OHHA initiative aims to drive Jug purse to \$1 million

The Ohio Harness Horsemen's Association will pay the yearling nomination fee to the Grand Circuit races at the Delaware County Fair for all Ohio-sired foals registered.

At last month's Ohio Harness Horseman's Association's (OHHA) annual banquet, board president Steve Bateson used his time at the podium to not only look back at the previous year's success, he also looked forward to the future by announcing that the OHHA and the Little Brown Jug Society had entered into a new initiative to promote Ohio foals.

The OHHA will be paying the yearling nomination fee for all Ohio-sired foals registered by Dec. 31, 2022 to the Grand Circuit races – the Little Brown Jug, the Jugette, the Old Oaken Bucket and the Buckette – at the Delaware County Fair.

Since 2019, the OHHA has been a financial supporter of the Little Brown Jug and Bateson and Little Brown Jug society president Tom Wright were looking for a way to gain extra benefits for Ohio breeders and, in turn, possibly increase the Jug purse to \$1 million.

"Steve and I have been talking about this opportunity for a couple of years," Wright said. "We are so grateful for the OHHA's support and we thought this would be a benefit that wouldn't cost them additional money. The Jug Society would just receive a portion of their sponsorship money two years earlier."

The goal of the program is simple, if all Ohio yearlings are eligible it would be expected that more owners would make the 2- and 3-year-old payments. More sustaining payments equal more money for the purses.

Over the past three years, an average of 150 Ohio breds were nominated to the Little Brown Jug. With an estimated additional

300 yearling colt pacers eligible, and based on past sustaining percentages, the LBJ Society hopes for 100 additional 2-year-old payments (\$500 each) and 33 3-year-old payments (\$750 each) and five additional starters (\$7,000 each) – an estimated \$127,000 towards the LBJ purse.

Similar percentages could increase the purses for the filly companion Jugette and the Old Oaken Bucket and Buckette trots by a combined \$150,000.

"A couple of years ago we revised our supplemental requirements for the Jug and Jugette," said Wright. "Our ultimate goal would be to get the Jug purse to that million-dollar mark. We still have some work to do, but this new Ohio-bred program is a great start."

The yearling payment program is another outside the box' initiative by the OHHA. The past few years have seen the association televise races at all 65 Ohio county fairs, promote their 'Racing with the Stars' tents and host several Charity Nights to name a few.

"The OHHA has been relentless in their promotion of our industry and the horsemen and horsewomen of the state of Ohio," said Wright. "This is another example of their dedication to keep Ohio in the forefront."

The past few years, a couple of Ohio's top sophomores were not eligible for the Delaware Grand Circuit events due to a missed yearling nomination, most notably last year's top Ohio pacers Charlie May and Heart Of Chewbacca.

"We always want to have the best horses eligible and to compete in our events," said Wright. "Ohio-breds are making noise on a national level."

In the 2021 Breeders Crown events, Ohio-breds were led by Ocean Rock (winner of the older pace), Gulf Shores (second by a nose in the 2-year-old colt pace), Charlie May (beaten by a length in the 3-year-old colt pace), Sea Silk (third in the 2-year-old filly pace) and Pebble Beach (third by a 1 ¼ lengths in the freshman colt pace).

The last Ohio-bred to win the Little Brown Jug was the 1988 champ, B J Scoot.

"I can't wait for the next Ohio-bred Little Brown Jug champion," Wright said.







Feds charge that PED case involves 30 harness tracks

In a document known as a Bill of Particulars, the government has compiled a long list of what it says are victims in the matter involving the alleged use of performance-enhancing drugs in harness racing by five individuals currently under indictment. The list includes 30 harness tracks where defendants Richard Banca, Rene Allard and Thomas Guido III raced and, allegedly, used PEDs.

When denying a motion from the defendants' lawyers to throw out the indictment, U.S. District Judge P. Kevin Castel ordered prosecutors to provide the defense counsel a Bill of Particulars. A bill of particulars is a written document in which a party has to explain the allegations in his/her complaint, or petition, in more detail.

The indictment covering Guido, Banca and Allard also includes Louis Grasso and Donato Poliseno, both of whom the government charges were distributing illegal drugs. Poliseno was the owner of a Delaware-based veterinary supply company and Grasso is a veterinarian.

The five have been charged with one count of drug adulteration and misbranding conspiracy and face up to five years in a federal prison.

This particular indictment does not include anyone associated with the thoroughbred game, which is why the list of victims includes only harness tracks.

The Bill of Particulars charges that in order to avoid detection of their administration of PEDs, the defendants had to defraud and mislead government agencies, including racing regulators, racetracks, pharmacies, border officials and the betting public, which made all of the above victims of their conspiracy.

The alleged doping was apparently so widespread that it took place at nearly every harness racetrack in North America. Top tracks such as the Meadowlands, Yonkers, Woodbine Mohawk, the Red Mile and Harrah's Philadelphia Casino & Racetrack made the list as did numerous smaller tracks such as Charlottetown Driving Park, Hiawatha Horse Park, Ocean Downs and Batavia Downs.

The victims also include numerous state and provincial agencies such as the New Jersey State Racing Commission and the New York State Gaming Commission. It also includes agencies in states where there is no harness racing, such as the Iowa Racing and Gaming Commission and the Texas Racing Commission.

The government said that the defendants manufactured, purchased, sold, shipped, delivered, received and administered "at least thousands of units of PEDs..." According to the Bill of Particulars, Poliseno, Grasso and Allard allegedly placed orders for prescription drugs at numerous pharmacies. In a show of the extent they would go to acquire the drugs, Poliseno, Grasso and Allard allegedly used 40 different pharmacies, including ones in Alabama, Idaho and Texas.

Still, other victims include the Food and Drug Administration, the Drug Enforcement Agency, U.S. Customs and Border Protection, Canada Border Services Agency, and the United States Trotting Association and additional government agencies such as state veterinary boards, state pharmacy boards and state departments of health.

In other developments involving the on-going doping scandal that has rocked thoroughbred and standardbred racing, harness trainer Rick Dane Jr. has changed his plea to not guilty and awaits sentencing. He was charged with one count of conspiracy to commit drug adulteration and misbranding and one count of conspiracy to defraud the United States.

Trainer Chris Oakes, who had close ties to convicted thoroughbred trainer Jorge Navarro, will be sentenced Friday. Oakes, 57, pled guilty to one count of misbranding and drug adulteration with intent to defraud or deceive and faces up to three years in prison.

Why I believe International Moni will be the hot 2-yearold sire of 2022

Also, if I'm coming back as a horse...

As a rule, I follow the maxim that even a fish wouldn't get into trouble if he only kept his mouth shut. But here this fish is going to open his mouth and predict that International Moni is going to be the hot sire of 2-year-old trotters this year. I'm going partly by what I've heard from two top trainers, Jimmy Takter and Randy Jerrell, partly from intuition.

International Moni is a Lindy homebred, by Love You and out of the immortal Moni Maker. Until she was bred to Love you, Moni Maker was the trotting world's best example of the total disparity between her phenotype and her genotype.


Moni's phenotype was the living great mare that could win over \$6 million on tracks all over the world. We've never seen a better race filly and race mare, and we may never see her likes again.

But her genotype, her genetic profile, bore no resemblance to her greatness on the racetrack. She had a number of foals, all

by leading U.S. stallions, and they were, at best, ordinary. Only when she was mated with Love You did she strike gold. For my part, a lot of the gold she struck in International Moni is owed to Love You. He has proven over and over again that his genetic deck only has high cards when it comes to the speed gene.

There's also something else at work here, which I readily admit I don't understand. To produce an International Moni, both the sire and the dam have to come up with high speed gene genetic cards. There is something indefinable that gives a certain stallion the ability to cause a certain mare to match his high speed gene with one of her own.

Love You crossed on Moni Maker is one example of this. Bred to a raft of other stallions, Moni Maker failed to contribute anything that would produce a top horse. That only happened with Love You.

Another example of the same kind of synergy occurred with Amour Angus and Garland Lobell. We know Garland was a high card horse who improved every mare he was bred to. But he also had an indefinable ability to make a mare like Amour Angus match his high card speed gene with one of her own. Hence, Andover Hall, Angus Hall, and Conway Hall.

In my youth, I saw the same thing with Dancer Hanover and Romola Hanover. As a sire of racehorses, Dancer Hanover's only top horses were the three that he got with Romola Hanover. On the other hand, she was a good producer, but she only produced greatness when she and Dancer engaged in hanky-panky. When they did, the results were named Romeo Hanover, Romulus Hanover, and Romalie Hanover. All three of them were the best of their respective generations.

Back to International Moni, he was a top colt at 2, my year for defining future sire success, and if he hadn't been run into in the final, he would have won the Hambletonian.

The Antonaccis, consummate sportsmen, brought International Moni back at 4, where he totally disproved Jeff Gural's premise that no horse should be retired at the end of his 3-year-old year.

Paying the steep physical price that any high-powered campaigns at 2 and 3 will exact, International Moni was just another racehorse at 4. By my estimate, racing the horse at 4 cost Lindy Farms between half a million and a million dollars in breeding fees and sales of syndicate shares.

What was true of International Moni will be true of virtually any colt who competes successfully in the big stakes at 2 and 3. My dear friend, the great Canadian vet Dr. Melissa McKee, has told me in detail of the physical damage hard racing does to a young horse. Gural has done many great things for our sport. He would do one more if he got rid of his rule regarding the progeny of horses that went into the stud at 4.

Baffert's just desserts

On a totally different subject, Bob Baffert finally got his just desserts, or at least what passes for them in Kentucky. Meaning that Medina Spirit was taken down as the Derby winner, Baffert got some days, and he was fined all of \$7,500 for doing his bit to destroy the pristine image of the biggest thoroughbred race in the world.

Although Baffert was the trainer of record, all the actual, dayto-day training was done by one of his second trainers. The guy is anonymous, at least to me, but at the least Baffert needs to impress on him the need to read the ingredients of anything he decides to rub on a horse's backside.

I also remember another one of Baffert's horses flipping over in the paddock before his stablemate won the big dance. It's amazing that this doesn't happen more often. A horse's mouth and gums are sensitive, and any pain there will cause them to flip. When you put a chain over the gums when a horse is bridled, there needs to be a very light hand on the lead shank. If I'm coming back as a horse, please, Lord, not as a thoroughbred.

The origin of Camptown Races

Finally, a long overdue explanation of that great American folk song, Camptown Races. Camptown was the original name of Freehold, NJ. It has got to be the home of one of the oldest trotting tracks in North America, since it was flourishing in 1850, when Stephen Foster wrote the song.

For the record, the "Bob tailed nag" the singer bet his money on was the great trotting mare Flora Temple. She set all kinds of world's records, at all kinds of tracks for Hiram Woodruff and James McCann, and she had a bobbed tail. And the next time I'm in New Jersey, I'll invite Bruce to go to the track with me, and we'll bet with both hands on the first bob tailed mare we see.

How 21st century marketing works

Harness racing fans will be marketed to in never-before-seen ways.



Over the years we've all heard the lament that harness racing has not marketed itself enough. There are no newspaper ads, no billboards; direct mail campaigns don't exist. And of course, with the Internet, there are no banner ads. It's like the sport was in a vacuum.

I tend to agree with some of the complaints. As Google trends charts show, this sport is swimming upstream: General interest in harness racing is less than half of what it was 17 years ago. A lack of attention in these matters comes with a consequence.

How do companies or verticals tackle a falling or stagnant customer base in 2022? Marketing is marketing, but today the products and mediums are very different from even five years ago. In fact, some are pretty mind-blowing.

Picture a 30-something man who at some point in the past has searched for sports scores or sports gambling products. He's at home watching an on-demand network show or live TV on his Roku or Android box while lounging on his couch. At the commercial break, he's one of only two or three people in his entire neighborhood that's served a harness racing ad.

"I haven't seen one of those before," he says.

Later that day he decides to go for a drive; the weather is great and he's bored. He looks down, and seeing he's close to empty, he stops for gas. While pumping his \$4 a gallon liquid gold, he hears a voice and glances over to see another harness racing commercial on the pump's video screen.

"That's odd, I just saw one of those", he says.

After filling up he notices an ice cream shop across the street, and since it's such a great day he decides to indulge in a double scoop of rocky road. While enjoying his treat he surfs the *New York Times* website to catch up on the news, and lo and behold he gets served another harness racing ad. This static banner – like ones you and I have seen a million times — lets him know the first post at the Meadowlands is in one hour.

"That's only a mile away, and I haven't been there in years. Why not go?" he thinks.

If this sounds like a Philip K. Dick novel, it's not. This marketing is happening right now. A person is targeted via an audience based on their behavior, he or she is shown an ad via their targeted location, and then from that IP address they can be targeted again through remarketing on their mobile phone where ever they are.

What's perhaps even more interesting about this medium is that our friend who ended up going to the track can be targeted again, anytime the weather is nice and he's near the Meadowlands (or any other racetrack for that matter). And, our machine can analyze our targeted user and based on his characteristics and behavior, target new users who are just like him.

The world has certainly changed, and marketing has along with it. A newspaper ad in 1990 was served to everyone; a TV ad during the Nightly News hopefully reached someone you wanted.

Now marketers can serve ads to you whether it's rainy or sunny or snowy with a weather API; to people around stores, stadiums or racetracks with geo-fencing. And they can target audiences that are more likely to visit their store, or buy their product, or visit their event with incredible behavior-based accuracy.

It might sound like science fiction, and maybe it's a bit creepy. But it's easier than ever to find potential harness racing fans and bettors and market to them. The old marketing mediums and tactics are on the cusp of becoming ancient history.









A rare in-depth look at harness racing's Mr. Everything Jerry Glantz

I have been after my friend Jerry Glantz for well over a year trying to get him to agree to let me profile him. It took until a time when he was almost at death's door before he agreed.

"Jer," I would plead without success, "You've done just about everything there is to do in the sport other than training and driving the horses themselves. You began as a fan — however not just an ordinary fan, but a fan possessing the greatest enthusiasm. You've also been a race secretary, a handicapper, an announcer, an owner, a breeder, a horse agent, a racing manager, the head of an USHWA Chapter, involved with a horseman's group and likely other capacities that do not immediately come to mind. You are part of the history of the sport, especially where it concerns the greater New York area, inclusive in addition to Monticello and Florida."

The answer that I always received were words to the effect, that he has always been a private guy, one who was adverse to the spotlight.

Imagine the surprise to this scribe when he received an unsolicited email from his friend saying that he was now ready to talk about the career that has consumed his entire working life.

Little did I know then that my friend was facing open heart surgery with an uncertain outlook regarding his future on the planet.

Of course, I said yes.

It has now been a few weeks since the surgery and Jerry is well on his way to a full recovery.

You are a true lifer in the sport. Where, how and when did it begin for you?

"I was seven years old. My dad was in the car business. He also loved the horse business. He wasn't much of a gambler. But he loved to bet on the horses. His standard bet was four, four — four

dollars to win and four dollars to place. He would take me to Yonkers Raceway to watch the horses train in the morning. Mornings were the only times I could go, because at that time kids were not allowed to go to the racetrack at night. It was literally love at first sight. I loved everything about it, especially the horses. My earliest recollection of being involved was when my dad took me with him to this place called Goshen, New York. He was going to buy a horse in partnership with a man by the name of Joe Potash. Mr. Potash was a fairly prominent owner at the time and a real character. His greatest claim to fame was as the owner of a true junior free-for-aller in the Billy Haughton stable by the name of Grand R. Volo. Together with Potash, dad bought half of a horse by the name of Harry M for the grand price of \$500. Harry M did pretty well. As I recall, he won five of the 16 races that he raced in for them.

"From that time forward, dad always owned small parts of mostly nondescript horses. The last person I remember training for him was Buddy Kummer.

"I became more involved. My dad fancied himself a decent handicapper and he was. However, within a short period of time, I became a better one. Dad put out a tip sheet at Yonkers, but I did the handicapping for it. He'd regularly take me to Monticello where he was friends with Phil Tully. Phil would hide me out in the program department where I could follow the races.

"I was always a pretty big kid. By the age of 13, I could pass for 18 and became a regular attendee at Yonkers and Roosevelt. Most people would find it hard to believe knowing how big a

guy I am now, but I had a picture of Del Insko driving Henry T Adios with me sitting on Del's lap.

"As I previously mentioned, my dad was in the car business and sold cars to many of the horsemen. I soon became acquainted with many of them."

You have great love and respect for Adios Butler. How did that come about?

"Probably because Paige West who owned half of him would buy his cars from my father. Anybody who saw Adios Butler race in his heyday would realize that he was thought of and performed in the same mode as horses like Albatross, Niatross, Nihilator and Somebeachsomewhere are thought of today. He was beyond special. Not only did I follow him fervently throughout his racing career, I followed just about every foal he ever sired and often their foals as well. He is maybe the only horse from that era who I think for a given distance might have possessed the incredible speed that some of our best today have."

Were you in school while all this was going on?

"At the age of 16 I was attending the Brooklyn campus of Long Island University. I managed to get along there. But I wasn't interested in school. I wanted to become involved in harness racing as a full-time vocation. In 1973 or '74, I wrote just about

every racing secretary in North America looking for a job in a race office. I received only one response. That came from Ralph Swalsky, then the secretary at Monticello. He interviewed me. He wanted me to continue my schooling, but he instructed me to report for work on the first Monday after the school year was over. I was to be paid \$90 a week. I lived in a bungalow colony near the racetrack. In addition to working in the race office, I wanted to soak up everything about the racetrack I could possibly absorb. Max Brewer was the race caller and I hung round him and tried to learn all about his craft. Max also ran a harness racing school where the basics of horsemanship were taught. I enrolled in it and learned all that I could about the physical contact with a horse. How they were rigged, shod, equipped, just about everything that I could possibly absorb. Even though as a child I needed speech therapy, I wanted to become a race announcer. I patterned myself after Max who I considered to be the best I'd ever heard. I still look upon Max as being one of the best race announcers ever."

So you completed a season in the race office at Monticello. What came next?

"Swalsky was in a difficult position. Leon Greenberg, who was in charge of Monticello, was the worst excuse for a decent human being that I've encountered in all my time on this earth. On second thought, he might have been 1A with David Brooks who I had the misfortune to work for, for a very short period of

time later on in my career. It seems that Greenberg thought that Ralph should be able to do all the race office work by himself and save the \$90 a week that they were paying me. Although Ralph didn't actually fire me, he strongly suggested that I look for something else to do. I found myself without work.

"Shortly thereafter, I received a call offering me the job as the race announcer at Monticello. What happened to Max Brewer?" I asked. He died, I was told. Max Brewer, my idol, had passed away at the terribly young age of 39 from a heart attack.

"On the one hand, I was heartbroken and terribly sad to lose my mentor. On the other, I was being offered the job of my dreams. Of course I took the job.

"I worked as the race caller at Monticello Raceway for the season of 1975.

"During my tenure there, Allen Finkleson — if not the finest human being ever, was certainly one in the ranking, and one of the greatest PR people in the history of our sport — had enough working for Leon Greenberg and was offered a better position in just about every possible respect to become the public relations director at Pompano Park. He accepted the post. Greenberg told him if he left Monticello, he would get even with Allen. How would he get even with Finkleson? He knew that Allen and I were very close. Allen had taken me under his wing and become somewhat of a father figure to me. Because Greenberg knew, it would hurt Allen, he fired me. He not only fired me, but he also told me that was the reason why. I know it sounds crazy, but that is exactly what happened."

Then what happened?

"I struggled. I brokered some horse deals and made enough money to just get by. Four months later, I got a phone call from Allen. He said, 'Get your sorry ass down here right now! Roger Huston (then the race caller at Pompano) is going to work at The Meadows. I want you down here to audition for his job.' I don't know how long it took me to get there, but it was quick. I got to Pompano. They put me in a room above the track kitchen. I guess I auditioned for the job, but I really don't remember doing so. The job was mine. I was in heaven. I'd spend my mornings watching all the great stables — Haughton, Dancer, Miller, Sholty, Castleton — pretty much every major Grand Circuit Stable and a raft of Hall of Famers, humans and equines. I could not have been happier, nor could I be living a happier existence.

"I was their race caller for seven years. I had the great thrill of calling Niatross' last race there. We had 19,000 people to see it. Two of my best friends, Jimmy Rankin and Nick Salvi, had horses in the race to go against him. In the off season, Pompano had a quarter horse meet whose races I called until they gave up on quarter horses. In the fall, I became the Time Trial Director at the Red Mile. I was also the president of the Florida Chapter of USHWA for one of the years I was in Pompano."

Then?

"Ed Gorman was leaving The Meadowlands. I was invited to audition for the job. I was told it came down to Tom Durkin and me. Tom deservedly got the job. I was once again unemployed. They

say the more things change, the more, they remain the same. Lew Krongold had been the announcer at Monticello. He quit. Leon Greenberg was gone. Leo Doobin was now the general manager. Thanks to Allen Finkleson, I was offered the job. I was back where I started. I was calling races and selling horses in whatever spare time I had. I was there from 1978 through 1984 with no increase in salary. I went to Doobin and in effect asked for a raise. I was told that was the salary for that job. The wage was not flexible. There would be no raises forthcoming. Since there was no foreseeable future, I left Monticello and started buying and selling horses full time to keep me going. I had pretty good success. I bought Bo Scot's Blue Chip who at the time was a C3 pacer for big money from Jimmy Rankin. Jimmy had told me that he thought he had the makings of a very good horse. I liked what I saw and bought him for a client. He became a top horse. I did well with a few others.

"In 1985, I got a call from Barry Lefkowitz. He told me the Roosevelt Raceway announcer's job was available. Did I want it? Do dreams come true? Of course I wanted it. I interviewed with Barry Goldstein and Bill Hopkins. To my everlasting regret, my father passed away shortly before I became the race caller at Roosevelt Raceway. I was still brokering horses and decided to set up an agency just adjacent to Roosevelt Raceway. I invested pretty much all the money I had in setting it up. No sooner was I open for business than without any notice given Roosevelt Raceway was shut down. There was no notice given, nor were any of the employees given any compensation. I had to begin anew.

"I was broke. Tony Mannino, a friend, had a wealthy client who bought a beautiful farm in Ocala. We went into business together. Tony had bonded with Nick Sodano who was a very hot trainer at the time. Tony prepared all of Nick's babies until they were ready to begin racing. We bought relatively cheap horses and developed them. We did that for several years and did well enough. Among them was Haifalator who I bought for Fred Schwartz. He won the Niatross and we sold him to Frank Popfinger for a lot of money.

"I made a few bucks, invested my funds wisely, took up golf and continued to buy and sell horses.

"Eventually, the horse bug bit me again. Tom Audley offered me a great-looking Florida bred who I fell in love with and bought for \$5,000. His name is Keemosabe. He made me a lot of money, but more than that, the thrills I had with him were beyond description. I absolutely love that horse. He has a forever home in Maine now. I still keep regular tabs on him.

"I'm a regular attendee in the mornings at Sunshine Meadows. A few years ago, my long-time friend Myron Bell had an Artspeak

homebred named Themysteryisover that I bought a piece of. He turned out okay, but just okay. The following year, his dam Mystery Game had a Captaintreacherous half-sister that Myron said was a beauty. He offered me 10 per cent and I bought in, sight unseen. When she got down to Florida, I saw her and fell in love. I asked Myron if I could buy another 10 per cent. He generously acquiesced. Her name is Don't Fence Me in. She may not have been the best 2-year-old pacing filly last year, but she was undoubtedly the best horse I have ever owned. She took a record of 1.50.2 and earned slightly shy of \$350,000 last year. She was worth too much for an average guy like me to own, so I sold her for what I thought was a good price. I wish her new owner every possible success with her."



Brad Ferguson relishing opportunity to continue training for Don and Rosie Eash from new base at Hoosier Park

Last winter, Brad Ferguson regularly shipped to Miami Valley Raceway from Don and Rosie Eash's Greenfield, IN farm. Circumstances have changed, as Eash and his wife sold their property and moved to Gilcrest Training Center in Bell, FL. Now Ferguson is stabled at Harrah's Hoosier Park, managing a string of five racehorses and a 3-year-old in training for Eash Racing Stable. The 36-year-old is relishing the opportunity before him.

"It's a lot of work. It really is. But I'm not afraid to work, so that's okay," Ferguson said recently. "I'm just glad that Don has given me the opportunity and has enough trust in me to run the operation. We're doing well and the horses are doing well. It's a lot some days, trying to get everything done and get them shipped over and race, but it seems to be paying off."



Ferguson was first introduced to racing at the age of 18 when family friends invited him to come and work with a few horses. He began cleaning stalls, and that early experience led to a job grooming five horses for trainer Roger Cullipher. Ferguson has worked for several Indiana-based stables, but caught on with Eash Racing Stable six or seven years ago.

"I really enjoy working for Don and Rosie. Don has given me plenty of opportunities to grow in this business. He gives me opportunities to drive and train a lot and be around a lot of horses and learn quite a bit," he said.

Case in point is the arrangement this winter. With Eash and his wife transitioning to their new home at Gilcrest, and with Hoosier Park offering winter training for the first time, Ferguson remained in the Hoosier State to continue racing. Eash enters the horses while Ferguson schedules the training and racing from his home base at Hoosier Park.

"He left me with five racehorses and a 3-year-old filly that I'm getting ready. They took the rest of the 3-year-olds and babies to Gilcrest to focus on getting them ready," said Ferguson. "It's just a little different operation this year."

So far, the arrangement has worked well. Pacing mare Rose Run Vision has proven the standout for the stable, winning four of six seasonal starts. In back-to-back weeks the Time To Roll—A And Gs Finest 5-year-old has captured the \$30,000 filly and mare open at Miami Valley. She wired the field to win by a length-and-a-half on Feb. 15, tripping the timer in 1:53.1. In her most recent start (Feb. 22), Rose Run Vision and Trevor Smith scored by a length in 1:51.1 after receiving every call.

"She's a pleasure to be around. She really likes her job, you know. Just a nice mare. She does everything you ask her to do. She's gotten really sharp here this winter," the conditioner said.

Rose Run Vision began her career on the Indiana fair circuit as a freshman. Four of her five wins that season came at the fairs. At 3, the filly captured seven of 22 attempts, and as a 4-year-old she blossomed. Starting 35 times in Indiana and Ohio, the pacer collected seven wins and hit the board 22 times in total. Bred by Rose Run Farm, she took a mark of 1:50 and banked \$128,720 in 2021. This year, she has amassed \$65,000 in six trips behind the starting gate, and her career earnings are now \$254,792.

"Over time it seems like she's really come into herself and developed to be a nice mare. I think it took her a little time to grow and figure it all out," Ferguson said. "She takes care of herself really well. When you jog her and train her, she never picks up the lines. She just does everything with ease."

Rose Run Vision is on an impressive streak, but she is not Ferguson's favorite in the barn. That honor goes to trotter ER Kim. The Encore Encore mare is a homebred that turned 6 in January. In four seasonal starts, ER Kim has picked up a win and

two runner-up performances in the Buckeye State.

"I've had her since she was a yearling. She was kind of tough. She was tough to get along with, but she's developed into a very, very nice trotting mare," Ferguson explained. "I get to drive her every week. Don lets me drive her. I've always been the one to train her and groom her. I've always been around her, and she's just grown on me."

Ferguson steered ER Kim to two of her six victories last season, and he was again in the bike Jan. 12 when she collected her 15th career trip to the winner's circle. The mare is closing in on \$200,000 in career earnings.

"Once I went to work for Don, he gave me the opportunity to drive and I get to sit behind a lot of different horses and get a feel for it," the horseman added.

Someday Ferguson would like to operate a stable of his own. Today, however, he is content to work for Don and Rosie Eash and make the most of the opportunities he is given.

"They're just great people to work for. Easy to get along with. They trust you and let you do your job," he said. "Don gives you opportunities to grow. I've just grown into this business; it's something I've come to love."

Danielle Copeland – Unsung hero

My favorite subject to write about is the unsung heroes in our sport — the grooms.

The dedicated, loving, and committed people who care for the horses and spend more time with them than owners, drivers and, most of the time, the trainers.

A groom / aka caretaker is like an au pair for they step into the role of a parent, while the parent cannot be there.

Caretaker Danielle (Dani) Copeland works at the Melanie/Pete Wrenn Stable.

Born and raised in Michigan, Copeland, a fourth generation horsewoman — on her dad's side — started going to the barn at an early age.

"I got my first license to groom in Michigan when I was 14, but attended the fairs and paddocked before then," she said. "I've worked for my parents, Vinny and Teri Copeland; trainers Jeff Cullipher and Trent Stohler, and for the past few years I've worked for Pete and Melanie Wrenn.

Harness Racing Update

"I've been very lucky to have taken care of several champion horses, such as Chin Chin Hall (at age 2), Guinevere Hall and Swingforthefences.

"Among the major highlights is when Chin Chin made it to the Breeders Crown. He was the first horse I had cared for that made the Grand Circuit. He didn't finish top three, but I was so proud of him.

"I've loved them all, but I guess you could say my favorite is Guinevere Hall or Swingforthefences. Guinevere was a monster: winning eight-for-eight, an Ohio Triple Crown winner, and she established a new world record (on a half-mile track) of 1:53 in the Ohio Sires Stakes at Northfield Park.

"Swingforthefences won the Super Final for 3-year-old trotting colts and geldings at Hoosier Park in 1:53.1; my first horse to go over half-a-million in earnings in a year, and was named Trotter of the Year at Hoosier.

"All of these horses were unbelievable and I couldn't have been prouder if I had owned them myself.

"When they leave the barn, for they either are sold, claimed or being bred, I am sad for I get very attached. It's hard not to when you are with them every day. I try to keep track of where they go or keep in touch with whoever is taking care of them at the time and try to see them when it's possible.

"In fact, I recently went to visit Guinevere at Hunterton Farm where she is living her new career as a mama. She is due with her first foal in the spring and when I saw her she was as big as a house.

"As much of a bitch as she could be in the barn, with me, we had a deep bond. When I went to Hunterton I called her name and she came running to me.

"There is nothing more gratifying and heart-warming than this."

Copeland has worked with trotters and pacers, but prefers trotters.



"I prefer trotters who seem to be a little more difficult to get along with, for I usually have more luck with them. I like the ones who have their own unique personality or require a little more attention.

"As far as mares or geldings, I really don't have a preference. Currently, I'm caring for three studs/geldings and three mares — only one being a pacer.

"The only thing about trotters is, of course, they make me more nervous to watch.

"The scariest time I had with one of mine is when a horse I was taking care of went down with driver Jason Dillander at Hoosier Park. The horse in front jumped over something on the track and she fell, and my horse went over top of her. I hate when things like that happen and most people don't realize that at any moment an accident can occur for these animals are going extremely fast."

A usual day in the life of a groom is pretty much the same for all, although some trainers prefer to do things different.

"I usually get to the barn a little before seven a.m. and begin getting my horses ready – depending on the schedule (if it's a training or jogging day.)

"When they train I always watch them, and I'm usually done by noon.

"And of course I have some scars to show, as I've been kicked like most grooms, but my worst time was with a horse named Twointhebucket. He kicked me in the knee and I had to get stitches, but otherwise, I've been pretty lucky."

Copeland personally owns one horse – a retired racehorse named Itchy who she's owned his entire life.

"He's more of a pasture puff than anything, but he was a good racehorse in his day."

A groom is pretty much married to the business and to the horse, of course, which is why many grooms are single. It is so hard to maintain a healthy relationship with someone with two legs, for you spend most of the day (and night) with your four-legged companion, but Copeland seems to balance it out with her boyfriend, driver, Matt Krueger.

"Matt and I met at Hoosier Park six years ago. I first saw him during qualifiers, but I'm not sure exactly the day we met. We've been together five years now and so far so good.

"I think the way we make it work is he's a horseman and knows that longs hours is part of the deal."

Connections reflect on Horse of the Year Test Of Faith's career to date

Test Of Faith has taken Mel Segal on a memorable journey the past two years, but what Segal has most enjoyed is bringing others along for the trip.

This past Sunday (Feb. 20) in Orlando, FL, Test Of Faith was named 2021 Horse of the Year by the U.S. Harness Writers Association. Last season, she won 14 of 16 starts, finished second in her two remaining races, and earned \$1.06 million on her way to becoming only the fourth 3-year-old female pacer ever to receive the Horse of the Year award.

For her career, the Frederick Hertrich III-bred daughter of Art Major—Cannae Cammie has won 22 of 25 starts and \$1.56 million.

Segal purchased Test Of Faith for \$92,000 at the 2019 Standardbred Horse Sale. Then he got his friends involved, with Bob Brady and Ken Jackson of Kentuckiana Farms joining Segal in partnership on the filly. Just prior to Test Of Faith's first start at age 2, they brought aboard University of Kentucky football coach Eddie Gran, who is now special assistant to head coach Mark Stoops.

"What a time we've had the last two years," Segal said. "It's been really great for our families to all enjoy this, enjoy watching her. It might sound strange, but I enjoy it more having partners than I would owning her by myself. I'm not a greedy person. Maybe somebody would regret selling half of her, but I don't. I'm glad to have them as partners.

"I've never had the thrill of something like this. I've had some nice horses, but nothing like this. My brother and my sister

and nieces, nephews, they just go crazy watching her race. The one thing I regret is that my mother and father are not here to watch her race and enjoy her. They loved horse racing. Hopefully, they're watching down."

Test Of Faith's victories last year for trainer Brett Pelling and driver David Miller included the Breeders Crown, Empire Breeders Classic, Glen Garnsey Memorial, New York Sire Stakes final, Park MGM Pace, Bluegrass, Matron, and Courageous Lady.

In the Breeders Crown, Test Of Faith started from post eight and was a parked-out sixth through the first half of the contest. She closed with a :26.1 final quarter-mile to rally from fourth and win by a length in 1:49.4.

"I thought she went a monster mile at the Breeders Crown," Segal said. "What she did being parked out the whole mile and then having punch at the end was outstanding. I don't think too many horses could have done that. I was shocked when she still had gas left."

It reminded Segal of Test Of Faith's first career start, when she was parked out to get the lead in a :26 opening quarter on her way to a win in a division of the New York Sire Stakes at Vernon Downs.

"Not too many 2-year-olds do that their first race," Segal said. "We thought she was a nice filly, but not that nice. I don't think you ever do at the beginning.

"That opened my eyes, and then she kept getting better and better."

Following is a compilation of comments from many of Test Of Faith's connections — Becky Brady, Gran, and Jackson as well as trainer Pelling, his son Jack, who often worked with the filly at Hot Lead Stables in central New Jersey, and caretaker Agata Hejnik — as they reflected upon their involvement with the horse and her career to date. Test Of Faith is preparing for her return as a 4-year-old this spring.

Ken Jackson: "The last two years have been such a fun run for the farm and our friendships. We're in a unique part of the world (in Lexington) where horses are everything, and all of a sudden, you've got this harness horse that all the thoroughbred buddies are following. It's also brought a bunch of new people to the game. Eddie has done a great job. He's our lucky charm. He's had five harness horses now, and they've all been incredible. It's been a ton of fun. As hard as we work, and the job that Bob does at the farm with breeding, all the stuff you do to make one, just to own one is incredible."

Becky Brady: "If names matter, hers is perfect. In this business, we are tested every day. If we didn't have faith, we wouldn't keep doing it. Following Test Of Faith the last two years has brought incredible joy to our family, our partners, and friends. We wish everyone could experience this opportunity and this thrill."

Eddie Gran: "It's pretty awesome that an old football coach of 38 years comes to Kentucky, and I meet Ken Jackson and Bob Brady, and they get me involved in harness racing. I've been in every SEC school there is in the country, two national championships, but when you're there and you're watching your horse win, it's

the greatest feeling ever. I'm really excited to be a part of the harness industry. (Test Of Faith) is a rock star."

Mel Segal: ":When I bought her, I was happy just to have a New York Sire Stakes filly. I had no idea she would turn out like she did. She just has an attitude that she wants to win. She has a terrific gait, and she takes care of herself, too."

Jack Pelling: "I think she's very smart, and I think that's what has helped her the most in her career. She's never hard on herself. She never pulls on the bit or wastes her energy. She knows when to stop and go. If they were all smart like her, it would be a pretty easy game. Give it all to her. It was all her. I'm just thrilled this early on in my career to be around a horse of that caliber. It's more than I could have ever hoped for."

Agata Hejnik: "She's very nice, a calm horse. I've been with her since day one and she is friendly and very smart. Whatever you ask, she does. You don't have to fight with her. She has a good personality. I love her."

Brett Pelling: "Another thing, she likes to be out in the paddock with another filly, but she's not the alpha filly. The other filly is usually the alpha. I find that quite interesting. You'd think she would be one to push them around, but she's not. She is a companion. I always hear about great mares, and people talk about this alpha thing that they have. Well, that's definitely not her. She's a sweetheart."

Becky Brady: "It's a great honor and very humbling to receive (Horse of the Year). We greatly appreciate our partner and dear friend Mel Segal for giving us the opportunity to share in Test Of Faith, and to Eddie Gran for joining us. Brett Pelling and his team have done a fantastic job campaigning her, and driver David Miller has given her many memorable drives. We would also like to thank our girl, Test Of Faith. I love you sweetheart and I'm so looking forward to this year."

Ken Jackson: "Brett has done an incredible job with her. He knew early on that he had a special one, and he shared it with us. It's been fun to see it fulfilled. She shows up every time. It doesn't matter the trip, what the conditions are, what the track is. It seems like every single race she tries, and when she comes out of the race, she's incredibly healthy. She just has an attitude that she loves to win. For us, it's been really special to know that every week you're in the game."

Agata Hejnik: "It's hard to say which (of her races was best). I think every race she raced was amazing. It's nice when you go to the races, everybody is asking about her, everybody knows you take care of her. Everyone knows you have this No. 1 horse. I'm looking forward to her racing again this year. She is good. She is sharp."

Brett Pelling: "She thoroughly deserves (Horse of the Year). I can't name a race in her life that she lost on her merits. She's just been phenomenal from day one. She's a pretty cool horse. For what she's done, it shows a huge amount of character. We're all getting older now. We have to be thankful for these moments."

Mel Segal: "It's hard for me to imagine all of this. It still hasn't sunk in. It's once in a lifetime."



An electric ride with Jujubee

It's not unusual for music to be part of an athlete's daily training routine.

Even when the athlete is a horse.

In this case, the 2021 Trotter of the Year, Jujubee.

"He loves hard rock," Jujubee's caretaker Mike Tabasco said. "We play (Ted) Nugent for him, Frank Marino, Van Halen, Scorpions, AC/DC, Deep Purple. He just loves it.

"That's the music I listen to. I like the early '70s and '80s. It keeps me going. I enjoy my day. We get it done."

Tabasco then continued with a laugh, "I think Juju loves it anyway. He doesn't complain, that's for sure."

Who would complain? The results rocked.

Jujubee, trained by Greg Wright Jr. for breeder/owner Jon Erdner, was the sport's top money-earning male trotter last year with \$948,791. He finished no worse than second in 17 of 18 races, winning 14. His victories included the Breeders Crown, Kentucky Futurity, Pennsylvania Sire Stakes final, and Phil Langley Memorial.

The colt captured the Futurity in 1:49.3 and the Muscle Hill Trot in 1:49.4 to become the first 3-year-old male trotter with two sub-1:50 winning miles.

"It's been amazing," Tabasco said. "The ride of a lifetime. I'm just glad to be part of it. It's a dream come true."

Tabasco was 15 when The Meadowlands Racetrack opened in 1976 just miles from his home in northern New Jersey. He developed an interest in harness racing, which blossomed into a passion. An electrician by trade, Tabasco soon began working with horses on a part-time basis, first as a groom and later as a trainer.

"I never had a lot of horses, just a couple for me, just to satisfy the need," Tabasco said. "It was a great experience to train my own horse and compete at The Meadowlands. That was a thrill."

Tabasco moved to Ohio several years ago and met Wright while racing at The Meadows. Wright needed help and Tabasco stepped in. Never did he imagine the decision would bring him back to The Meadowlands last year for two of the biggest days of the season. The first came last August when Jujubee won the Muscle Hill Trot on Hambletonian Day. The second came in October when Jujubee won the Breeders Crown.

Jujubee's 1:49.4 victory in the Muscle Hill set the track record for a 3-year-old male trotter.

"He did it in such a great performance," Tabasco said. "I know everybody at The Meadowlands because I raced at The Meadowlands, and they were all clapping and congratulating us. It was just a great experience."

Jujubee's progression from a lightly raced 2-year-old to Trotter of the Year was a credit to Wright and the horse, Tabasco said.

"Greg did a great job with him," Tabasco said. "It wasn't like let me just turn the key and we're going to be world champion. There were some things he did along the way, some shoeing changes, some equipment, it all depended.

"And Juju is such an intelligent horse. He's always in a good mood and he loves his work. He's very professional when it comes to racing. He knows it's race day. He knows what's going on. Once he knew what it was all about, he just thrived on it. The horse has a will to win, that's just how it is for him."

Wright said he was happy Tabasco was along for the journey.

"This past year traveling with Jujubee has enabled Mike to reconnect with many old friends on the horse circuit as well as make new friends with his charismatic personality," Wright said. "Mike's level of confidence and excitement every time Jujubee went to the gate was exhilarating. Jujubee's performances late in the season are a testament to the level of devotion, dependability and faithfulness Mike has for harness racing.

"Mike and I have naturally become great friends, I am truly blessed to have such a hardworking, dedicated and loyal caretaker on my team. The memories Mike and I have made are endless."

Jujubee is in Florida preparing to return for his 4-year-old season. Tabasco is with him, ready for the campaign ahead.

"I'm looking forward to it," Tabasco said. "I can't wait. I think he got bigger, stronger. He knows he's a champ. That's how I feel. He just does. He looks good.

"It's been a ride, and I want another ride this year. I'm going to do my part, Greg is going to do his part, and I know Juju is going to do his part."

Rock on.



A dive into a bonus pool

A little history. One year ago today, after viewing advertisements, bulletins, testimonials, pedigrees, photographs, and archived races, I compiled a list of eight possible sires for my broodmare. For demonstration purposes, to protect the innocent and avoid litigation, I will use Extra Incentive as a pseudonym for one of the sires on my list.

Extra Incentive and the other seven sires on my list were not heavyweights. They were between \$3,000 and \$6,000. If I squinted hard, my unscientific mind could make a case for booking any of these eight sires because the differences were both subjective and razor thin. In the end, I **did not** select Extra Incentive last year.

I was not the only customer who did not sign a breeding contract for this sire. In his first season at stud, Extra Incentive bred a mere 25 mares. Nevertheless, Extra Incentive reappears on my season's list of possibilities for this season.

For hypothetical reasons, I asked myself, what could the connections of Extra Incentive do to tip the scales and push their stallion up my list? What could the owner of Extra Incentive do that would possibly lure more customers like me? Should they slash the already low fee, bombard the market with expensive advertising that did not pay off the first year, finger rosary beads, or move the stallion to another state with less competition? The options for a fringy stallion are limited.

Here is a possible scenario. All it requires is a simple sentence added to advertisements this season:

Upon qualifying as a 2-year-old, each owner(s) of an Extra Incentive will receive a check or gift card for \$500. In addition, the breeder will receive a voucher for \$1,000 on a future Extra Incentive breeding (if the sire is still standing stud).

This promotion takes long-range planning. The babies in this

crop will be born during the first half of 2023. In the fall of 2024, yearlings will sell at horse sales. In 2025, many of those now 2-year-old standardbreds will gather behind starting gates and attempt to meet the qualifying time for excited owners. The qualifying standard for each pari-mutuel racetrack varies slightly at commercial racetracks, typically in the range of a 2:08 second for a mile for a 2yo trotting horse, a few seconds faster for pacers.

A qualifying day is a significant event for owners of racing hopefuls. For me, it is the most exciting day of the year. Some 2yo horses will make the required time with ease, others will struggle, and many will never qualify for racing. In 2025, the owners of 2-year-old trotters sired by Extra Incentive will smile more broadly because the customers will find tangible rewards.

The bonus money will not be official earnings. The bonus or award is a thank you to customers having faith in Extra Incentive back in the breeding season of 2022 and sales in 2024. Buyers and breeders take note. No strings, no gimmicks, no purse money is involved. The concept is straightforward — if you breed to Extra Incentive this year and the resulting horse qualifies, owners and breeders receive bonuses in 2025.

Would this Extra Incentive be of value to breeders or potential customers? Would this bonus proposal be worth the time, money, and effort?

Who knows?

This incentive does not seem to have a downside, and the administration is not complicated. This perk might tip the scale for me as a breeder and buyer. The deal-sweetener might make me raise my hand in the auction arena a few additional times. I appreciate that the ownership of Extra Incentive are creative people and believe enough in their stallion to make this offer.

If this promotion was in effect last year, and if half of last year's Extra Incentive 2-year-olds qualify, the cost would be about five grand in bonus money, the price of a few paid stallion advertisements. The project would be cost-effective if the bonus program brought two new breedings.

Passing out bonus money on qualifying dates would be fun for stallion owners, fun for the 2-year-old owners, and fun for the breeder, not to mention great PR. All the promotion requires is a few lines of notification and a little Extra Incentive.

USTA requests New York, New Jersey and Pennsylvania commissions investigate Gural

(Editor's note: The following letter has been sent to officials at the New York State Gaming Commission, New Jersey Racing Commission and Pennsylvania State Horse Racing Commission and shared with HRU for publication)

An official investigation by one or more state regulators is needed for the following reasons.

Jeffrey Gural, chief executive of tracks licensed in New York and New Jersey, conducts a private enforcement program that includes drug testing carried out at a laboratory in Hong Kong and other testing facilities, as well as other investigative activities. In 2014 and 2015, the United States Trotting Association helped pay for this program, then withdrew support because of a lack of transparency in the program. At the USTA Executive Committee meeting held 16 April 2016 concerns were raised about the lack of due process for horsemen, possible selective enforcement, and our conviction that all test results should be turned over to the appropriate racing commissions.

More recently, as one result of its investigation of Seth Fishman, the FBI contacted Adrienne Hall, a Standardbred trainer and one of Fishman's customers. Later, pursuant to a written nonprosecution agreement, Hall testified at Fishman's January 2022 criminal trial. In her testimony Hall admitted under oath to doping her horses in violation of state laws and regulations, among other admissions. Since then, Gural has taken the position that Hall's doping activities should be overlooked, therefore she should resume her equine-related occupations in good standing.

Some industry participants are of the opinion that Gural's private enforcement program has yielded drug positives that he has not disclosed. Gural's protective relationship with Hall, which involves substituting his own judgment for the judgment of racing commissions concerning her eligibility to be licensed, has renewed our concern about the possibility of a private empire operating independently inside the boundaries of public authority. This concern is central to the integrity and viability of racing and deserves the attention of the racing commissions.

• Those who have paid into stakes at Gural's tracks are entitled to know that they are not competing against others known to have had unrevealed positives or to have engaged in any other improper behavior.

- The entire industry is entitled to know that licensed tracks are being operated according to the highest standards of integrity.
- The state racing regulators are entitled to know that their licensee tracks and individuals are disclosing all information that is legally required to be disclosed, such as drug positives, and that there is no steering, shielding, or exertion of undue influence within the operation of any private enforcement program.
- Finally, the state racing regulators are entitled to credible assurances that no licensees are competing with them as self-appointed regulators.

If there are no undisclosed positives, and all is as it should be, we shall be glad to be among the first to acknowledge it. A thorough investigation, therefore, can only benefit racing.

A thorough investigation should not prove to be unduly burdensome, expensive, or time consuming. A review of all test reports for all years in question, submitted by the Hong Kong laboratory and any other testing facility directly to the commissions, should dispose of the question whether any undisclosed positives exist. Investigators and any other relevant parties the commissions deemed necessary could participate in interviews. The USTA will be available to provide any possible information and assistance.
