAT LOVE)

Driver/trainer: Jean-Philippe Monclin

Ideal Ligneries fought well among top trotters like Idao de Tillard and Izoard Vedaquais in several big races as a 3- and 4-year-old and it's not surprisingly that he has taken additional steps as an older trotter. Qualified as runner-up in the Prix de Belgique two weeks ago.

## 6. IT'S A DOLLARMAKER (SAXO DE VANDEL)

Driver: Matthieu Abrivard
Trainer: Sebastien Guarato

Trainer Sebastien Guarato knows how to win the Prix d'Amérique after his successful years with Bold Eagle and Face Time Bourbon. It's A Dollarmaker was the favorite in the Prix de Belgique and did it okay as fourth. Strong contender in the I-crop, but this objective might be too hard.

# 10. DIMITRI FERM (NAD AL SHEBA)

Driver: Gabriele Gelormini Trainer: Marco Azzaroni

Italian Derby winner Dimitri Ferm enters the Prix d'Amérique without any big successes at Vincennes in his prior starts. After two starts in B-races, without prominent performances, nothing points towards an Italian win.

# 11. HUSSARD DU LANDRET (BIRD PARKER)

Driver: Yoann Lebourgeois

Trainer: Benoit Robin

A driver who is everything but shy in races and a horse that handles tough trips, tough pace and speed. This is an interesting contender in the Prix d'Amérique and Hussard du Landret secured his spot already in the first B-race, in November 2024.

#### 7. JOSH POWER (OFFSHORE DREAM)

Driver: Eric Raffin

Trainer: Sebastien Ernault

Sulky dominant Eric Raffin chases his first win in the Prix d'Amérique, while trainer Sebastien Ernault knows how to be victorious in Paris. Ernault drove Oyonnax to victory in 2010 and now he has a great hope in Josh Power, who bested horses like Jushua Tree, Just Love You, Joumba de Guez and Justin Bold in the Criterium des 5 ans in September last year. Qualified by winning the Prix du Bourbonnais.

## 8. JUST LOVE YOU (LOVE YOU)

Driver: Alexandre Abrivard

Trainer: Laurent-Claude Abrivard

The Abrivard stable succeeded in the Prix Tenor de Baune as Just Love You claimed a safe win on the lead. A strong effort, but the qualification race did not include the very best horses in the crop. Still, Just Love You looked strong as she hit the wire as an outstanding winner.

## 9. INMAROSA (AMIRAL SACHA)

Driver: Leo Abrivard

Trainer: Laurent-Claude Abrivard

Inmarosa raced in all four B-races, without finishing in the top four in any of them. Her entrance in the Prix d'Amérique came via her earnings when Hokkaido Jiel had to drop out due to injury. Inmarosa will not be one of the most favored trotters in the field.

#### 12. EMERAUDE DE BAIS (REPEAT LOVE)

Driver: Franck Nivard
Trainer: Benjamin Goetz

Emeraude de Bais possesses qualities that very well could put her in front of the field when it all comes to an end. However, there is uncertainty about her form after the strange performance in the Prix de Bourgogne, where she made a break on the lead in the last turn. Qualified as the runner up in the Prix du Bourbonnais.

## 13. SAN MOTEUR (PANNE DE MOTEUR)

Driver/trainer: Björn Goop

San Moteur was set for the Prix d'Amérique last year, but had to stay in the barn due to an injury. After the runner-up-performance in the Prix de Bretagne, Björn Goop opted for a "normal" race in Sweden where San Moteur impressed big time. This is the hottest foreign challenger to the French favorites.

#### 14. DON FANUCCI ZET (HARD LIVIN)

Driver: Paul-Philippe Ploquin

Trainer: Daniel Redén

Don Fanucci Zet tried the Prix d'Amérique two years ago and made an incredible effort from the lead and finished sixth.

Vincennes' winner's podium still waits for the pacer-bred trotter from Sweden, but even if the results look mediocre lately, don't be surprised if Don Fanucci Zet fights for the top spots.

#### 15. AMPIA MEDE SM (GANYMEDE)

Driver: Vincenzo d'Alessandro, Jr

Trainer: Erik Bondo

Ampia Mede Sm was the queen of Vincennes two years ago when she finished second in the Prix d'Amérique and then followed up by winning the Prix de France and Prix de Paris. The horse left Thierry Duvaldestin's stable before the previous race, but Erik Bondo is hardly a magician, Ampia Mede Sm shows nothing that is enough for ending in top here.

#### 16. GO ON BOY (PASSWORD)

Driver/trainer: Romain Derieux

Could this be the year when it all happens for Go On Boy? The potential is there. The speed and strength is enough for beating them all, but the minus is that his trainer often saves the speed for the very last part of the race. With 17 contenders, there might be traffic problems, but if not, Go On Boy can be the winner.

#### 17. HOOKER BERRY (BOOSTER WINNER)

Driver/trainer: Nicolas Bazire

The Prix d'Amérique winner in 2023, Hooker Berry, sneaks towards the very high level he possesses. Ground saving trips mixed with more optimistic tactics have probably shaped Hooker Berry perfectly ahead of this year's Grand Prix. And the stable of Nicolas Bazire looks to be in great form as well.

#### 18. IDAO DE TILLARD (SEVERINO)

Driver: Clément Duvaldestin Trainer: Thierry Duvaldestin

Title defender Idao de Tillard's road to the Prix d'Amérique has not been completely straight. Three starts at the end of last year did not prove that Thierry Duvaldestin's champion was still No. 1 in France, but at the very end, in the Prix de Bourgogne on Dec. 29, Idao de Tillard showed that he's still impactful among the very best horses. Will probably be the favorite.

# FRENCH HARNESS RACING PREZ 1-2 IN PRIX BOLD EAGLE

The President of French harness racing, Jean-Pierre Barjon, had plenty of reasons to shine after Saturday's (Jan. 25) \$325,000 Prix Bold Eagle for 5-year-old trotters.

Horses like Koctel du Dain, Kana de Beylev and Ksar were some of the most merited participants in the prestigious race, that eventually saw first choice Koctel du Dain in front of the field.

Koctel du Dain was pushed to the lead and without arguing, Mathieu Mottier let the favorite pass him by as he sat behind **Kokote**. A pocket trip turned out to be just perfect for Kokote (Ready Cash). At the top of the stretch, racing room appeared for Kokote and Mottier noted that another white and green colored driver approached as the wire got closer.

Kote is owned by Barjon, as is second-place finisher East Asia (trained by Alessandro Gocciadoro and driven by Björn Goop). East Asia's finish was marvelous, but staged too late.

Kokote won the Prix Bold Eagle in a mile rate of 1:55.1 over 2,700 meters and Barjon could be satisfied that his two horses grabbed the top two spots. Gocciadoro's Executive Ek finished strongly between horses in third.

Four-year-old trotters battled in the \$325,000 Prix Ourasi and it was a thrilling event after top choice Lombok Jiel made a break in the first turn. Sebastien Guarato-trained **Frank Gio** (Face Time Bourbon) has been successful at Vincennes before and the Italian-bred trotter was served a nice second-over trip by Matthieu Abrivard and the three-wide attack was set in at the backstretch. When leader London made a break with a quarter-of-a-mile to go, Frank Gio got the advantage, but in a quite lazy style and far outside. Lombok Jiel came back after his early break and the last 100 meters turned out to be exciting. Lombok Jiel's finish was extraordinary, but Frank Gio held the favorite behind him as the wire was hit in a mile rate of 1:56.2 over 1.6 miles.

Guarato must have been quite satisfied with his day at Vincennes on Saturday.

The 3-year-old fillies met in the \$165,000 Prix Roquepine and Guarato's **Magic America** (Love You), paired with Eric Raffin, entered the winner's circle after a strong effort.

Favorite Melba du Gers made a break in the first turn, but repaired strongly as fifth for Jean-Michel Bazire.

Rain started pouring down with high intensity before Vincennes' last big race on the card, the \$115,000 Prix du Luxembourg, but the track held up well and the race ended with a 1:53.1 (mile rate) win for Laurent-Claude Abrivard's Inexess Blue (Vittel de Brevol), driven by Alexandre Abrivard. Inexess Blue did the dirty job three wide throughout the last turn and was just superior his opponents this day as he claimed his fourth consecutive win at Vincennes during the winter meeting.

# Lets Go Endofaera, Gruesome Twosome top Indiana award winners

The two horses were named Pacer of the Year and Trotter of the Year, respectively, at the Indiana Standardbred Awards Banquet.

The leading equines and individuals from Indiana's 2024 campaign were honored Saturday evening (Jan. 25) at the Embassy Suites Conference Center in Noblesville. The Indiana Standardbred Awards Banquet, sponsored by the Indiana Standardbred Association, Standardbred Advisory Board and Harrah's Hoosier Park Racing and Casino, recognized winners on both the pari-mutuel and fair circuits last season. Filly Lets Go Endofaera was named Pacer of the Year in the state, while colt Gruesome Twosome was tabbed Trotter of the Year.

Building upon a freshman campaign where she won five of 10 starts, homebred Lets Go Endofaera returned in 2024 as a dominant force in the Indiana Sires Stakes program. Conditioned by Tabatha DeLong, the JK Endofanera—Let's Go Higher filly claimed victory in two of her first three seasonal starts before reeling off seven straight wins. Driven by John DeLong, Lets Go Endofaera captured seven of eight sires stakes legs and was beaten by a neck in the \$250,000 Super Final. Bred by Jesse DeLong, who co-owns the pacer with son John and brother, Bo, Lets Go Endofaera hit the board in 15 of 16 attempts, registering 11 wins and earnings of \$420,140. The filly was also recognized as Indiana Sired Divisional Champion and Indiana Sires Stakes Point Champion.

Like Lets Go Endofaera, Gruesome Twosome was hard to beat in the Hoosier State in 2024. The You Know You Do—All Set Lets Go colt, owned by Ira Steinberg and Daryl Bontrager, scored wins in each of the five Indiana Sires Stakes legs he contested. After racing in the Canadian Trotting Classic, Gruesome Twosome returned to Indiana to rattle off seven wins in eight starts. His victories included the \$250,000 Super Final and open stakes The Pegasus, Circle City, Star Destroyer and Thanksgiving Classic. Bred by Merle Yoder, Gruesome Twosome banked \$468,228, and was also named Indiana Sired Divisional Champion.

JK Endofanera was selected as Indiana Pacing Sire of the Year after his offspring turned in a strong 2024 campaign. Led by the

aforementioned Lets Go Endofaera, the sire was represented by 225 starters that collectively tallied 517 wins and purse earnings topping \$7.2 million. Standing at Victory Hill Farm, JK Endofanera sired Super Final winners Can'ttouchthese (\$255,370) and Noblesville (\$269,396) as well as Indiana Sires Stakes Point Champions Brookview Fancy (\$151,105) and Hopeyaliketheshow (\$137,843). JK Endofanera was previously recognized as the state's top pacing sire in 2022.



#### **Harness Racing Update**

Swan For All continued his dominance in the trotting ranks, and Saturday evening he was named Trotting Sire of the Year in Indiana for the eighth consecutive season. Of the 198 starters to his credit in 2024, 141 of them were winners of a combined 413 trips to the winner's circle. The group collectively earned in excess of \$6.3 million, and Swan For All has now sired winners of over \$55 million in his career. Standing at Victory Hill Farm, his top performers included M-M's Dream (\$388,136), Super Final winners Skyway Paige (\$242,900) and Martz Seven (\$210,087) and Indiana Sires Stakes Point Champion Hail Broadway (\$240,620).

Victory Hill Farm picked up the hardware for Large Breeder of the Year for the 10th consecutive year. The LaGrange, IN farm was represented by 41 starters last season that earned just over \$1.4 million in the state and more than \$2.5 million nationally. Victory Hill-bred Coach Stefanos captured the Breeders Crown championship for open pacers while raising his career bankroll to over \$1.2 million. Other winners included Little Rocket Man, who has earned in excess of \$1.7 million lifetime, Indiana Sires Stakes final winner Walkin On Sunshine (\$147,714), All JK (\$114,889), Kaks The Boss (\$93,530) and This JK Rocks (\$93,062).

The father-and-son team of Bo and Pat DeLong were named Small Breeder of the Year for the second straight season. Last year, they campaigned six homebreds including sophomores Teelatini (\$177,606) and Tellmeitmatters (\$246,315), each Indiana Sires Stakes leg winners. Combined, their homebreds earned more than \$490,000 on the track. In addition, they partnered with Douglas Riccolo to breed and race Super Final winner Can'ttouchthese.

Trace Tetrick and Tyler George successfully defended their Harrah's Hoosier Park titles, and thus, earned top honors as Pari-Mutuel Driver and Trainer of the Year, respectively. For Tetrick, the award is his 11th consecutive. In 2024, he led all Hoosier Park drivers with 281 victories and over \$3.7 million in purse earnings. Nationally, he ranked 11th in wins with 417 trips to the winner's circle, with earnings approaching \$5.8 million.

George collected his fifth consecutive Hoosier Park training title in 2024. He sent out 138 winners over the 160 day meet, and accumulated earnings approaching \$1.6 million. His .407

trainer rating was one of the highest at the Anderson oval. Nationally, George sent out 191 winners while earning purses just shy of \$2.2 million.

Doug Rideout was named the top fair driver for the fourth consecutive year, but unlike previous seasons, he shares the award with Clint Coy. Both Rideout and Coy, who also works for the Rideout Stable, steered 61 winners throughout the summer to earn the title of Fair Circuit Driver of the Year. While Rideout has won multiple titles, this is Coy's first time atop the standings.

Conditioner Larry King edged Rideout for Fair Circuit Trainer of the Year honors. Rideout had put together a string of three straight seasons as the leading trainer, but King tallied 57 winners to his rival's 50 to claim the award. King, a regular participant on the Indiana fair circuit, twice collected seven wins on a program last summer, notching six wins on another occasion. He also scored Governor's Cup consolation victories with Vel Mr Backfire and Vel Wat A Longshot.









# THE VIEW FROM WOODBINE MOHAWK PARK

with MELISSA KEITH

On Jan. 6, the U.S. Trotting Association announced the introduction of graded stakes for North American harness racing. Two Canadians — Woodbine Entertainment senior manager of communications Mark McKelvie and Standardbred Canada president/chief executive officer Darryl Kaplan — took part in meetings of the 11-member Graded Stakes committee, which was originally formed in 2023. They are serving three-year terms that expire in 2027.

While Mohawk is not the only Canadian racetrack to have signature stakes with graded rankings, it leads North America

by the number of Grade 1 races this year, with a total of 12. The 2025 Breeders Crown also takes place at the Campbellville, ON showplace on Oct. 24-25, bringing the number of Grade 1 stakes at Mohawk to 24 this season.

The dozen Grade 1 Mohawk stakes are the Metro (2-year-old open pacers), Shes A Great Lady (2-year-old filly pacers), Mohawk Million and William Wellwood Memorial (2-year-old open trotters), Peaceful Way (2-year-old filly trotters), North America Cup (3-year-old open pacers), Fan Hanover (3-year-old filly pacers), Canadian Trotting Classic (3-year-old open trotters), Elegantimage (3-year-old filly trotters), Canadian Pacing Derby (open pace), Roses Are Red (filly and mare pace), and the open Maple Leaf Trot.

There are three Grade 2 stakes at Mohawk this season: the Goodtimes (3-year-old open trot), Milton (filly and mare pacers), and Armbro Flight (filly and mare trotters).

Aside from the Breeders Crown, Mohawk will play host to 28 graded stakes in total this year, including the following Grade 3 events: the Nassagaweya (2-year-old male pacers); Champlain divisions for 2-year-old male and female pacers and trotters; Eternal Camnation (2-year-old filly pacers); Somebeachsomewhere (3-year-old open pace); Casual Breeze (3-year-old filly trotters); Simcoe divisions for 3-year-old male and female trotters and pacers; and the Mohawk Gold Cup open pace.

Woodbine's vice-president of standardbred racing Bill McLinchey recently weighed in on the grading of harness stakes, which he called "a nice surprise." He said that the new system held promise because it formalized the relative value of major races.

"I don't know if it comes from us being maybe just a smaller industry [than North American thoroughbred racing], but we all knew the stakes and we assumed everyone else, whether you were buying or racing horses or running a racetrack, all knew which stakes held importance," McLinchey said. "I had given it some thought, why we hadn't [graded stakes before], and I would say that we probably just assumed that everybody just knew which ones were considered at the top."

McLinchey added that graded standardbred stakes would be more readily understood by thoroughbred owners, bettors, fans, and media already familiar with the concept.

"I know I can speak from Woodbine, a company where we are dual-breed, and our people on the thoroughbred side, when they saw the list come out with the number of Grade 1s we had, they said, 'That's pretty amazing that you've got that,'" McLinchey said. "They knew the names of our [Mohawk] stakes, but they maybe didn't know quite the importance that those stakes had in the industry."

Communicating the prestige of winning certain races matters more than ever, with formally-assigned grades removing ambiguity. Races restricted to horses sired or foaled in certain states or provinces can become "restricted graded races" according to the new rules, based on purse and other criteria, but not full-fledged graded stakes.

"I think that it probably just helps define it better for people, as we're attracting new owners," McLinchey said. "The money in our industry for purses is different now than it's ever been, where some regional sires stakes are going for the same amount of money Grand Circuit races are, and we're seeing horses opt for a sires stakes race instead of a Grand Circuit race."

The Canadian dollar is being taken at par with the American dollar for the purpose of deciding stakes status.

"I think that it is important that they did that, because there is a level of prestige that comes with our races," McLinchey said.

The Mohawk stakes that earned Grade 2 or 3 status were logical choices, in his view.

"I think I understand where they came from for the grading of those races," McLinchey told HRU. "Participants look at a race like the Nassagaweya or the Eternal Camnation as prep races for the bigger races that are down the line, those being the Metro and the Shes A Great Lady. While those races are stake races and they carry a really nice purse, they're still prep races for the bigger pot later in the season."

Woodbine's VP of standardbred racing said he thought the committee "hit it pretty close" in the inaugural year of the new North American grading system.

"I'm sure some people would look and say that there could be some adjustments made, or 'Why isn't this race Grade 2 when it should be?', but for the most part, I agree with what they came up with and there's always going to be debate, no matter which races you look at," he said.

"The good thing is, they're open to change, and they defined their process. I was able to attend the race secretaries meeting with Mark Loewe, and he presented it to us. He **laid out the process** that they had, and I respected their process and was overall pretty satisfied with how Mohawk got graded."

Calling the graded status of races "a promotional tool," McLinchey said he welcomed the dozen Grade 1 Breeders Crown finals returning to Mohawk later this year. He said



preliminary internal meetings about marketing the 2025 divisional championships had already discussed "getting it out there that this is now a Grade 1."

The 2025 Mohawk Million (Grade 1) has already attracted significant interest from owners of 2-year-old trotters.

"People started reaching out pretty well immediately after the release went out," McLinchey said.

He added that this year, a limit of three slots can be acquired per owner.

"I'm assuming we'll have more than 10 people put their names forward to purchase a slot," he said. "Each person will only be allowed one slot at that time. With the same price point as last year, we're fairly confident that we're going to have to have a draw for the 10 slots."

The nomination fee (\$25,000 CDN) is due Feb. 18, with the \$25,000 sustaining payment due June 2.

"Really, what we've tried to do with Mohawk's 2-year-old stakes is make Mohawk the destination to race your 2-year-olds," said McLinchey, in reference to the Mohawk Million as well as the Hambletonian Society's ungraded Tompkins-Geers Stakes, which moved there last year.

"People start with the Tomkins-Geers [June 26 and 27], which had been struggling to fill at some of the tracks that they've been going to in the States. In conversation with [Hambletonian Society president/CEO] John Campbell, he asked us if it was something we would consider giving a try at Mohawk, and we were interested. We thought, 'Why not try to give the 2-year-olds a stakes race early in the year, right after they qualify?'

"The funny thing was, Bob McIntosh won it last year, and we were lucky enough that Bob was at the races that night. It was great to see him win it. Doug McIntosh was there also, and both commented that they raced in these races all over North America at different tracks, and it's great that it's finally at Mohawk."

Bob McIntosh died on July 28, 2024, after winning the June 27 Tomkins-Geers for 2-year-old trotting fillies with his trainee Incantation. It was his final stakes victory.

# Once a student, Tony Beaton has become a master

Recently, Casie Coleman said, "Tony [Beaton] was a major asset to my team for many years. He started as a groom for me and moved up the ladder to become the main assistant trainer in the operation. He is now on his own and trains horses for me as one of his owners. He is a fantastic horseman and is very smart at figuring horses out. I'm comfortable having my horses in his stable. I know that he is not only a great trainer, but I also know that he is going to do best by the horse for whatever they need to become their best on the racetrack.

"If I didn't trust him the way I do, I would not have been able to back off and step away from the racing part of the business as I have done."

The quote "It was the best of times. It was the worst of times," from A Tale of Two Cities by Charles Dickens, would best describe the year that Beaton experienced in 2024. Actually, the beginning of the "worst of times" began on Oct. 12, 2023 when two anonymous texts were sent to an Alcohol and Gaming Commission of Ontario (AGCO) official alleging that a young horse in Beaton's stable had been cruelly whipped by the trainer resulting in injury to the horse.

The commission scratched all the horses trained by Beaton from participating in the Ontario Sires Stakes Gold Super Finals at Mohawk the next day. Then, the AGCO handed Beaton a two-year suspension. This resulted in his stable being unilaterally disbanded and Beaton being put out of business.

"I thought that was most unfair," Beaton said recently. "They wanted to punish me and they did. They immediately left me out of the means to earning a living. Worse than that, though, was they punished the owners of the horses who earned their way into the Super Finals and in no manner could have been complicit in the false charges which they brought against me.

"What they should have done, if they felt there was some way that those horses and their connections were somehow responsible for what God only knows, was allowed them to race and held up the purse money pending a fair and just hearing on the situation. Of course, they didn't do that.

"I was without the means to earn a living for 111 days until my appeal was heard. I was eventually exonerated. Now looking



back at it, I just want to forget it ever happened. My wife Lisa and I lived through hell for almost four months."

Then what most might describe as a miracle transpired. From the depths of despair, the stable and the lives of the Beatons came together, to once again become a force to be reckoned with not only in Ontario racing where the stable became the one which most reasonable observers would say reigned supreme, but it also was prominent in North American Grand Circuit racing. Legendary Hanover became the fastest 3-year-old in North America in winning the Meadowlands Pace (with stablemate Nijinsky finishing second), Nijinsky won the North America Cup and Redwood Hanover won Quebec's signature event, the Prix d'Ete, among numerous other prestigious events.

There were many, including myself, who considered Beaton as a shoe in for this year's O'Brien Award as Canadian Trainer of the Year.

For some unanswered and undefinable reason, he was not even included on the ballot to be nominated for that prestigious honor.

Beaton, true to his nature, is rather quiet, but obviously quite hurt by the exclusion.

"There is nothing I can do about it," he said. "What's done is done. Like the suspension, I'm just putting it in the rearview mirror. All I can do is just go on with life and do my very best and hope for the best."

# Which brings us to the present and your 2025 stable. How is it made up?

"Right now, we have 49 head in training here at Classy Lane Training Center. Of these, 26 of them are 2-year-olds. All of the 26 are pacers. I suppose that is a remnant of my years with Casie Coleman. We hardly trained any trotters there. Casie had one or two over the years but she liked pacers a whole lot more."

Speaking of Casie. You worked with her for a long time. She speaks very highly of you. Together with Andrew Harris, in addition to all the champions she has raced, she considers you two to be the human equivalent to her equine greats.

"I owe a great part of any success I've achieved to Casie. She is as great a horse person as anyone that ever sat behind a horse. She loves horses as do I. Anybody who works for Casie better have a love for the horse or they won't be there for long. She is a great role model. She is a very hard worker and is very detail

oriented. Just look at what she has done for my stable. She picked out broke and trained Legendary Hanover, Nijinsky and Linedrive Hanover. There are some good horse trainers who have never had one single horse as good as any of those three. Casie had all of them at the same time."

# All of your big three won't be back this year. Only Nijinsky still remains in training. Tell us about those three boys.

"Thankfully, Nijinsky is coming back to race. I expect him to be the star of the stable. The two other stalls of our big three will be difficult to fill.

"Legendary Hanover has been retired to stud and Linedrive Hanover has been retired to a life of leisure to live out his days at Anvil and Lace Farm.

"How would I describe them? They are all extremely talented but quite different.

"Nijinsky is the perfect racehorse. You can race him any way you want to. He can leave. You can sit him in a hole. He can take air if necessary. When you say go to him that is what he is going to do.

"Legendary Hanover is a big, strong and very athletic horse. He has extreme speed. Once you wind him up and get him going, he is going to be gone.

"Linedrive Hanover might quite possibly have been the best of these three great horses if only he had been sound. He had issues which bothered him throughout his racing career. He was never lame, but he was never completely sound. When I think of him, I think it's a darn good thing he is a gelding, because even as a gelding, he can be more than a handful."

# What does the 2025 racing season look like from your present vantage point?

"Well, it would be extremely difficult to do as well as we did last year, but we sure as heck are going to try. Right now, the 2-year-olds look to be an impressive group. All 26 of them are still on the go and are doing well. Of course, at this point we are just building a foundation. Once we start going fast miles with them, they will undoubtedly separate themselves. For the next several months we will continue to dream.

"We hope that come summer and fall, that some of those dreams will be satisfied. I'd like to extend my thanks to all my friends, colleagues and owners. Wishing everyone the best of luck in 2025."

# Meadowlands Hambletonian drivers, Part 1

There have been 44 years of Hambletonians at The Meadowlands, so here are the first 20 of 44 facts on drivers who have participated in America's Trotting Classic in New Jersey.

- 1. Erik Adeilsson is the youngest driver to make it to the New Jersey Hambletonian elims at 20 years nine months. He finished seventh with Easy Lover, a son of Mack Lobell, in the 1995 elims.
- 2. Ron Pierce won the first Hambletonian/million dollar race for an African American trainer, Milton Smith, in 1993 with American Winner. Pierce also did the same on the pacing side, seven figures, for George Teague in 2006 taking the North America Cup with Total Truth.
- 3. Six drivers in the 21st century and nine overall in NJ who won the Hambletonian were born in the U.S.: Tommy Haughton, Stanley Dancer, Ben Webster, Ron Pierce (three), Eric Ledford, Roger Hammer, Ray Schnittker, Brian Sears (three) and Tim Tetrick.
- 4. Two drivers from the 1960s who drove in the Hambletonian are still with us. Bruce Nickells, 97, on July 5, made his debut in 1964 with Scribe Rodney (seventh) and Art Hult, third with Speed Model in 1967.
- 5. Just Dave Magee and Stefan Melander had a lone Hambletonian drive and were favored. And it happened consecutively. In 2000, Dreamaster was fifth at 9-5 for Magee and then \$3.40 to win for Melander in 2001.
- 6. They were leading men in 1999, to say the least. The top four drivers in order of finish in the Hambletonian won the last fourteen driving money titles, 1999 included. Mike Lachance won with Self Possessed, John Campbell was second with Angus Hall, Luc Ouellette was third with Enjoy Lavec, and Jack Moiseyev was fourth with Raffaello Ambrosio.
- 7. Only Ron Pierce won twice during the 2005-12 period, when the Hambletonian went for \$1.5 million, with Donato Hanover (2007) and American Winner (1993).
- 8. Has the leading dash-winning driver of any year also won the Hambletonian the same year? Yes. In 1991, with 769 victories, Jack Moiseyev led the pack and handled, for the very first time, Giant Victory to a Hambletonian score for Per Eriksson.

- 9. Speaking of dash-winning leaders, right before Aaron Merriman's streak of 10-straight, he was third in his lone Hambletonian drive with Il Sognos Dream at 90-1 in 2014.
- 10. Who was the sports leading money per drive leader in 2004-05? Trond Smedshammer. That's right, the last trainer/driver to have a Triple Crown winner with Windsong's Legacy (2004) was up and over \$8,100 per start.
- 11. Who drove the first 200-1 shot in any Meadowlands Hambletonian? Jim Miller in 1982 with Bone Meal at 274.40-1 finished sixth.
- 12. Who did the youngest Hambletonian winning driver Tommy Haughton, 25, drive the following year in the Classic after winning with Speed Bowl in 1982? TV Yankee who was second and then sixth in the final.
- 13. Who did Jimmy Takter send out in the 1989 dead heat Hambletonian? Classic Air was eighth at 259.20-1.
- 14. The 1989 dead heat Hambletonian was Howard Beissinger's swan song 20 years after his stirring debut with Lindys Pride in 1969 winning the Triple Crown. Beissinger was fourth with Shogun Lobell, but, the \$90,480 check was more than Lindys Pride's \$62,455.
- 15. The years 1989 and 1990 were the last that a 60-year-old or older driver cashed in back-to-back Hambletonian. Howard Beissinger was fourth in 1989 at 63 and in 1990 Carl Allen, 60, was third with Royal Troubadour and Stanley Dancer was 63 and fourth with King Of The Sea.



16. Anthony Quartarolo won more thoroughbred races at The Meadowlands (51) than standardbred races (38), but he drove and trained the even-money favorite in the 1984 Hambletonian in his heat finishing sixth with Speed Merchant.

17. The finish of the 2000 Hambletonian was quite unique. The top seven drivers had never won a single Hambletonian prior, while the last three had won nine. It was Trevor Ritchie, Jim Meittinis, Ray Schnittker, Cat Manzi, Dave Magee, DeWayne Minor and Daniel Dube with Ron Pierce, John Campbell and Mike Lachance rounding out the field.

18. Dan Shetler got money in the 1986 Hambletonian finishing fifth with Express Ride. Now 75, he's the only driver from that final still active today.

19. The all-time top five dash-winning drivers have 446,218 drives among them and 85,084 wins, but Hambletonian trophies are not a part of all that winning. They — Dave Palone, Tony Morgan, Aaron Merriman, Herve Filion and Cat Manzi — have a combined 12 finals and four checks.

20. Thirteen times since the Hambletonian moved east has a driver been favored while winning for the very first time: Tommy Haughton (\$4.60) in 1982 with Speed Bowl, Bill O'Donnell (\$2.60) with Prakas in 1985, John Campbell with Mack Lobell (\$2.20) in 1987, Bill Fahy and Ron Waples (\$2.10) in the 1989 dead heat with Probe and Park Avenue Joe, Ron Pierce (\$3.20) with American Winner in 1993, Mike Lachance (\$2.80) with Victory Dream in 1994, Mal Burroughs (\$2.60) with Malabar Man in 1997, Stefan Melander (\$3.40) with Scarlet Knight in 2001, Ray Schnittker (\$2.80) with Deweycheatumnhowe in 2008, Brian Sears (\$2.60) with Muscle Hill in 2009, Andy McCarthy (\$2.80) with Ramona Hill in 2020 and Yannick Gingras at odds-on in 2024 with Karl in his Hambletonian breakthrough.

John Campbell that is. He had not yet driven in the Hambletonian despite being a two-time Meadowlands leader and national earnings leader, too. Eighteen different drivers participated and somehow no one thought to utilize the services of the soon-to-be all-time money leader (1987) and of course the all-time Hambletonian king.

By the way, this is not Monday morning quarterbacking, because I ranted right then and there on that weekend 43 years back.

To further this oversight/absurdity/total joke, three veteran drivers made breaks with brand-name horses: Robert Williams with Diamond Exchange (last), Del Miller with Arndon at 6-5 (eighth) and Frank O'Mara as the day's biggest favorite at 1-5 off-stride and ninth.

Was Campbell really poolside for these bellyflops?

Oh, just in case you didn't notice, Diamond Exchange was trained by Chuck Sylvester. The same Chuck Sylvester with Pine Chip, Mack Lobell, Armbro Keepsake and Britelite Lobell all with Campbell.

It wasn't until the next year that Campbell did drive in the Hambletonian, and surprise, he won right out of the box with Joie De Vie from post 12, second overall money at days end. It would be 34 years until he was not in a Hambletonian elim/final again.

# You can wager on virtual harness racing at U.S. online sportsbooks

In the early 1990s, the advent of simulcasting was dramatically changing the landscape for harness racing in North America. Suddenly, you could bet on races from around the world being contested at any time during the day thanks to satellite technology.

The internet furthered this smorgasbord of racing product to where there's hardly any time during the day when you can't get action on some form of horse racing. What little void there was has since been filled by historic harness racing machines in some states, though you still have to leave home to play those machines.

With virtual harness racing, there's no need to change out of your pajamas. You can bet on the races from the comfort of your own sofa. And the virtual harness races are in operation 24/7, ready and waiting for whenever you want to access them. And you can wager on virtual harness racing via some U.S. online sportsbooks.

#### **HOW VIRTUAL HARNESS RACING WORKS**

Have you ever loaded a computer sports game, either on your laptop or mobile device, or perhaps a game player and then let the computer play out the game while you watched to see

the outcome? If so, then you've already got yourself a pretty fair handle on what it looks like to watch and wager on virtual harness racing at an online sportsbook.

Virtual sports are computer-simulated games. All outcomes are determined by random number generators. Even the site hosting the virtual harness race and offering betting on it has no idea which virtual horse will be the winner. Other than the person placing the bet on the outcome of the event, there's no human element involved in the equation. The action that you will be betting on is a 100 per cent computer-generated simulation.

State gambling regulators view betting on virtual sports to be the same as wagering on a slot machine. The technology employed to operate both devices is virtually identical in design.

The technology for virtual sports is hardly new. There were versions of computer-generated games dating back to the early 1960s. They began to increase in popularity in the 1980s as software technology advanced and the games were gaining more realism. The arrival of online sports betting in the USA in 2018 opened an avenue for betting on virtual sports to be exploding into prominence.

#### **HOW TO BET ON VIRTUAL HARNESS RACING**

Wagering on a virtual harness race isn't much different than betting on the real thing. You pick the number, or numbers of the horse or horses you want to back in the race. Win, place and show wagering is available. You can also bet exactas, trifectas and guinellas.

We opted to check out a virtual harness racing card being offered by Bet365. The racing was coming to us from the fictional Etruria Gardens. The race we opted to bet featured fictional horses and drivers. Ron DeVore was behind Over Ordered, while Richie Floater was at the controls of Anapple Aday.

There are plenty of factors that make virtual harness racing appealing. For one, the action is rapid. Races go off every three minutes. There's no need to pour over a program in search of a perceived edge to bet. Just pick out a number or color for your horse and place your bet.

Virtual sports are computer-simulated games. All outcomes are determined by random number generators. Even the site hosting the virtual harness race and offering betting on it has no idea which virtual horse will be the winner. Other than the person placing the bet on the outcome of the event, there's no human element involved in the equation. The action that you will be betting on is a 100 per cent computer-generated simulation.

Wagering on a virtual harness race isn't much different than betting on the real thing. You pick the number, or numbers of the horse or horses you want to back in the race. Win, place and show wagering is available. You can also bet exactas, trifectas and quinellas.

Each virtual pacer or trotter will be assigned odds representing that horse's chance of winning the race. The betting line assigned to each horse also represents what percentage segment that horse occupies on the random number generator wheel. As with real racing, if you choose the favorite, your percentage chance of winning will be higher, but your odds will be lower.

The simplicity of virtual harness racing is also its beauty. So much of what occupies a handicapper's time leading up to a race is virtually thrown out the window, so to speak. Form charts, statistics, track and weather conditions, late scratches — all key elements in wagering on real harness racing — are irrelevant in virtual harness racing.

# WHERE TO BET ON VIRTUAL HARNESS RACING IN THE USA

As noted above, Bet365 is very prominent in the virtual harness racing game in the U.S. online sports betting market. The British-based bookmaker has been operating virtual sports for years, so this is a site that's well-schooled in how to create virtual harness racing competition.

In truth, virtual sports haven't become as popular in the U.S. sports betting market as they are in Europe. Part of the problem, industry insiders believe, is because many of the sports being offered tend to be more popular across the pond than they are on American soil. Bet365 is ramping up its product to cater to the American audience, adding virtual football, baseball and basketball.

Both BetMGM and BetRivers were launching virtual sports in 2024. Each bookmaker did its virtual sports deal with Inspired Entertainment, Inc., which unfortunately doesn't offer a harness racing product as part of its virtual sports line.

BetRivers has even come up with a method to blur the lines between virtual sports and real sports. Among the virtual sports offerings at BetRivers is NFL Alumni Virtual Football. This game features computer-generated versions of actual retired NFL stars.

In some cases, you might be looking in the wrong place to find virtual sports action. For instance, at BetMGM, the company includes its package of virtual sports as part of the BetMGM online casino.

# **Leading owners at Ontario tracks, Part 2**

Last week's edition of All Over Ontario delivered the first quarter of a four-part series spotlighting the leading owners at Ontario racetracks in 2024.

The inaugural column covered the throne-holders at Hanover Raceway (Robert Jenkins, Jr., William Burgess, and Jeffrey Kelly), Dresden Raceway (Cameron McQueen), and Georgian Downs (A1Stable).

This week, in Part 2 of the grassroots series, All Over Ontario applauds the accomplishments of the title-holding owners at **Kawartha Downs** (Amanda Riley), **Flamboro Downs** (Triple S Equine/Carl Kuepfer), and **Clinton Raceway** (Larry Lane).

The three ownership groups will be among the 24 honored in a special presentation alongside the best and brightest in Canadian harness racing at the 36th annual O'Brien Awards on Feb. 8.

Each awardee will receive a custom plaque and a complimentary ticket to the ceremony, as part of the Owner Recognition Program.

All three will first receive their flowers from Harness Racing Update, beginning with Kawartha's top-rated owner, Riley.

A third-generation horseperson, Riley learned the trade of racing horses with her mother Brenda Lane and uncle Garry Bye.

The Roseneath, ON-based owner/trainer translated a lifetime of lessons into success this past season at Kawartha, where she inspired her troops to record 12 wins, three more than the nine recorded by Kuepfer's Triple S Equine, across 28 starts.

Riley's racers tacked on five seconds and five thirds to amass an earnings total of \$35,288.

However, her connection to the neighboring Fraserville, ON oval is one that extends far beyond numbers on a stat sheet.

"It's pretty cool because it's our local track, and it's the closest track in Ontario to our farm," said Riley. "It's got a really fun atmosphere – like an old school feeling with more laid-back racing. My husband and I grew up together there, so it holds a special place for both of us."

Riley's husband, trainer/owner Tom Riley, himself had a career year in 2024 guiding his charges to 66 wins through 331 starts.

Together, the husband-and-wife team that first met at Kawartha as youngsters, have four children of their own: Lane, Blake, Kennedy and Holden.

Amanda's star pupil on the track was 9-year-old pacer Majestic Virgin, whom she purchased for around \$5,000 USD through on Gait.

The bay daughter of Always A Virgin—Fox Valley Tulip accounted for nine of Amanda's dozen Kawartha tallies, exuding resolve, grit, and an indomitable spirit along the way.

"She had bowed a tendon, and then the previous owners put her on onGait," Amanda said. "I rehabbed her, we brought her back and then raced her three or four times, but she broke down again, and I rehabbed her."

Another bowed tendon and arduous rehabilitation followed, but the tough times brought Amanda and her prized mare closer together.

"She's the biggest sweetheart – I'm not usually a mare person," Amanda said. "I prefer geldings, but she's laid back and loves her work. She stresses me out, though, when I race her, because of the tendon issues. But then she'd go out, and just kept on winning. She's really fun to have. I'd have a whole barn full of her, maybe just a little bit sounder.

"She's high maintenance, but you don't mind looking after them when they look after you. That's my favorite kind of horse to have, too. One that needs a little extra bit of attention because I like to spend the extra time on them."

About 200 kilometers (125 miles) south west of Kawartha, at Flamboro Downs, Triple S Equine was busy pacing the Dundas, ON track's owner colony.

Kuepfer, the man behind Triple S Equine, found this past season at the half-mile oval to be a reprieve during a season stricken by unfortunate bounces.

"Overall, it was a tough year in the business," Kuepfer said. "I never thought we'd hit this mark given the year we had. My focus tends to mainly be on our Woodbine Mohawk Park numbers, and that side of it wasn't great this year – lots of tough luck. But I'm certainly happy to hoist top honors for Flamboro."

Kuepfer has been in the equine business for about 15 years now. In 2010, he started his own horse marketing business, Shooting Star Stables, before testing the waters on the racing side in 2017-18.

Around 2020, Kuepfer decided it was best to keep the racing side separate from the marketing side, thus giving way to the inception of Triple S Equine.

He quickly learned over that time what comes with a life in the standardbred sphere.

"Like I'm sure all people in this business find it to be, you have good times and then also times that are not so great, but it keeps it interesting," he said.

Smooth Lou, a 9-year-old pacer bred by Brittany Farms, provided several big moments down the stretch for Kuepfer and Triple S Equine.

The son of Sweet Lou—Smooth Silver collected 10 wins across 24 starts at Flamboro in 2024, including three straight in October to help secure the top spot for Triple S Equine.

Overall, Smooth Lou sports a 31-18-11 line, for \$270,847, across 112 lifetime starts.

In addition to the effusive praise he bestowed upon his savvy veteran bay, Kuepfer took a moment to express his gratitude to the conditioners who have had his back.

"I must give a huge thank you to each and every one of my trainers over the last few years," Kuepfer said. "I've been fortunate to make a lot of great friends and many more great memories. I'm thankful for all the guidance, encouragement, and positive comments over the years, it has been a great influence."

The third and final member on this week's leading owner highlight reel is Clinton Raceway's chart-topper Lane.

The Goderich, ON-based horseman put together a strong showing at Clinton's past meet, winning nearly half of the contests his pacers and trotters competed in.

Across 20 starts at the southwestern Ontario track, Lane's racing roster compiled a 7-2-4 slash line. Altogether, the group banked \$19,254.

His seven wins outpaced a quartet of owners tied for second place with five.

"Being actively involved with these organizations I don't work at the barn in the mornings, but I'm always a phone call away. I'm happy to come in whenever they need an extra hand, especially on busy training or qualifying days."

This past Christmas, Meadow was gifted a piece of her own horse.

"Her name is Sunflower Hanover [Tall Dark Stranger—Salsalito]." She said. "She's incredibly special to me because I was the one who picked her out at the Harrisburg sale. I watched her video and went to see her. I fell in love with her and convinced my dad to bid on her. The next morning, she was in our barn. I'm really excited to see what she accomplishes this year and can't wait to watch her grow and develop.

"I feel so blessed to be doing what makes me most happy. I feel like I'm just getting started and focus on learning everything I can about the industry — whether it's marketing, content writing, grooming, breeding — you name it. The sky's the limit. I truly believe the sport has so much potential and I want to play a key role in making it thrive again."

# The Concord Grapes versus Diamond Creek Devil Cats?

Why doesn't our sport attract more people? Empathy is a huge culprit.

Empathy is:

- Understanding a person from another person's frame of reference.
- Vicariously experiencing another person's feelings, perceptions, and thoughts.
- The ability to recognize, understand, and share the thoughts and feelings of another person or fictional character.

You may notice each definition contains the word people. Horses are magnificent animals, but they are not human. Without empathy, our growth as a sport is limited. The special sauce from emotional connections that we form with other athletes and teams does not transfer to horse racing.

We all want a good story. Empathy is a critical ingredient in any good story. Sports are personal stories of struggles, overcoming challenges, and setbacks with individuals or teams of people as the focus. We vicariously experience journeys and emotions using our sports as avatars. Humans can share experiences. We may have played the sport at some level, making it even more relatable. Fans of teams, leagues, sports, or even individual players can create communities based around people.

The key word is people. The more humans are involved in a sport like ours, the more likely other humans will find a footing. Beneath those helmets and familiar colors, our drivers help a little, but not enough. We need more people, from our farm workers to highly invested owners and everyone in between, to create more empathy, stories, and engagement – but how?

After two margaritas and two hours on Taco Tuesday at Tortilla Town Mexican Restaurant, here is an idea for harness horse racing. I am selecting some people in our sport as stalking horses (a stalking horse is a figure used to test a concept or mount a challenge anonymously on behalf of a third party).

The following conversation is FICTIONAL.

Imagine that Adam Bowden and his sidekick Shaun Laungani, a pair of fun, intelligent, competitive fellows, have just finished shooting an episode of Trackside Chat (Big thumbs up for the show). They are sitting around talking smack.

Suddenly, Adam has an idea: "Of all the yearling trotters we consigned or sold as agents, what 2-year-old trotters do you feel will earn the most money in 2025? I'll make a list of eight. You make a list. We will make out cases and whittle it down to our final eight."

And they do.

Looking at the final eight, Adam says, "These are the Diamond Creek Devil Cats. I'm calling five other farms, maybe seven, and asking them to do the same thing we did."

"Why?" asks Sean.

"Let's organize a league."

"For what?"

"For fun, for fans to relate to, for interest stimulation, and the hell of it."

"You want to create a competition between breeding farms."

"Yeah, every farm gets a franchise and gives the franchise a name like...

The Hanover Hailstorms

The Winback Warthogs

The Crawford Crawdads

The Blue Chip Monks

The Hunterton Hyenas

The Southwind Silverfish

The Concord Grapes."

Shaun asks, "What are the parameters of this insanity?"

"Very simple, only trotting yearlings they sold or consigned make up their draft pool. Each farm staff drafts eight now 2-year-olds in training to formulate their team roster. The farm team must stick with these eight trotters all season with no substitutes, so there will be attrition. They must submit their roster on April Fools' Day.

"The farm teams have nothing to do with training or trainers. Like other sports teams, there will be a website with team rosters. Before the season begins, each team will create a website highlighting their horses and some staff members who helped raise them. Once the racing season begins, the earnings will be posted and updated. The team with the highest aggregate earnings at the end of the racing season will win the title."

"What title?"

"A massive old, repurposed Bowling Trophy from a yard sale with the words: Major Farms Earnings Recruits Championship of 2025."

"No money."

"Nah, not yet. It will probably cost a few bucks to find someone to set up and administer the league, but damn, it would be fun, and the bragging would be awesome."

Shaun shifted from skeptic to supporter, "Posting the undated League standings on a site like HRU would be cool. I could see regular fans gravitating to the league, and regular folks could get to know the farm members and other people and attach faces to the team horses."

"Those of us in the breeding world would have fun. The question is, would other people find a league like this intriguing? What would tweak their interest or make them care?"

Shaun said, "Not sure, but a league with people cheering for a farm, the home state of the farm, the staff, or owners would have lots of opportunities to create human connections. I can't see any downsides."

Adam added, "During racing season, a list with all the team horses scheduled to race should be available weekly. People would have horses to cheer for and against. People who tune in to cheer for their team may wager or get involved in ownership."

"And more people will become attached to the stories of the trotting horses, their breeding staffs, the trainers, and the drivers that are part of their teams. I could see side bets among friends on the various teams."

"Who knows, maybe in the future, fans could place future wagers on teams like the Warthogs and Devil Cats."

Would something like this work? Nobody knows, but then again, everybody knows what will happen if we don't try crazy stuff like this.

# 'Queen' reigns at Big M

**Queen Of America S** had little trouble overcoming post 9, as well as 2-1 second choice (and stablemate) Finite, in the sixth race feature, a \$17,500 conditioned trot.

Sent to the gate as the 1-5 public choice, "The Queen" left alertly before taking a brief tuck around turn one, then followed Finite down the backside. Queen Of America S had the lead while parked at the half in :56.4.

After clearing, the 5-year-old daughter of Father Patrick—Red Rose America then trotted past three-quarters in 1:25.1 before a final panel of :28.3 finished off an overwhelming 51/4-length romp in 1:53.4. Finite finished second with 143-1 shot Bright Expectation third. The top two finishers are trained by Ron Burke.

Queen Of America S paid \$2.60 after winning for the second time since her arrival on American soil.

"She's a really nice mare," said winning driver Yannick Gingras. "They just got her from Sweden. Ronnie was high on her. So far, so good. She's delivered.

"I figured we could take the lead and take it from there. It was the move to make. I got away fairly close. The hope [is to take on the better trotters later in the year]. I think she's going to keep improving. It was pretty easy on her tonight. It's a big step to take to go to the higher levels, but I think she has the ability to do it."

**SAMPLE REIGNS IN KING:** DeShawn Sample must have forgotten to check the tote board, because 44-1 shots aren't supposed to win with the ease that **Second Bruiser** did in the fifth race. But Sample and "Bruiser" fired to the top and led at every call on the way to a three-length romp in the Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Remembrance Race, an event that featured five African-American drivers.

Sample was elated at winning, and was pumped as an African-American to compete in a race that honors the greatest civil rights advocate in American history.

"My horse was strong," said Sample. "It means a lot to compete

in this race [honoring Dr. King]. I traveled from Delaware to be here. It means a lot to the black guys."

There will be prizes for the top three finalists, and a guest race calling opportunity for the winner.

Entries will be judged by a panel of USHWA harness racing media members and race callers: Ken Warkentin (Hall of Fame Meadowlands race caller); Garnet Barnsdale (DRF Harness, Ontario Racing Tips from the Pros); Ghislain Paquet (Quebec Circuit Regional des Courses de Chevaux race caller), Melissa Keith (Rideau Carleton Raceway race caller), Nathan Bain (Leamington and Dresden Raceway race caller), Mark McKelvie (Woodbine Mohawk Park senior manager of communications), Edison Hatter (Yonkers Raceway race caller), Jeff Porchak (Standardbred Canada director of digital communications), and Conley Ecclestone (Grand River Raceway handicapper/timer/photo finish operator).

The defending 2023 champ is Grady Hachey. We welcome both young veteran race callers and any young people who want to try out their skills and receive valuable feedback from the judges.

#### **Rules:**

- 3. The race call can be in English or French.
- 4. The race call can be from a pari-mutuel race, a fair or matinee race, a qualifier, or calling a replay. Calls from actual races/qualifiers are preferred.
- 5. Because not everyone gets a chance to call a race from a booth, we will accept video recordings made by the entrant or someone recording their informal race call. This could be a call made while at the track or watching the races from home.
- 6. The race calls can be submitted in the following ways:
- a. Sending a link to a video posted on a track or racing organization's website, YouTube, or social media account.
- b. Uploading and creating a link to a race call video and submitting the link (e.g. Google Photos).
- c. Sending the video as an mp4 file to a Dropbox set up for the contest.
- d. Sending a full description of the race/qualifier (track, date, race number) and where to find the video online (e.g. replays on an ADW site) if it is not posted on a track website or social media.
- 7. There is no fee to enter.
- 8. The winner (by points) will receive an opportunity to call a race at a racetrack where one of the contest judges is a track announcer. They will be treated to a meal for two at the track, free programs, and swag/souvenir items (which vary by track). If the winner cannot make it to a participating racetrack, the contest organizers will help arrange a similar prize experience at a more convenient racetrack.
- 9. Second- and third-place finishers in the contest will also receive prizes.
- 10. Deadline for entries: Monday (March 31, 2025). Entries should include the race caller's name, age, contact information (mailing address, email, phone), link to race call (where applicable), and preferred track to visit if they win the contest.
- 11. Entrants must be current USHWA Youth members (any chapter), renew their membership, or apply to join USHWA as a Youth member when they enter the contest. New Youth memberships are sponsored, so there is no fee to sign up.

# Gural responds to suggestion races should go off every 10 minutes

(In response to this Wire to Wire column from Jan. 19):

I agree we would do much better on-track if we could run the races quickly like we do the baby races, but, unfortunately, that would destroy our off-track revenue. I actually proposed this to the horsemen at Tioga to see if they would go along since I have a casino and I don't rely on racing revenue. Unfortunately, they rejected the idea because they don't have enough help. Quite often, apparently, they will have one groom paddocking three horses and going every 10 minutes would be impossible.

As far as the comments from Christopher Fenty and H. Earl Paulson, I totally agree that the drag is an insult, but we have tried twice to get all of the tracks that have casinos to go along with reducing the drag and no one is interested. I can assure your readers that if we get a casino at The Meadowlands the drag will disappear, and we will also lower the takeout rate so that our customers have a better chance of winning. I also want to make it clear that I am optimistic that we will get a casino at The Meadowlands once the downstate casinos open [in New York]. People have told me that a casino there would be extremely successful because of the location. It is possible that even if we could get the constitution amended that someone else would get the license, but hopefully that will not happen.

It would really help if the industry could work together as it is very frustrating that I was able to get NYRA to put our races on TV as part of the NYRA Bets product and [SOA of New York president Joe] Faraldo still will not let people bet on the races that they are watching. How stupid is that?

In any case, I am totally committed to keeping The Meadowlands afloat and, while we will lose millions of dollars in the next two years, I am reasonably optimistic that at the end of the day we will have a casino, and our racing product will once again be the best in the world with no drag and a lower takeout.

# More on the on-track experience

The most important factor of saving harness racing from total irrelevance is getting people back to track. I've been following harness racing since my very first day at Liberty Bell Park, on the 28th of October in 1970. I remember the days of huge crowds for a weekend card at the races. Even Mondays and Tuesdays drew respectable crowds wagering decent handles.

I met John Campbell around five years ago at Sun Stakes Saturday at Pocono and engaged him in a brief discussion. His basic belief was that attempting to draw people back to track was an effort in futility and that the good old days were long gone and never coming back. I disagreed then and still do today, now more than ever.

You did have some good ideas, but that's just a beginning and just begins to scratch the surface. There's so much more that can and should be done if this sport is to survive. As it stands now, any state legislature, at any time, can decouple or rescind slot subsidy laws, which, like Pompano, would mean sudden death for any tracks in that state. Pocono and Harrah's Philly would fold immediately and I can't help but think Mohegan Sun and Harrah's would be thrilled to death if that happens. It wouldn't shock me in the least if they were actually lobbying for it.

One major problem is that most of the big dollar breeders and owners are in it soley for the money only, without any concern for the sport's long-term success. I know all about the competition for the gambling and entertainment dollars, but there's a very old idiom stating that "competition separates the men from the boys." In other words: Only the strong survive.

Over the past few years I've talked to many people that don't even believe that harness racing still exists. It's said perception is reality and with every track closing, many people believe the sport, like the tracks, is gone for good. Unless and until there's some type of national promotion/marketing programs to once again popularize the sport, it will all come to an end when Jeff Gural throws in the towel or the states end the subsidies.

At any rate, you at least made the effort to stress the urgency of the problems facing harness racing. Probably, like most times when this issue is addressed, your article will most likely fall on deaf ears, but at least you tried.

So, dragging out post times and taking over four hours to complete a racing card is too long to keep the interest of many fans. I also agree there are now so many so called big races that they hold less interest and betting than in years past. Other than the larger races at The Meadowlands and maybe the Little Brown Jug the amount bet is not much higher than a higher class claiming or allowance race.

Tracks should maybe look into fewer big races but higher purses for their overnight races. This may also help in more competitive racing on track which fans would support with more betting.

Other than that, I also feel the heavy traffic and higher tolls on the turnpike has also hurt on track attendance. With more betting coming in from off track it is correct that a \$3 million handle does not generate the revenue The Meadowlands needs to survive, especially since they only race two times a week. The casino issue also is correct. With the constant expansion of casino gaming, even that is becoming less profitable on a per property basis and newer casinos would be at a disadvantage of having to account for the higher cost of their new construction. Let us hope The Meadowlands does not go down as the last harness track to close after Freehold.
