Odds of harness racing continuing in Florida marginally better this week

The sulky wheels keep turning as Florida harness racing rolls towards an undefined future. The ambiguity has recently had little to do with the final season of live racing at Isle Casino Pompano Park and more to do with the fate of the Seminole Tribe's Florida sports betting monopoly.

The Seminoles' Hard Rock Sportsbook was originally approved to operate on a "hub and spoke" model that would allow it to offer legal sports betting online and at approved physical locations. Last week, a federal judge determined that the gaming agreement between the state and the Seminoles was fatally flawed, which raised the question: Would decoupling of harness racing be reversed as well? The sports betting compact

had been tied to standardbred decoupling and the creation of a Florida Gaming Control Commission when it was initially approved.

How that happened:

May 19: The Florida Senate passed "Implementation of the 2021 Gaming Compact Between the Seminole Tribe of Florida and the State of Florida" (CS/SB 2-A) and Bill 8-A (2021A), a "companion bill" which allowed the state's last harness racino operator to "elect not to conduct live racing or games." Wording explicitly protected thoroughbreds from decoupling. Table games, slots and off-track wagering would remain legal at Pompano; conducting a live meet would no longer be a prerequisite. Governor Ron DeSantis approved the bill May 25.

Although it passed **July 8**, the new law would not find easy acceptance from gaming operators. In August, Southwest Parimutuels (owner of Miami's Magic City Casino and the Bonita Springs Poker Room, located on Race Track Road in Bonita Springs, Southwest Florida) filed a lawsuit objecting to the

compact that would have allowed the Seminoles to become the state's exclusive provider of legal sports wagering starting Oct. 15.

Southwest Parimutuels argued that even if the Seminoles' Hard Rock brand approved some casinos, jai alai frontons and race-tracks to host sports betting, with a percentage of revenue going back to the tribe, these "permanent facilities" would become financially unsustainable. They had already been dealt a harsh blow when dog racing became illegal in Florida on New Year's Day 2021. Magic City Casino was added to the Flagler Greyhound Race Track (founded in 1932) in 2009. Bonita Springs Poker Room opened in 2020 and is what survives of the Naples-Fort Myers Greyhound Track, which conducted meets for over six decades.

Nov. 1: The Hard Rock Sportsbook app quietly debuted.

Nov. 22: A federal appeals court judge ruled that the "hub and spoke" aspect of the Seminole compact violated the federal Indian Gaming Regulatory Act. US District Judge Dabney Friedrich pointed out that sports betting on "Indian lands" didn't mean computer servers located on Indian lands; bettors actually had to be on the property. Like Southwest Parimutuels, Judge Friedrich considered the server argument "fictional", stating in her decision that "[w]hen a federal statute authorizes an activity only at specific locations, parties may not evade that limitation by 'deeming' their activity to occur where it, as a factual matter, does not."

The News Service of Florida's Dara Kam reported that the compact also failed to fulfil a 2018 constitutional amendment (Amendment 2) which stipulates that Florida voters must approve expanded gaming. The Seminoles took the matter to the U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals for the District of Columbia last week.

Dec. 3: Their emergency motion for a stay during the appeal process was rejected. The next day, the Hard Rock Sportsbook app was shut down. Its website reads that the app is "now live in lowa and New Jersey and coming to more states soon," and that updates will follow "on our progress to bring safe and trusted sports betting back to Florida."

Dec. 9: Florida Politics' Renzo Downey noted that Governor DeSantis was still counting on a legal victory for the sports wagering deal: \$500-million in anticipated revenue from the Seminole compact was included in his proposed budget for next fiscal year.

Such confidence doesn't colour discussions about what will

become of pari-mutuel harness racing after Pompano's 2021/22 meet concludes April 17.

"I can tell you that based on the Indian compact being struck down by the federal judge, obviously things have changed; to what degree, I sincerely don't know at this point," Joe Pennacchio told HRU Friday (Dec. 10). The Florida Standardbred Breeders and Owners Association (FSBOA) director and past president confirmed that the Seminoles have no specific interest in decoupling.

"I was in the [Pompano] paddock a couple of weeks ago, on a Monday night, and the guys were asking me what do I think our chances are, and I said I think our chances are one per cent for just having standardbred racing in the state of Florida," said Pennacchio. "Now I say, based on this change, it's 25 per cent or maybe a little higher than that. It's truly going to come down to a legal argument based on Florida law."

He added that he expected the matter would eventually be decided in the Florida Supreme Court, independent of what happens with the Hard Rock Sportsbook.

After all, standardbred decoupling was never actually voted on in the May 19 Florida Senate special gaming meeting that approved the Seminole compact. Florida House District #97 Representative Dan Daley (D) had hoped to introduce an amendment that would let standardbreds share thoroughbreds' protection from decoupling during that session, but as he then told HRU, "The Senate would not take that amendment. And I had the votes in the Senate. They would not bring up my amendment to protect harness racing for consideration."



There are wider implications.

"I think that the story here to sell is to Ohio, Pennsylvania, New Jersey, New York, Indiana, Illinois, that if these casino guys get what they want down here, I'm sure that the other guys are smart enough to figure out how to play this game," said Pennacchio. "The domino effect is there. If you have horsemen in those states I named who think they can't be touched... They come in and go, 'Ah, they aren't bothering us.' You believe that? We had a law in place here that said they have to race horses to have a casino. Guess what? They don't have to do it anymore, and they never even changed the law."

He added that despite an abundance of standardbred training centres in the Sunshine State, the racing itself gets a cold shoulder from many owners and trainers.

"I don't know what the crossover is, but very few of them race down here during the winter anyway. Very few. The big stables, they come down and some of them are as much as three or four hours from Pompano. This is a big state to travel and they're not going to truck down to race anything; they don't even qualify down here anymore. For the vast majority of them, they just send [horses] up north... Florida racing doesn't really mean that much to them at all."

The FSBOA director explained that after Pompano discontinues racing, the only way the sport can continue is at a new or repurposed venue.

"You look at the state of Florida from the centre of, say, Orlando north, and there are multiple racetracks already in place on different pieces of property that could all be converted in a very short period of time into a functioning pari-mutuel track. That's not the problem. The problem on that end is [finding] somebody that wants to do it and is willing to put up the money to do it."

Representative Dan Daley also observed that it won't be easy to overcome decoupling or find a place to race. "It's going to take legal action or it's going to take legislation," he told HRU this week. "So I'm also looking at legislation that would permit the Florida Standardbred Breeders and Owners Association to have their permit, because right now, they do but it's not a standardbred racing permit, it's a stakes permit... As the law stands, there is no mechanism for someone to transfer a permit to the standardbreds—there's no mechanism for them to race in Florida, period, and they can't apply for a new permit because we foreclosed the opportunity to apply for new pari-mutuel racing permits in the [May 19] special session."

His investment in the game got literal this fall, when Daley became a first-time standardbred owner. "There's two of them, actually," he noted proudly. "Dad and I went to Lexington, and I had a couple of bourbons and he convinced me to buy my first horse with him. It's pretty neat, because it's the first time he and I have owned a horse together."

His father, trainer/driver Dan Daley, currently has trotting colts Hit Like Crazy and Jetts Metter at Olympia Palm Beach Training Centre (formerly South Florida Trotting Centre). Would the family like to race them in Florida someday?

"Look, they're New York breds, so they'll probably race primarily in New York," said the member of the Florida House of Representatives. "But you know, I'd like the option, and right now that option has been foreclosed."

Pennacchio said that whatever happens to standardbred decoupling at a legal or legislative level, the Pompano Beach racino's days are numbered. "It's a very, very valuable piece of real estate. Calder sold their property for some huge number approaching \$2-plus-million an acre, and trust me, the Pompano property is worth way more than that. The Calder [Gulfstream Park West] property is in the middle of nowhere."

On Nov. 22, it was announced that Churchill Downs Inc. had sold 115.7 acres at Gulfstream Park West to a real estate developer for \$291 million, but kept the former thoroughbred track's casino.

"I'll tell you one thing about Pompano: For all the problems that we have, people still bet on this product," he added, wistfully. "Last year, which was their 57th year, was the highest handle they ever had."

That encouraging statistic must factor into rebuilding Florida harness racing: Whatever happens next will be precedent-setting, reinventing the wheel after years of frustrating setbacks.







As sports betting evolves, harness racing must create its own niche

Thoroughbred racing supports itself with marquee events and TV coverage, but where does harness racing fit in as sports betting's rapid growth continues.

Industry heavy hitters met in Arizona at the annual Racetrack Industry Program's Global Symposium on Racing this week. The hottest topic involved the current sports betting landscape and racing's place in it.

Unfortunately, the top-line numbers for horse racing are not very encouraging.

"FanDuel Sportsbook had more customers in November than TVG has had in 22 years," noted Andrew Moore, FanDuel's vice president of racing, during a sports betting and racing panel.

The demographics are equally troubling. The top funnel under 40 years of age sports bettor represents 73 per cent of their sportsbook customers. Meanwhile, 69 per cent of their racing arm's customer base is 40 or over.

Sports betting's growth is not the least bit surprising. It has only recently been legalized in many states (with more to come), so it has a newness and possesses a ready-made market filled with customers who've been eager for legal, safe sports betting platforms.

In addition, the sports betting companies are spending mind-boggling amounts of marketing cash on customer acquisition. Year over year advertising was up over 80 per cent this spring and that has only grown for the football season this fall. According to industry journalists, sports betting companies are expected to spend up to \$1 billion on football ads before the season ends in January.

Although it's daunting that advertising spend in 2021 for sports betting may end up rivalling what horse racing delivers in purses (including from slots), there are some potential positives. FanDuel/TVG, among others, believe that many of these newly acquired customers have never been exposed to horse racing and plan to bring the sport directly to them through something called a "shared wallet."

Shared wallets – used for decades in Europe and Australia – allow for sports bettors to seamlessly transition between, for example, betting the Steelers minus 4, and the 5th at Belmont.

"What we have seen is that sports betting customers are extremely willing to bet on horse racing. What we also see is they don't really hang around, because they have different sports betting accounts with separate logins. They're not inclined to deposit and play at two different places on the one day," said Moore.

"We will have our ADW integrated into our sportsbook next year," Moore said.

As well, online sportsbooks have been pushing a racing partnership for fixed odds wagering. This type of wagering has been popular in other parts of the world for many years.

Although perhaps a tad overconfident, I don't believe the industry bullhorn on shared wallets is the usual wishful thinking. The more money an entity has on account from people with a proclivity to gamble, the better it is for tangential sports

like horse racing to generate revenue. From a pure business case perspective, you and I see this each day when we log into our bank accounts. Banks spend copious amounts of marketing money on customer acquisition because the lifetime value of each of us linking lines of credit, credit cards, mortgages or stock trading accounts outstrips the cost.

Fixed odds wagering, although great for page real estate and marketing, is probably less of a good thing and will perhaps end up little more than a novelty. But it too provides racing with exposure it did not have before.

The way I see it, however, while this business plan on the surface looks positive for horse racing as a whole, it presents real issues for harness racing.

Thoroughbred racing can take advantage of fixed odds and shared wallets because their broadcast and popularity is huge. When an event is high funnel it's much easier to entice someone new because it does not have to be introduced.

Millions of people gather for the Triple Crown races; less of a number — but still a formidable amount — does the same for the Breeders' Cup. It's not difficult for many sports bettors to recognize the event, get information they need, flip on their television and partake in the gambling game of racing via their shared wallet. It's not hard to imagine that this could generate millions in new handle for say next spring's Kentucky Derby.

For harness racing, it's just not the same.

This sport has a tiny footprint and broadcast. Your average FanDuel sports bettor is not already introduced to harness racing events. They're not going to – on a whim - get a subscription to TrackMaster for racing programs so they can make a wager on the third at Western Fair. The shared wallet provides the sport with little edge.

As a gambling sport, harness racing has always been the poorer cousin; the afterthought; the go along to get along. It's the sport that takes 3 per cent for its signal at national ADWs to get exposure, with the bulk of the juice going to the ADW or thoroughbred track. It's a sport that might have a Triple Crown, but when one of the legs is cancelled no one even notices. It's the sport that has rarely thought about investing in its exposure or creating its own gambling identity.

The sport is not going to change this overnight; it's simply smaller and has less money to invest when compared to the thoroughbreds. But in my view, it must plan for the new shared wallet, fixed odds, sports betting world and there are realistic strategies this sport can implement to reach that goal.

I'll examine a few of them in Part 2 next week.

Hensley on the annual race secretaries' meeting, Dover, and fixed-odds betting

This year's American Harness Racing Secretaries, Inc. (AHRS) meeting concluded a week ago in Florida. Held annually, its primary order of business in convening is to coordinate scheduling for stakes races in the upcoming year, something that has become increasingly more complex in recent years as state breeding programs continue to expand.

There were a handful of jurisdictions that didn't submit their proposed racing dates to the USTA in advance of the AHRS meeting, though one of those jurisdictions that did so was Delaware. John Hensley serves as director of race and sports at Dover Downs, and one of his many responsibilities that falls under that umbrella is race secretary at the Dover, DE-based harness track. His needs, as far as stakes dates are concerned at the AHRS, gathering are covered by proxy through the Hambletonian Society and Judy Davis-Wilson, executive director of the Delaware Standardbred Breeders Fund (DSBF).

As Hensley said, there's contractual considerations as to why Dover races when it does, which at the same time locks their stakes into November and December each year.

"November can be a tough calendar because we're right after the Breeders Crown," said Hensley. "And the reason we race when we do at Dover is just because of the seasonality of the Harrington and Dover facilities with motorsports. It's an interesting arrangement. Even after the merger of the gambling company with Twin River, which is now Bally's, there is a lifetime agreement that motorsports owners have control over their facility from the middle of May to the middle of October. And of course, the harness track is right in the middle of the Monster Mile motorsports track (Dover International Speedway). Now, who knows how things could change going forward. Bruton Smith and Speedway Motorsports just bought Dover Motorsports a few weeks ago, so it'll be an interesting arrangement going forward."

Having to race the Matron Stakes and Progress Pace in November has proven to be just fine though for Dover. The stakes continue to attract the highest levels of quality including Matron winners last month such as Bella Bellini, Venerable, Charlie May and Horse of Year candidate, Test Of Faith. Cane Pace winner Rockyroad Hanover won this year's Progress Pace on Thanksgiving Eve.

"We've been fortunate, and I hope it continues," said Hensley. "We've always received a lot of support from the big guys, the ones that they're not ready yet to quit with, or the ones that aren't going immediately to the breeding shed. It's not a bad time of year and November isn't a bad month for us weather-wise. We caught really good weather this year except for our Progress Pace, which turned out to be the coldest and windiest night of the year."

Hensley is currently in his fifth season as race secretary, and one of the biggest challenges he sees for all race secretaries is that of a declining horse population.

"The number one topic on everyone's mind is the horse population and the amount of races that we can fill per day, and field size," said Hensley." I believe Chester has announced it, for example, where they're going with 130 days next year as opposed to 150. And I've got to believe it's in response to wanting to fill 13 or 14 races a day instead of 10 or 11.

"Now, again, we're a little bit fortunate at Dover because of our season. We don't struggle, yet, for full fields and we don't struggle to fill 13 or 14 races. We're fortunate that in November and December we have those stakes. The overnight guys, some of them stay at Rosecroft, some of them stay at Chester, but when Chester shuts down, we'll grab those guys back. And I think we're all still rebounding a little bit from COVID, so there's some of that, too."

The reduction of horses has made it more difficult to make competitive races, something Hensley has seen just over the last few years.

"Five years ago, it was much easier. Well, what's the difference?" Hensley asked. "I've got fewer horses, so I've got a smaller sample set. The variation is tougher. I try to get two to three divisions of the Winners Over and I can't get them anymore, I'm barely getting two. But you've still got the range. And what I mean by that is that I've got a Jack's Legend (open handicap winner this week) but then I've got a Penzance Hanover who raced really good Thursday night, but in a Winners Over is probably 16th or 17th best. So, I've got some range from top to bottom, but I've got a smaller sample set to work with and so the variation is larger. And I think that's what a lot of racing secretaries are facing."

Hensley is extremely well-versed in sports betting matters, and the topic of fixed-odds wagering as discussed this past week in Arizona as part of the Racing Symposium is highly relevant. It's a topic that Hensley will be speaking on at a panel in February and overall, he sees it as a net-positive for the racing industry.

"Anything that can generate interest in our sport is a good

Something to cross over a different demographic into our game, absolutely we should investigate how to do it," said Hensley. "My more pragmatic side will tell you that from an operational and operator standpoint, the learning curve will be a little longer than maybe some would say, and I think that was the experience just recently in New Jersey with Betfair where the exchange wagering didn't catch on. There are cultural differences when you look at the Ladbrokes and the William Hill experiences in the UK. The UK gambling experience culturally has been different from ours, where you've got the bookies on the apron, but you've also got the tote inside and you shop your price."

Through his book at Dover, Hensley sees opportunity. "Our sports betting crowd at Dover is what you'd think, it's ages 21 to 35 and male, that's the demographic," said Hensley. "And they bet on horses, they want action. So, if they're standing around the book, we've crossed them over into horse racing. They understand it, they're learning it, and so there's no reason that it can't happen. That way of wagering can be adopted here, there's no reason it can't be. It'll just be a matter of educating the fan and educating the player."

War horses all the buzz recently as older campaigners near the end of their racing careers

Harness racing's war horses were in the news all week and the accomplishments of these soon-to-be-retired veterans kept social media buzzing.

The fun started at The Raceway at Western Fair in London, ON on Tuesday (Dec. 7) in the weekly "Seniors Pace", a race for 14-year-olds that is also open to 11-year-olds and up who meet specified conditions. This edition of the Seniors Pace featured three 14-year-olds all competing in their last month of racing, and two of them flashed home down the outside in the lane to photo for the win.

At the wire, it was Lawmen Reign, who got up for owner/trainer/driver Ross Battin over Ciona Bromach for the 1:59.4 score. Thirteen-year-old Stonebridge Scout was along late to round out the veterans Trifecta. Lawmen Reign won for the 39th time

in 330 starts in a career that began at The Raceway in February of 2010 with a nondescript fourth-place finish in a maiden race. Never once racing for a claiming tag, the son of Rambaran out of the Run The Table mare Tiger Reigns has finished in the money 136 times – quite often at the highest class on the B tracks – and he has earned more than \$276,000 for Battin, who recently recorded his 5,000th win in a driving career that has spanned more than 40 years.

Ciona Bromach is no stranger to the B tracks, either. Bred, owned, and trained for his entire racing career by Debbie Obrienmoran, and he has compiled 21 wins and 54 other placings in his 327 starts, good for a shade more than \$240,000 in earnings.

Obrienmoran said that she appreciates the opportunity to race Ciona Bromach in the races written specifically for senior horses. "I think they are fantastic," she said. Obrienmoran said that she is glad that The Raceway cards the Senior races on Tuesdays because she works at Mohawk Park which is a dark day later in the year. "Ciona is a bit of a goofball, and he hasn't been raced or even paddocked by anyone other than me, nor will he be" she explained of her need to be there in race nights. She added that she thinks the Senior races are a great promotion to encourage people to keep racing older horses. "It's a little easier on them than racing them against younger horses.


Obrienmoran says she plans on making Ciona Bromach into a riding horse, or possibly a parade marshall horse, but not before he competes for one final time in the Seniors Pace on New Years Eve which falls on a Friday. "I got the night off at Mohawk Park," the conditioner smiled.

Tony Elliot, who is in his initial year as raceway manager of the half-mile oval, said that The Raceway at Western Fair followed in the footsteps of another B track carding the Seniors races. "The Clinton Race Office introduced the idea of the Seniors Pace in the last couple years," he said. "The goal of the class was to provide an opportunity each week for 14-year-olds to race as they would retire on December 31st. It is a fantastic way to showcase the classy older horses that race at our track and the class is very competitive each week."

Elliot said he thinks the races are popular. "I think it's been very well received overall. Horsemen are happy with the opportunity to have a class to race their 14-year-olds in each week and add some money to their card before they retire," he said. "Bettors and fans seem to really enjoy the Seniors Paces and show their strong support through the betting windows."

Flash forward one night and head to western Canada where 15-year-old Best Dream Seeker was beating his juniors in a \$4,500 claiming pace at Fraser Downs, leading all the way and winning by a head in 1:58.2. Horses are typically required to retire at the end of their 15-year-old season in B.C. unless they have special permission to race beyond that milestone. Horses as old as 16 have won as recently as three years ago as chronicled by yours truly in this piece for HRU (full story here).

Best Dream Seeker – a Cambest gelding out of the Western Hanover mare Dream Seeker – won for the 46th time in a

He took a mark of 1:51.4 in a division of the Bluegrass stakes at Lexington at 2 in his seventh start in August of 2008, a time when a 1:51 and change mile paced by a rookie was huge. He has grinded out \$499,880 in earnings. You'd have to think this warhorse, who compiled a record of 9-8-7 from 41 starts for earnings just shy of \$27,000 in 2020, will be raced at least once more to reach the \$500K earnings milestone.

Completing a stellar week for senior horses was another 14-year-old who has been a win machine in 2021. Dream Out Loud N, a Bettors Delight gelding out of the In The Pocket mare Nothingbutadreamer, was tallying his sixth straight win by wiring a group of \$10,000 claiming foes in a sharp 1:52.2 mile. That was Dream Out Loud's 18th win in 2021 which tied him for the most wins in North America. The millionaire also has taken eight 2nds and one 3rd while adding more than \$74,000 to his bankroll for owners Tina A Porfilio and Marcus J Marashian of Pennsylvania. He has compiled an outstanding record of 68-60-43 from 294 starts.

All of these terrific older horses give us old guys renewed hope.

Hoosier Park season will stretch longer in 2022

Plus, the 2022 Indiana Standardbred Breed Development program will be valued at nearly \$14.3 million.

This season, Harrah's Hoosier Park conducted harness racing in the month of December for the first time in the track's history. In 2022, the Anderson facility will race even deeper into the final month on the calendar. In a meeting held Monday (Dec. 6), the Indiana Horse Racing Commission (IHRC) approved Hoosier Park's annual permit renewal and 160-day racing calendar for 2022. The season will begin Friday, March 25 and carry through Saturday, December 10.

"I love the race dates; I love the calendar. It does give the horsemen another week and another racing opportunity," said Rick Moore, vice president and general manager of racing at Harrah's Hoosier Park. "We basically have nine months of racing at Harrah's Hoosier Park, and I think that's a wonderful thing for the horsemen. We've elongated the calendar another week. It's the longest stretch of the calendar we've ever conducted harness racing, but I'm excited that we can accommodate the horsemen."

One of the biggest adjustments for the 2022 season is the return to a Tuesday through Saturday schedule. This season, Hoosier Park changed from its traditional race week to a Wednesday through Sunday format. Moore said that horsemen requested the move back to the previous dates, and there was not a significant discrepancy in handle when exchanging Sunday programs for Tuesday.

"Handle-wise it was about a dead-heat; it was about a draw. The good thing about Sundays is we had people on track, so we had a better on-track handle. Having people on track is always important to me," Moore said. "But we listened to the horsemen and we're good partners. They said we would rather not race on Sundays and we said, 'So be it, we won't do it. We'll go back to Tuesdays."

Hoosier Park will kick off the 2022 campaign with a two-day opening weekend (March 25 and 26). From there, the track will apply a tiered approach, adding Thursday in the second week (March 31-April 2) before moving to a four-day format in the months of April and May. Beginning in June, Hoosier Park will race the Tuesday-Saturday schedule through September before scaling back to four days per week in October and three each week in November and December. Six dates will be offered in December (1, 2, 3, 8, 9, 10), extending the calendar one week longer than in 2021 to close out the meet. Hoosier Park will offer racing on the Memorial Day, July 4th and Labor Day holidays.



Moore said the calendar works well as it allows the track to continue to card 14 races each night while tapping into the freshman racing calendar. The race weeks are expanded as 2-year-olds begin their campaigns, and contraction occurs as the young racers are turned out for the season.

"It has worked out perfectly. When we stair-stepped up to five days a week, if you look around the country, there are very few tracks, whether it be thoroughbred or standardbred, that race five days a week. We're able to do that because the bulk of our schedule involves 2-year-olds. It gives us that extra reinforcement of horses," he said.

During the same meeting, commissioners approved the 2022 Indiana Standardbred Breed Development program valued at nearly \$14.3 million. The structure of the program is nearly identical to the 2021 offering with some minor modifications.

The budget for the Indiana Sires Stakes program remains unchanged, offering total purses of \$7.9 million. The program will feature six legs for 2-year-olds and eight legs for 3-year-olds, culminating with \$250,000 Super Finals for each division. Horses finishing sixth through 10th in the Super Finals will each receive \$4,000. All 2- and 3-year-old categories will offer \$25,000 consolations. Older horses will compete in \$50,000 finals.

According to Jessica Barnes, director of racing and breed development at the IHRC, \$1.4 million was budgeted for the 2021 Indiana Sires Fair Circuit. However, just over \$1.2 million was spent due to a decrease in the number of divisions. As a result, the Standardbred Breed Development Advisory Committee voted to keep the 2022 program at \$1.4 million and bump purses for each race from \$3,000 to \$3,500.

The line items for Indiana Sired late closers and IN Sired Overnight Supplements/Mini Series also underwent adjustment. For 2021, a total of \$250,000 was allocated for Indiana Sired late closers, but Barnes said \$398,100 was spent due to increased participation. In 2022, \$400,000 is available for this area of the program. Overnight supplements were first set at \$2 million last year before the program was amended and an additional \$1.7 million was approved in July. The 2022 budget for supplements and mini series is set at \$3.5 million.

Breeders awards have a budget of \$1 million for 2022. The 2021 allocation started at \$700,000 before being enhanced in July with \$300,000 in additional funding.

Jason Bertolini's first career driving win produces whole lotta love for Led Schneppelin

Jason Bertolini had plenty to talk about, but his preference, as always, is to leave that up to the pacers and trotters.

Although he's much younger than a vast majority of his

contemporaries, that's certainly not how the 24-year-old presents himself.

So, when he recorded his first driving win Bertolini took the moment in stride.

That's not to say, however, he wasn't grateful for elated to net the 'W.'

"It was such a great feeling," said Bertolini. "You always imagine what it will be like, and when it does happen, it's even better than you thought it would be."

The victory was even more rewarding considering the horse he was in rein to happened to be his very own.

After some tough-luck results with Led Schneppelin, the third time proved to be the charm for the driver and the 10-year-old son of Memphis Flash on Nov. 26 at First Tracks Cumberland in Maine.

Sent on his way at 9-2, Led Schneppelin was taken to the front by Bertolini, carving out an opening panel in :28.1, then leading the field through a half-mile clip in :59.4.

From there, the pair braced for any late challenges, but didn't need to, crossing the line 2 ¾-lengths ahead of their nearest rival, stopping the teletimer in 1:59.0.

"The trip worked out just the way I wanted it. The first race

together, I had him on the front and I kind of went a little too quick, and we didn't come home as strong as I wanted to. We just got beat. The next week, I got interfered with, but we still finished third. The horse, to me, he's unbelievable. I could see him getting stronger and I had a lot of confidence in him. I put him back on the front in our third race and by the five-eighths, he was still strong, and this time, I didn't want to get to the three-quarters as fast as the first time, and we were able to do that. He took right off from there and it went perfectly. I was really happy with him."

Led Schneppelin paid \$11 for the win.

It was the 83rd start for Bertolini, who arrived at the dash with five seconds and 14 third-place finishes on his stat line.

If he had been down on himself heading into his winning drive, he certainly wasn't showing it.

"It was nice to get it done and it was nice to do it with this horse. I had always liked him. Really, I was looking for something to drive in the amateurs. And things just kind of took off when we started working together. To be able to drive a horse like that, and to own it, that's really great."

Bertolini, the eldest of five siblings, was happy his phone was fully charged.

"My phone didn't stop blowing up all night. It was awesome."

With his initial driving triumph out of the way, Bertolini will now turn his attention to other goals.

Six years into his standardbred career, he has plenty of people in his corner.

After graduating high school in Maine, Bertolini worked in the stable of Aaron and Ryan Hall in 2015. For the past five years or so, he has been driving around the Maine fairs for the last five years.

He also has high praise for his mother, Kirsi Bertolini.

"I don't think anything for granted. I give a lot of credit to my mom, and also to Aaron for putting me down on horses. The horses might be longshots, but they give me the experience that I need and that helped me get where I am to today. It's been great, but I still have a lot that I want to achieve."

Goals are many for the trainer/driver.

He's hoping to start checking a few off his list.

"I'd like to drive a little bit more next year. I like the training aspect of the sport. My long-term goal is to take what I learn each day and use all of that to become better at what I do. I'd like to get more horses that I can train and work with them to be competitive whenever and wherever they race. If I could start picking up other drives in the amateurs, that would be great. The biggest thing at this point is to stay humble and try to get as many wins and good results as I can."

Bertolini is both optimistic and realistic in his view of racing.

"There will be downs than ups in this game. You never know what the horse will do once you line up behind that gate. You always have a certain perspective on how they are going to do, but anything can happen. I just want to stay humble and let the horses do the talking. You don't have to say anything. People see what you do and hopefully they see that you are working hard, learning every day, and wanting to get better."

When he's not in the sulky or at the barn, Bertolini, when time permits, likes to indulge in a popular winter pastime.

Taking his mind off racing, albeit for just a while, is a welcome respite.

"To unwind, I like to go skiing. Some winters, I go help Jamie Gerard train. He's in Maine, but he goes out and races at The Meadowlands and Freehold. I like hunting and fishing, too. I like going smelt fishing in the winter, which is a lot of fun."

Not quite as rewarding, however, as reeling in a win on the racetrack.

Bertolini said he is hoping that 2022 holds more of those moments.

"I'm just really happy. I have a horse I co-own, Real Sancho, with Craig Hall, and he's been doing pretty good for us. I haven't been driving him, but it's been really great to be part of that too."

He's also managed to bring a new racing fan into the fold, someone who paddocked Led Schneppelin ahead of the momentous victory.

And that, at least on this occasion, is certainly worth talking about.

"One of the best parts of all this is that my girlfriend, Ronni Owens, is really getting into harness racing now. She does the barrel racing, but she always wanted to get into the standard-breds. All I can say that life is good, and I feel very lucky to have so many good people around me."







Kurt Becker's true calling

He not only followed his legendary father, Carl Becker, into race calling and pedigree reading, Kurt Becker has also blazed a new trail of excellence.

As this writer has been known to do more than once, I messed up! I had been wanting to do an interview with my old friend and colleague, Carl Becker, arguably the combination of the best and best known race caller and reader of standardbred pedigrees. Becker made his well-earned reputation at numerous racetracks, sales and venues throughout the world, including all of North America as well as New Zealand and even Sweden. No sale or racing venue was too big or too small for Carl Becker.

This past summer, I spoke with Carl's son Kurt and found out that his dad was terminally ill with only a few months to live. I asked myself, What to do? I decided that with only a small time remaining, Carl did not need me bothering him. I now, somewhat, regret the decision.

As a means of perhaps slightly making up for my transgression, I told myself that when that terrible time came, I would try to make partial amends by speaking with Carl's ultra-gifted son Kurt — to speak of his dad and also to address Kurt's own multi-faceted career.

By mutual agreement, Kurt and I spoke on the day after Carl Becker was laid to rest in his hometown of Altamont, IL.

Kurt, this is a very sad time for you and your family.

"Indeed it is. But dad lived a great life. Because of the nature of his illness, we were prepared for the end. In addition to being a great person himself, he was a wonderful husband and father and a great teacher and role model to me. He was an exceptionally talented and hard working person. He attained great success in just about everything he set his mind to do."

Carl will always be known as one of the greatest race callers and pedigree readers in the history of harness racing. Not only did he achieve that status, but he also raised a son who followed in his footsteps and in some areas might have even surpassed him. How did your involvement in the industry evolve?


"Dad didn't always announce the big events or read pedigrees at the major sales. He started out at the grassroots level with county fairs and at the regional sales. Even when he had reached the so-called big time, he was never adverse to returning to the areas through which he had been to get there.

"When starting out, he came to the attention of Stan Bergstein, a man to whom so many people in this business have given credit for their success in the sport. Dad felt that Stan was the greatest of all announcers, both of the race calling and of the pedigree reading variety. He tried to follow everything that Stan did in those same area

"I started at a younger age. I was about five years old when I started going to the county fairs with dad, listening to him call races. From that time forward all my efforts were concentrated on becoming as good a race caller as I could possibly become. The same was not the case with pedigree reading. I had absolutely no interest in going to sales and reading data about the families of horses that I didn't know much, if anything about. Race calling was exciting. I had the best seat in the entire house. There was constant movement. You could even bet on the horses. Reading pedigrees at a horse sale came across to me as being boring. I had no interest in it. Eventually dad got me interested in doing that as well as calling the races. The more I did of it, the more interested, I became."

Much as Carl did, you started calling races at the Illinois county fairs. You eventually rose through the ranks calling Grand Circuit events. How did that come about?

"I have to give Curt Greene great credit for giving me my first big break. Curt was from Illinois. He happened to be at home where he was being honored at the Macon County Fair. I was doing the race calling. Curt later told me that he thought that the race call sounded familiar — somewhat like Carl Becker. But he knew it wasn't Carl. He liked the way I sounded. At the time he was managing the Red Mile. He asked me if I would be willing to come to Lexington and be the race announcer at the Red Mile for the Spring meet that they then had. Would I ever! I went to Lexington and I guess that I probably did all right, because after the Spring meet they asked me to come back to do the Fall Grand Circuit meet. From that time forward I went to the major Chicago tracks and succeeded legendary race caller Phil Georgeff at those tracks."



As best as I can ascertain, you have had six jobs. All of them are at or near the top of their respective fields. Let's talk about them individually.

"The first two were in harness racing as a race caller and then as a pedigree reader at various sales, the top two being at Lexington and then dad took me along with him to Harrisburg where I also was privileged to read pedigrees. Talk about starting at the top, not only announcing some of the most important races in the sport and then reading pedigrees at Lexington and Harrisburg. How lucky can a guy get?"

Then you went to the thoroughbreds, initially as the first and only race caller in the renowned history of Keeneland and then in addition as a pedigree reader at the various Keeneland sales. How did that come about?

"As you know, Keeneland did not have a race caller in the first 60 years of its racing existence. I suppose it was mostly tradition. I have also heard that at the beginning it might have been based mostly on economics. Can you believe, Keeneland, the huge behemoth that is has evolved into, possibly strapped for cash? I doubt that was the case, but maybe.

"It was and still is a shrine for thoroughbred horse racing. I might add it was a tradition that served them well. They were offering the true experience of racing horses. A blaring announcer during those years did not fit into that mold.

"But this was a new era. Simulcasting came along and became a big revenue producer. How could you possibly send your signal without someone calling the races? People would be reluctant to take that signal.

"It was 1997. The good folks running Keeneland decided that they needed to have someone calling the races. But they felt that they needed someone who was unique to Keeneland, someone who they could identify as being their own. They didn't want someone who had called races at other thoroughbred tracks and might be identified with those venues. I happened to be the plain lucky, right guy at the right time. When I first began calling at Keeneland I had to adhere to strict rules. The races were to be called their way, not mine. The board was very sensitive to what the announcer's duties were. I was to introduce the field, call the race and introduce the winner in the winner's circle. That's all. No editorializing. No emotion. Just call the race. That was and still is fine with me. I'm incredibly proud of the fact that with the exception of one weekend where I was ill, that no one other than me has called a race at Keeneland. On that particular weekend, I'm eternally indebted to Mike Battaglia for subbing for me on short notice.

"Here's an interesting story. When I was first hired I was also working for NASCAR. Ray Paulick, who was then the managing editor of the *Blood Horse* magazine wrote a story about

Keeneland's new race caller. 'It's bad enough ending the tradition,' he wrote, 'but it's even worse hiring someone who is calling motorsports events for stands full of beer guzzling grease monkeys.' Since then, Ray and I have become close friends. We both chuckle when thinking about that column.

"The pedigree reading at Keeneland just kind of evolved from the race calling and the fact that the folks there knew that I was doing it successfully with the standardbreds. I had developed a knowledge of thoroughbred pedigrees through my race calling, so I felt little trepidation in taking that job on.

"One of the first yearlings who's pedigree I was privileged to have read was a colt being auctioned by the late Cris Caldwell. The colt was expected to bring a whole lot of money, but I don't think anybody expected him to bring as much as he did. He brought \$8 million.

"Just as with the major standardbred sales, the pedigree readers operate in teams. At Keeneland we are a team of three — John Henderson, Scott Hazelton and myself."

I have heard you sometimes described as the voice of NASCAR. How did you become involved there?

"Calling me the voice of NASCR is the hugest of exaggerations. I have been an announcer on the Motor Racing Network, a subsidiary of NASCAR since 1994. My association with MRN, as opposed to horse racing, is not remotely related to my parents. They never really had any interest in automobile racing. My interest developed mostly through my interest in sports in general and sports broadcasting in particular. The first NASCAR event that I was exposed to was the Daytona 500 – once again starting at the top. It grabbed me. I loved it. I was 16 and seeking to garner more information on this new found sport. I was switching radio stations hoping to get NASCR updates and came upon MRN. During the course of the broadcast they gave their address. On a whim, I wrote to them. I said that I wanted to work for them as an announcer. I gave them my background in calling horse races. I was contacted by John McMullen who told me that anybody who could call horse races or hockey games could adapt himself to car racing. He hired me. I have been with them ever since.

"Here's something remarkable about my career in car racing. If a NASCAR vehicle were placed in front of my home, I would still be stranded. I have no idea of how to drive a vehicle that has a clutch.

"Another job is as an announcer at the Barrett Jackson collector car auctions. Announcing at Barrett Jackson is not all that much different than doing so at a horse sale. In both, my main job is to hit on the most salient points and then leave the rest up to the auctioneer, the bid spotters and most importantly the customers. I'm of the strong belief that when selling, whether it be horses or automobiles that too much can sometimes yield too little. A good motto especially when announcing the sale of horses might be, 'Don't say too much and don't take too long in saying

it.' Having said that, I would say that, generally speaking, the flow at a horse sale is usually quicker than that at one where cars are being sold. The auctioneers and spotters at the car sale will often take longer and be more aggressive than those at a horse sale. Why? I really don't know. But I would suspect that the old culprit, tradition or the mantra 'It has always been done that way' is probably the main reason."

In calling horse races, what has been your greatest thrill both in harness and thoroughbred racing?

"Regarding harness racing there are probably two. One was when dad insisted that I call the 1988 World Trotting Derby at DuQuoin when Armbro Goal defeated Supergill. Can you imagine, I was 19 years old calling the most prestigious race in my home state of Illinois. The second was Artsplace's stunning win in the 1990 Breeders Crown at Pompano Park.

"As far as the thoroughbreds are concerned, it has to be American Pharoah's win in the \$5 million dollar Breeders' Cup Classic at Keeneland. What a thrill, calling the last race of the first Triple Crown winner in 30 years and memorializing his becoming the only horse to hit a Grand Slam in American Classics races."

In terms of being a race caller, you have often been compared to your dad. For a time, to this scribe it was difficult to distinguish between the two of you.

"Early on in my career I did my utmost to follow and pattern myself after dad. As time went on, I came to the realization that he was the one and only Carl Becker. As much as it was important to forge my own identity, I felt it was even more so that I preserve the things that made him as special as he was. You asked me if I'd ever used his famous phrase, 'They're coming from everywhere." Even though I've been tempted, I've never used it entirely because it was a small part of what made him the great race caller that he was. I feel that phrase belonged to him and him alone."

In your dual roles as a race caller and as a pedigree reader have you ever hit a wall, made what you feel was an insurmountable error?

"As far as reading pedigrees are concerned, the biggest problem you've got to look out for is the danger involved in possibly turning more than one catalog page at a time. For this very reason, I have made it a point to look over the stand and make sure that the hip number on the flank of the horse corresponds to that of what is in the sales catalog. It sounds simple. It should never happen, but it has. But it is fixable. It's nowhere near as damaging as calling the wrong horse in a race. Thankfully, to my knowledge I've never done that.

"One error that comes to mind is when a friend of mine from NASCAR, Eli Gold, probably best known as the voice of the Bama

Tide, was my guest at Keeneland. In the feature race that day, I completely lost track of a filly by the name of Runway Model. She made a huge move and won the race. It wasn't until the very end that my brain came back and I was able to identify her by her jockey wearing the orange Claiborne colors. Two years later, that filly sold at Keeneland. Before the sale, I went to her stall to apologize for my miscall. I read her pedigree. She brought \$725,000. I also read the pedigree for her first foal a colt named McKenzie who brought a million dollars."

Aside from your dad, let's talk a little about some of the track callers that you've known.

"Stan Bergstein — He was the 'daddy' of all of us. He taught my dad and numerous others, either directly or by watching the races that he called. The videos of his Hambletonian and Little Brown Jug calls to this day are among the very best that I've ever seen.

"Roger Huston — I'm truly amazed by Roger. His ability and boundless enthusiasm for the sport are unmatched by anybody I've ever known. He's still going strong at the age of 80.

"Tom Durkin — Maybe the best ever. Certainly the best when you consider his influence in both sports. I think it was in 1979 when Del Insko told dad about this guy Tom Durkin who he said was destined to become a great announcer.

"Sam McKee — Maybe the best horseman among us. When something was happening with a horse, whether it was about to get steppy, make a break, or make a move, it seemed that Sam was quicker to notice it even before the horse itself. His early passing was one of the greatest losses this industry has suffered.

"Speaking of race callers, I always remember a funny quote from one of the old greats. I think it was Fred Capossela. Fred was talking retirement because his vision wasn't quite as good as it had been. Good vision and a quick mind are absolutes when it comes to being a good race caller. Fred said, 'When my vision goes, I'll retire from calling races, but I hope to then become a race steward."

Is there anything else you might want to touch on?

"Maybe only a bit of advice from my dad. He left me a great example to follow. He was a protege of Stan Bergstein. I respect him as a great father and as one of the greatest of all practitioners of his craft. In the same manner as dad followed Stan, I hope that I've followed him, both as a good professional and as a decent human being."

She didn't need luck

When Katie's Lucky Day brought \$450,000 on OnGait earlier this week, it was a triumph for classic breeding. Of course, her own racing credentials didn't hurt — a record this year at th3ree of 1:50 4.5, with earnings of \$512,416.

Katie's Lucky Day is by Uncle Peter, and out of Yansky, by Muscles Yankee. I regard Uncle Peter as an underrated sire who not only holds his own and then some in the Ohio program but also can sire a world class racehorse such as Katie's Lucky Day.

Yansky, the dam of Katie's Lucky Day, evokes a number of memories for me. Her dam, Mystic Memory, is by B I's Mac, whose second dam is the immortal Matina Hanover. I bought Matina Hanover for a \$12,500 yearling credit off the half-mile track at Buffalo.

Her first two dams, both at Hanover, had done nothing worth noting, but her third dam was one of the foundation sisters that launched the Shoe Farms as a great farm. Not only did Matina Hanover give the world Mack Lobell, she also founded a family that is still influential in the pedigrees of many of the best trotters today.

Katie's Lucky Day's background is interesting. She was the fourth foal of Yansky, who had a 3-year-old record of 1:57 and earnings of \$122,127. Yansky hadn't produced anything of great merit before the filly we're talking about, although her foal a year before Katie did earn good money, although too late to save her half sister from bringing only \$7,000 in the sales ring.

Going back a generation, Katie's second dam, Mystic Memory, was a pretty good producer. Hand Glider, her first foal, won \$519,680, and three more of them won over \$100,000. But it's as you go back from there that the true class becomes apparent.

To begin at the beginning, as Portnoy advised in a totally different context, you find Evensong, a foal of 1925. Evensong was given a "breeder's record" at two of 2:19~34, just by the skin of her teeth beating the 2:20 standard that was required to be a recorded record.

Evensong had her first foal in 1930, and kept turning them out, with a few years here and there off, through 1949. During that time she produced six 2:00 horses, including Volo Song, who won the Hambletonian, and Victory Song, who finished second in the big dance his year. Of all the foals, there were only four fillies, but that was enough to keep the line alive and well.

A word here about Volo Song. He was invincible on the track, winning everything in a day and time when there were only rudimentary starting gates, no wheel disks, soft driver's hats, and judges who depended mainly on their own eyes.

Volo Song was 4 in 1944, still a war year, when there was a dearth of race meetings. Although Roosevelt Raceway, on Long Island, had been open for several years, it didn't offer many racing days. Technically those racing days were in fact racing nights, because George Morton

Levy was the first track operator to put up lights on his racetrack.

Parenthetically, much later, I had a complicated relationship with George Levy. Because of our shared religion, Judaism, and my higher education, Mr. Levy couldn't understand how I would always be present on the side of the horsemen when conflict arose — and they arose a lot. Mr. Levy felt that a fair split of the betting handle with the horsemen when it came to purses was 35-65. He also felt that any money devoted to stakes purses was money thrown to the winds. As a breeder, I naturally took the other side of that debate.

At one point, in the 1960s, Levy had totally corrupted the working head of the local horseman's association. The guy actually served as Levy's chauffer, and was well rewarded for complying with all of Levy's wishes. Later, the same guy was caught vote fixing on some important issue, but he still didn't lose his job.

About this time a vote by mail was taken, and on the return envelope with my vote, I wrote: "Count this one, Carl, even if it sends you to jail."

Shortly thereafter, the guy died, which didn't stop his estate from suing me for libel, which is slander in written form. It wound up costing me \$7,500. So much for being a wise guy.

Anyway, back to 1944 and Volo Song. There was a little race meeting every year at Mineral Point, WI. The track was known to be awful, but the fair operators there pleaded successfully with the connections of Volo Song to come there and show him off.

The result was that Volo Song broke his leg on the track, and had to be put down. As I was just getting in, there were still a number of horsemen around who had actually seen Volo Song in action. Every one of them told me that he was the only horse that could hold a candle to Greyhound.

That takes care of Katie's eighth dam, with the next stopping point being her sixth dam, Hoot Song. Hoot Song, foaled in 1954, was by Hoot Mon, and out of Love Song, by Volomite. Hoot Mon was by Scotland, so Hoot Song represented the classic Walnut Hall cross of the day, Volomite on Scotland, or vice-versa.

In point of fact, Volomite and Scotland were closely bred, as their grandsire on the top line, or tail-male, for both horses was Peter The Great. Just another proof that close breeding can get results.

Hoot Song had a record at three of 2:01 ¾, with earnings of \$133,713. That was a lot of money for a trotting filly to win in those days, and she did it the hard way.

In the 1957 Hambletonian, Hoot Song won two heats and still wound up in second place in the final standing to Hickory Smoke. That came about because she finished second to Hickory Smoke in the final race-off, after all the various elimination heats had been raced. She clearly was dead game, as well as fast, and we can see the same characteristics in her descendent, Katie's Lucky Day.

Although Yansky, Katie's dam, did win \$122,127, her second, third, fourth, and fifth dams won a grand total of \$44,590, of which \$42,040 was won by only one ancestor, Mystic Memory. It's proof once again that racing excellence has nothing to do with breeding excellence. Or, as you may be tired of hearing, the phenotype of any horse, the visible part, has no connection to the genotype, or genetic makeup.

So we can't see what Katie's genotype is until she has sons and daughters on the track. But based on her maternal line, the tail-mare bottom line of her pedigree, I'm betting she'll produce top trotters, just as all those other mares have done for the last one hundred years.

Finally, more words of wisdom from Dr. Samuel Johnson (1709-1784): "Promise, large promise, is the soul of an advertisement."





Punters' delicate condition, Part 3

In 1980, when Clint Galbraith and Niatross went on tour to display the pacer's brilliance in action to horse racing fans at racing venues that would never see him compete at the local levels offered, I was in attendance at Hollywood Park in Los Angeles, where the tour ended at Western Harness Racing's ill-fated standardbred meet.

The modest number of harness fans, in attendance regularly, were shocked but pleased to share the apron and grandstand with a record-breaking attendance for the sport on the "left coast."

For a long time after I kept the program from that evening, since Niatross raced in a wagering event that had to be written exclusively to include any local competitors coming near his class. Still, he was a lock and many people wagered just to have a ticket as a memento of the 1:52.1 winning mile (then a world record) with the length of a football field between the Niatross and the next best pacing chaser.

Without depending upon visits from the great pacers and trotters of the times, writing exclusive race conditions can be a productive tool for harness raceways. (We may take that subject up in a 2022 edition of Alternative Actions [AA], using star performers of the immediate times.)

We ended Part 2 of this triptych topic with the notion that a track public-relations or marketing person working with a race secretary should write creative race conditions for wagering and exhibition (separate to conditions for horsemen) to co-exist as instructional devices for novice bettors and challenges for veteran punters. We conclude with ideas.

The collaborators have few rules to follow. The publicist has to let his or her imagination fly to creatively approach conditions easy to understand by novices; the race secretary has to edit the conditions he or she posts to be sure horsemen are compelled to enter their products.

For horsemen, the race secretary can be relatively traditional,

using familiar forms for grouping horses, but the publicist's contribution has to complement the form as well as add special element (s). Here is where the publicist must employ every wild concoction until there is a blend broken down to a "common denominator."

Here are some extreme examples [with brackets for clarity] to prove the marketer can go crazy with traditional forms while being simple for the newer and older betting public:

\$4,000 [or any thousand] pacing harness horses for sale [replaces the term "claiming."] that have never won a race wire to wire.

\$4,000 [or any thousand] pacing harness horses for sale [replaces the term "claiming."] that have won their most recent race.

\$4,000 [or any thousand] trotting harness horses for sale [replaces the term "claiming."] horses that were losing favorites in their most recent race.

Trotters -10-year-olds [any year-olds] that have won at least a few [or a specific amount based upon the horses available] of their races.

Sure, you think some of these races are giveaways because the winner is obvious. That may attract veteran bettors (producing races filled with singles for multi-race exotics) but it may also make for a quick and easy cashing experience for newcomers; and let's face it, when novice bettors begin their pari-mutuel adventures cashing tickets, it sparks the flame that creates a new betting fan.

Gathering the elements to create a simple new race condition is going to take the vast talents of the racing secretary and his or her's unending patience because a marketing partner may go a long way to attract prospective regulars.

A neat plan involves presenting a specific program especially for novice players attending the races live. Offer a lot of give-aways (including free bets, bet-back refunds and other wagering related perks, as well as getting local or national sponsors to contribute items or coupons) to increase the local attendance. In all promotions, announce there will be opportunities for first-time or relatively new harness racing players to participate in the program's broadcast presentations.

For this to work, the "conditions duo" writes an entire card of simple races encouraging wagering from those with minimum handicapping experience (see above). Toss in the fact that the track announcer or simulcast host will call upon "new fans" in attendance to handicap the races over the in-house/simulcast broadcast (this is a practice the track can address from any level of gambler on regular racing evenings and another subject we may cover in 2022).

As always in topics AA addresses, we have thrown many ideas and concepts against the wall, but if any will stick is up to those in positions to scrape the wall and get an idea cooking. In the case of race conditions, the possibilities rely upon more imagination than AA supplies. Let's not lose potential pari-mutuel business by sitting back and hoping competition will go away; let's make the competition nervous for a change.

Happy holidays and New Year to everyone. We hope to stain the wall with more alternative on the fringe in 2022 to expand the popularity of our sport.

'Orange' crushes as Andy Miller wins 6 at Big M

Not even an abbreviated nine-race card could stop driver Andy Miller from putting up a big number at The Meadowlands Thursday night (Dec. 9), as the veteran reinsman won six times on the card.

Miller, 53, was fast out of the gate, taking the first race with 7-2 shot BNB for the other half of "Team Orange Crush", wife Julie, who trained the 4-year-old to a 1:53.4 score in a low-end conditioned fillies and mares pace.

"She's a funny horse because she doesn't like to go by horses," said Andy. "She was trapped until late and I snuck by them. You have to trick her into winning."

An impressive-looking 2-year-old gelded son of 2017 Meadowlands Pace winner Huntsville gave Miller a sweep of the Early Double as Hurrikane Jonnyboy, \$2.40 to win as the 1-5 public choice, won his second lifetime outing even more impressively than his first, hitting the wire 2¾ lengths clear of the field in 1:52.1 in a pacing division of the Toys for Tots Series for males. Trainer John McDermott has 2022 Meadowlands Pace thoughts dancing in his head.

"I think he's got a big future," said Miller. "He's very green and doesn't know what he's doing yet. He has to keep developing. He could possibly be a Meadowlands Pace type of horse."

After getting gunned down with 4-5 favorite Big Sweep Osborne in the third (as another Andy, McCarthy, guided 14-year-old Statesman N to victory lane), Miller got back on track in the fourth with 3-1 chance Scirocco Patrick in a low-end conditioned pace in 1:55 for trainer Mark Silva.

Miller's fourth win came in the fifth after a three-hole trip led to a late explosion along the pylons to score with Thaneeya at 7-2 in 1:54.3 for trainer Lewis Nunes in a low-end conditioned pace for females.

"I'm not the biggest fan of the three-hole," said Miller. "But a lot of people hate it, sometimes so much so that they over race their horses so they don't end up in that spot after doing things they wouldn't normally do because they don't want the three-hole."

For the fourth time on the card, Miller scored with a non-favorite as he guided 7-2 shot San Cristobal (trained by Julie) to a wire-to-wire win in 1:57.1 in the seventh in a division of the Toys for Tots for trotters to score for the fifth time on the night. The 3-year-old gelded son of Chapter Seven paid \$9.80 after going off at 7-2.

"We got lucky that Andy's [McCarthy, driving 9-5 favorite Heartofgold Devie] horse made a break and I was able to control the race," said Miller.

The man with the hot hands ran his gaudy victory total to a half-dozen in the eighth after a wire-to-wire score with the Joe Holloway-trained Superbly, an American Ideal 2-year-old who won another Toys for Tots pacing split, this one restricted to fillies. For just the second time on the program, Miller won with a favorite, as the 3-2 shot returned \$5.00 after finishing the mile in 1:52.3 to win for the first time from 12 career starts.

Miller's attempt to win a seventh race came up just short in the finale, as he missed while charging home with 8-1 shot Hurrikanekingjames, coming up a head short to McCarthy and Saranac Blue Chip.

"I thought I had Vinny [Ginsburg, guiding 4-5 favorite Frontier Rollo] beat but I didn't know if I could get by Andy Mac," said Miller. "I thought I was going to get up but missed by a whisker."

All in all, a pretty good night.

"Things worked out pretty good tonight," said Miller. "I thought I had a good lineup. One thing about The Meadowlands, anytime you get power there, you hope you can make the most if it. It's a tough place to win, and when things go your way like tonight, it's sure nice, because a lot of the time they don't."

Morrill, Giuliani take top honors at Batavia Downs

Jim Morrill Jr. and Jennifer Giuliani have been named the top driver and trainer of the 2021 Batavia Downs meet that came to a close on Saturday (Dec. 11).

Morrill had this title wrapped up at the halfway mark as he got off to a hot start in July and burned his way through November. Morrill finished the meet with 365 starts, 116 wins, 71 seconds and 46 thirds to post a stellar .468 UDR. Those 64 per cent in-the-money finishes garnered his connections \$714,074 in earnings making him the top earner as well.

Kevin Cummings finished second with 68 wins and \$504,137 in purses and the meet's Rising Star Award winner Kyle Cummings was third with 50 wins and \$394,862 banked.

Giuliani was in a tight race all year but came out on top with 41 wins, 24 seconds and 22 thirds out of 146 starts that produced \$207,379 in earnings and a UTR of .422. Her horses hit the board 60% of the time and she also trained the Batavia Downs claimer of the meet, Raksmach N.

Maria Rice finished second with 40 wins and \$311,602 in purses (which made her the highest earning stable on the grounds) and Gerry Sarama was third with 36 wins and \$234,722 earned.

Jim Morrill Jr. and Jennifer Giuliani will be presented a trophy from the Upstate New York Chapter of the United States Harness Writers Association for their achievements but since Morrill has already started his winter break and Giuliani has relocated to Pompano Park for winter racing, these awards will be presented when they return for the 2022 Batavia meet next July.

Nominations still open for Caretaker of the Year Award

Nominations are now being accepted for the 2021 Caretaker of the Year. The award, sponsored by Art Zubrod and Leah Cheverie's Fair Island Farm in conjunction with the United States Harness Writers Association (USHWA), recognizes the unsung heroes of the sport — the caretakers who maintain the health and welfare of the horses on a daily basis.

Any caretaker working for any stable or farm in North America is eligible to be the Fair Island Farm Caretaker of the Year. All that is needed to nominate is a letter or email, 200 words minimum, from an individual or group detailing the skills and special qualities of the caretaker.

The Fair Island Farm Caretaker of the Year will receive a cash prize of \$1,000 as well as transportation costs to the USHWA Dan Patch Awards banquet in Orlando, Fla, on Sunday night, Feb. 20, 2022, where he or she will be recognized and presented with a trophy. The winner will also enjoy a two-night stay at Rosen Shingle Creek, host hotel for the USHWA activities, as well as two complimentary dinner tickets. All nominated caretakers will receive a certificate recognizing their accomplishments.

"Leah and I are honored to continue the tradition of recognizing caretakers and the hard work they do on a daily basis," said Zubrod. "And it is especially gratifying to honor one most-deserving person as the Caretaker of the Year."

Initially titled Groom of the Year Award when first presented in 1982, the honor was instituted as a result of a suggestion made by Delvin Miller at the annual Harness Tracks of America meeting when he received HTA's Stanley F. Bergstein Messenger Award. Previously sponsored annually by HTA and Hanover Shoe Farms, the tradition was continued in 2015 by MGM Northfield Park and USHWA, with Fair Island Farm coming on board in 2019.

"Caretakers are the backbone of the racing industry, working mostly out of the spotlight, but most instrumental in the success of our equine athletes," said USHWA president Kimberly Rinker. "For 40 years the industry has recognized caretakers, and we are thrilled that Fair Island Farm will continued the tradition to honor one individual for their contributions."

The winner will be chosen by a seven-person selection committee comprised of USHWA members, all of whom are former caretakers: Tim Bojarski (chair), USHWA president Rinker, Tom Charters, Moira Fanning, Dean Hoffman, Rob Pennington and Shawn Wiles.

Nihilator / Albert Adams

Reading Murray Brown's Sunday column with Albert Adams (full story here), I was a bit taken by Albert's assessment of Nihilator and his disappointment at stud and some of his reasoning why.

I will be the first to acknowledge that Nihilator had a less than successful career at stud, though somewhat short lived. However, Albert's comment that he sired poor individuals and that he himself "had two front feet that looked like they might have belonged to two different horses," was what caught my attention.

That was simply not the case. Other than being a bit back in his knees, as was his sire Niatross but to a much greater degree, he was an outstanding and correct individual by all other measures. I think the attached Tony Leonard photo will attest to that.

Before I wrote you and while I had my own observation, I also checked with Ernie Gaskin for his recollections.

Other than Chuck Roback, Nihilator's caretaker from his first race to retirement, no one spent more time around him than Ernie, as the lead trainer for the Haughton Stable, and he wholeheartedly agreed with my recall.

Perhaps Albert was thinking of Niatross, who did in fact have different front feet, with one that could have been described as clubby. Whether that be the case or not, I do know that his

Please don't phase out freeze branding

I am a USTA member and a volunteer coordinator for Safe Harbor Sanctuary in Tennessee. We are a 501(c)3 Non Profit equine rescue, rehabilitation and rehoming sanctuary. My team of volunteers are boots on the ground working with standardbred horses. We rescue, rehome, and benefit standardbreds and their owners throughout southern Kentucky and middle Tennessee. We take in horses from local animal controls. We don't buy off of dealers or catalogs. We also go to auctions to intercept between the local Amish community and the brokers who then sell the thinner older horses on Facebook for higher profits.

At these auctions, horses are squeezed in on top of each other. Scared, starving, and agitated. We can't always get close to a horse to scan for a microchip or take pictures. Sadly, we can't rescue all of the horses. We do the best we can. But, when we spot a freeze branded standardbred, our eyes light up because they are five-star candidates for rehoming. Due to their training they make wonderful family and farm horses.

Changing the freeze brand requirements will negatively affect our work. We have taken in 35 standardbreds since January, 2016. The first was Marley (registered name Rohan), he was seized by animal control in a terrible neglect case with one dead horse on the property. Marley was IDed via his freeze brand and we discovered he was a harness racer from Kentucky. My personal rescued standardbred, Bosco (that's his registered name), who was also a harness racer from 1998-2004, found himself starved and neglected at an auction in 2016. He was spotted due to his freeze brand in a pack of horses crammed together in a pen. Bosco is a wonderful horse and as his owner, I assure you his rescue has positively impacted my local economy.

Overall, living horses are much better for the agriculture economy than dead horses. Comparing the few hundreds made from a slaughtered horse to the vast amount of money spent on a horse for the rest of their lives going toward the feed store, the hay farmer, the farrier, the veterinarian, transportation revenue, and so forth. Our latest standardbred, Dude In The Denali, was rescued this past winter from an auction. As he was easily spotted in a mix of bay horses due to his freeze brand. He is now striving with his new owner. We have never encountered an adopter turning down a horse because of their branding.

ALL of the others, the 32 out of the 35 I didn't mentioned, were IDed via freeze brand. Freeze brand connects the horse to his registration papers, tell us his age, their pedigree, and their history. Without it, he's just another bay gelding. We don't want to stop racing and we're not asking for money. In fact rescuing and rehoming standardbreds puts money back into the economy. Please consider not phasing out freeze branding and not hindering us from the ability to ID them.
