Breeder, owner, gambler Seth Rosenfeld has had a rich life in the game

The man that produced arguably the hottest standardbred family in all of harness racing said he has loved the sport since growing up at Lana Lobell Farms.

Seth Rosenfeld says, "I've always loved harness racing." Always, translates to basically all the 54 years that he has been on this planet. From his first exposure to trotters and pacers, they became a life obsession.

His mom, Lana, and father, Jack, are respectively the sister and brother in law of Alan Leavitt and were involved with Lana Lobell Farms which was in Bedminster, NJ.

His first recollection of a major attraction to racehorses was when his parents owned the great pacing filly and soon to be great family founder Pammy Lobell.

Seth, was 5 or 6 years old. Wherever Pammy went, Seth tried to go as well. He usually succeeded. However at that time, he wasn't old enough to get into most racetracks. But usually, where there was a will, Seth and his parents would find a way – whether it was getting into the paddock or just looking through the fence on the backstretch.

Pammy Lobell was a truly great filly. She earned \$354,497 when that was a huge amount of money and won stakes all over North America at 2, 3 and 4. As great a race filly as she

was, she was an even better broodmare. She was the first mare to produce five in 1.55, including the world champion filly Halcyon who earned \$855,588.

Beginning at the age of 11, Seth spent his summers working at Lana Lobell Farms.

He was privileged to be involved with some of the greatest horses and people in the history our sport.

His job at Lana Lobell was mostly to work with the prospective customers who came to look at that year's crop of yearlings.

It was a great learning experience for a kid who was totally engrossed in harness racing.

During the day, he spent his time at a gorgeous horse farm where some of the greatest horses in the history of the sport were housed and where virtually all of the great names in harness racing visited on an almost daily basis.

Every evening that they were racing, he would be found at The Meadowlands, then at the peak of its prowess as the greatest harness track in the world.

It was during those evenings that he began betting on horses. He has never stopped. He is one of the very few gamblers who through the years has been regularly successful.

Upon graduation from high school, he attended Cornell University for four years and graduated with a major in American Studies and Government.

Summers of course, were devoted to harness racing, mostly at The Meadowlands.

In the interim, he began dabbling in horse ownership and eventually began breeding his own.

In terms of great horses as an owner, Beach Towel would certainly stand out. There have been other great ones that he bred and sold as yearlings with perhaps Sweet Lou being the standout.

His first great buy, two years before he bought Beach Towel, was the filly Sweet Dahrlin. He was part of a group that bought her for \$26,000. He loved the filly herself, but he also recalled Billy Haughton saying that her dam Fly Fly Dahrlin was the best filly of her year, but that she was kind of a semi unknown because her racing was restricted to the New York tracks.

The year he bought Sweet Dahrlin was a year after Haughton died. Seth has always wondered if, had Haughton lived, would he have bought her and, if so, would she have had a different career for different owners.


After her racing career was over, Seth bred Sweet Dahrlin


to Falcon's Future and she produced Seth's "Blue Hen" broodmare Sweet Future, the dam of champions Sweet Lou and Bettor Sweet. Sweet Future also produced the dams of champions Captain Crunch (Sweet Paprika) and Youaremycandygirl (Sweet Lady Jane). Some might consider this the hottest family in all of harness racing.

For a small breeder Seth Rosenfeld has done extraordinarily well. Of course, Sweet Future and her success has proven to be a good part of it. Consider Oct. 29, 2011, the night both Sweet Lou and Bettor Sweet won Breeders Crowns at Woodbine.

A few years after Sweet Future's arrival in 1998, Seth was at the Tattersalls sale looking to buy a pacing colt, preferably one not eligible to the Kentucky Sires Stakes, then the regional stakes with the least appeal. He saw a French Chef colt, who's dam Sunburn he had seen race and admired. To that point, she hadn't produced much, but he thought she was overdue to have a good one. French Chef was hot as well, having produced Amity Chef and Frugal Gourmet around that time. Seth looked at the colt and really liked him. The price of \$22,000 was right. So he bought him and gave him to Ray, Larry and Gord Remmen to train.

That was Beach Towel, of course, and he turned out to be the best of his crop. He ended up winning \$2,091,860 at 2

and 3 and was voted both the Two and Three-Year-Old pacer of 1989 and 1990, respectively. Among his wins were the Meadowlands Pace, the Little Brown Jug, Breeders Crown and numerous other stakes races. Incidentally, Seth had horses in training with the Remmen brothers for 35 consecutive years – right until they retired.

Seth spent the next few years wagering on horses, managing the stud career of Beach Towel and both raising and racing a few horses for his own account.

In 2002, he felt burnt out. It was shortly after 9/11. The daily New York City commute to The Meadowlands was getting to him. A factor, but not the main motivating factor, was that the betting pools at The Big M were decreasing in size. Seth has always considered himself as being a value better. Values were becoming increasing difficult to find.

He decided to move to California and try his hand at betting the thoroughbreds.

He still stayed involved with breeding and raising harness horses and in racing the odd one, but for the most part his wagering would be switched to the thoroughbreds.

There is a vast difference between betting on harness horses and on thoroughbreds. Most would think the thoroughbreds are more difficult to handicap and they would be right. There are so many more variables. Furthermore, they race so less frequently that it can be far more difficult to remember their physical appearance.


Gradually, Seth adapted to the differences. There was no specific area, but he began to understand speed figures, factors such as distance, weight and other areas that had to be part of his decision making.

One of the areas where he felt he had an edge in betting harness racing was in workouts and physical appearance. He has tried to adapt that to judging thoroughbreds. He religiously watches workouts which are available online and sometimes with commentary. How fast they go is often secondary to their physical appearance and how they appear to be doing their work.

I recently had several conversations with Seth speaking of his rather unusual career.

Seth, you worked for several years at Lana Lobell Farms under and with some of the most renowned farm managers and horsemen in the sport's history. Tell us about some of them.

Jim Harrison— “Jim had a sometimes deserved reputation of being rough and tough with little patience with people. He could be quite intimidating. People had a tendency to tread lightly in his presence. I was one of the lucky ones. I spent a lot of time with him and asked him a lot of

questions. I can't remember ever receiving a harsh word from him. Something I remember is when we were having so much success with Beach Towel, he would drop a note of congratulations periodically."

Hal Jones – "Hal was a down to earth person. He was a great and very practical horseman. I learned a lot just being with and listening to him. He and his wife Marie were very kind to me when they were living on the farm. I'd go over to the Jones family consignment in Kentucky each year and talk and reminisce with both of them."

Kenny Seeber – "Dr. Seeber was a great and very unique guy. He started out as a racetrack veterinarian and soon rose to be recognized as one of, if not the very best. He then went to managing Lana Lobell Farms where he did an exceptional job. Then he decided to become a horse trainer. Within a very short period of time and with great help and confidence from Lou Guida he almost immediately had one of the top Grand Circuit Stables. Then he went back to being a top racetrack vet, where he excelled. He influenced my choice of Cornell. He told me Ithaca wasn't really that cold... which I came to doubt when it had snowed four times before Thanksgiving my freshman year. Of course he came from Watertown, New York, which is often one of the coldest spots in the country."

Bruce Nickells – "He was at Lana Lobell for a couple of summers helping to prep the yearlings. It was somewhat of a lull in his career. He was training a few, but didn't have the power that he had previously been known for. He is a brilliant horseman – always thinking, always looking for something new and better. I became really good friends with him. Shortly after he left he went on his filly rampage with Follow My Star, Miss Easy, Immortality and some others."

Best driver you've seen?

"John Campbell, all alone. Talented, ultra-intelligent, always well prepared, wise. He was always the first and sometimes the only driver to understand track bias and use it to his benefit."

Best jockey you've seen?

"Mike Smith – prepared. Always ready when the big money is down."

Best harness trainer?

"William R Haughton. He could do everything. He loved solving problems. He made good horses out of many bad ones. It's said that couldn't be done, but somehow he could. It's hard to imagine that he ran that big a stable in an era before cell phones and the Internet."

Best thoroughbred trainer?

"Bob Baffert. Just look at his record. It speaks for itself. I know that there are too many positives, but I still think he is the best. I also think he gives effective and detailed jockey

instructions and is a master of analyzing and adapting to track biases."

You've been involved with breeding and raising your own horses for well over 30 years. Most would say you've been pretty darn successful with that as well.

"Much the same as with the racing of my horses, my primary trainers for 35 years were Ray Remmen and his brothers Larry and Gord. They always told the truth as they saw it – good or bad. They were fair and honest and did a great job. That's all I ever wanted."

"The same applies to my relationship with David Meirs and Chris Coyle who have been involved in breeding, raising and selling my horses for over 30 years. They are excellent communicators, do a great job with the horses and are honest. We have such a close relationship that I can usually tell what's coming in a conversation after just a few words are spoken."

"Another horse that I and Dave Meirs bred that I feel a great affinity for is No Lou Zing one of the top 3-year-olds this year. Not only is he by Sweet Lou, a horse I bred, but his fifth dam is Pammy Lobell the mare that I feel got me started on this wonderful trip."

In addition to being active in breeding and a little racing you are involved in several other areas of the sport. Tell us about them.

"I've been a director of the Hambletonian Society for several years. Its comprised of a great group of owners and breeders who's primary goal is for the betterment of our sport in addition to administering most of our stakes races. Northfield park staple Terror of Thetrack set to make 500th career start before year ends

In pari-mutuel racing, there are no dollars awarded for longevity. Bettors and the horseman's bookkeeper don't care if you show up each week and finish off the board.

Perhaps they should. No one is looking for a gold watch and a pension, but a little love wouldn't hurt.

Some of it could be directed towards Barn D on the Northfield Park backstretch where Terror of Thetrack lives. If there was ever a racetrack survivor – and a squatter to boot – it's this 14-year-old moderate brown pacing gelding.

Before 2020 ends in a few weeks, and his racing days are over, and unless he stubs a toe, Terror Of Thetrack will become only the 17th horse in the history of North American harness racing to have made 500 career starts. There is no active trotter or pacer that has started more times than him.

Trained and driven by veteran Keith Kash, Terror Of Thetrack is in the sixth race Wednesday (Dec. 16) at Northfield to make his 499th lifetime start.

There is no catching the all-time start leader, Jersey Buddy. He went to the post 621 times.

"I don't know how they did it," said Kash.

Jersey Buddy, a foal of 1976, did it by averaging 51.7 starts a year for 12 years. He was at his busiest as an 11-year-old, making an astonishing 69 starts in 1987, mainly at Northside Downs in North Sydney, NS.

Never has a horse worked so hard for so little. Jersey Buddy won 54 times, added 74 runner-up and 104 third place finishes, yet earned just \$28,364. He never paced a mile any faster than 2:07.3.

Terror Of Thetrack has proven to be much quicker and better paid. He's won 39 times, banked \$196,264 and, as a 7-year-old, spun a 1:53.3 mile at Northfield.

Kash claimed the Ontario-bred son of Breeders Crown champion Western Terror out of the unraced Coal Mountain mare, Over the Coals, for \$7,000 in 2012 when he was a 6-year-old. He has raced for Melinda Kash, Keith's wife, ever since.

"He was clean-legged and he traveled really nice," said Kash. "He was just put together decently and is always knocking on the door."

Especially if that door is attached to a barn at Northfield



Park. Terror Of Thetrack never strays very far from home. He has made 369 consecutive raceway starts at Northfield Park. The streak started in the fall of 2012. The only time he's vanned in and out of the stable gate at the northern Ohio oval was in August of 2018 for a fair start in nearby Canfield (Mahoning County) a race that he won.

Kash admits that Terror Of Thetrack has become somewhat of the stable pet.

He's as big as a house. Maybe, too fat," Kash said. "I tell my wife all the time you need to cut his grain back."

Only twice in his racetrack career has Terror Of Thetrack earned more than \$25,000, but Kash says he's paid his way.

"If he would have had owners paying a training bill, they would have lost money," said Kash. "But my wife and I do most of the work. Melinda is the backbone of the operation. She's the equipment manager and handles just about everything else. The only real expense we have with him is shoeing. He's a once-a-month horse at about \$120."

Also keeping down Terror Of Thetrack's room and board is his genetic make-up.

"He is unbelievably sound," said Kash. "I've never had to have his joints injected. He's never been on Lasix. At \$20 a shot, that's a heck of a savings. He's just a low maintenance horse."

Terror Of Thetrack has averaged 41.6 starts a season for 12 years. He didn't race as a 2-year-old and lost three months of action earlier this year when Northfield Park shut down because of the coronavirus pandemic.

Kash knows they'll be a hole in the racing operation when Terror Of Thetrack exits at the end of the year.

"We've got a good home for him on a farm when he's done racing, but my daughter Kylee has a pony that is in the stall next to Terror Of Thetrack. There is only a half wall between the two of them. When one of them leaves, the other one hollers his head off. Yes, we're going to miss this guy. He's become family."

Hoosier and Yonkers show creativity in scheduling for 2021

Both tracks are trying different race nights in 2021 with the hope of boosting handle.

Harrah's Hoosier Park and Yonkers Raceway will both experiment with an adjusted schedule for the upcoming year's racing season with the clear intent of further bolstering handle. With Hoosier Park's dates formally approved and with Yonkers announced and pending New York State Gaming Commission (NYSGC) approval, the changes will go into effect as soon as a few weeks from now when Yonkers resumes in January of 2021.

Hoosier Park doesn't begin their new season until the end of March, and at that time they will do so by including live racing on Sunday evenings. It's something that Hoosier has done before, though not since earlier in the 2000s. Director of racing for Caesar's Entertainment Gabe Prewitt announced the change on Friday (Dec. 11), and I'm certain he sees an opportunity on that night of the week due to lesser amounts of competition elsewhere.

It comes down to rather simple logic. The fewer tracks that run on a given night, the higher the handle will be for the

tracks that do run. You can try to stagger and drag post times on nights when you're competing with 10 other tracks, but that only goes so far. At the end of the day, it's far easier to just race when the others aren't.

One of the biggest stories in racing this year will have been the astonishingly high handle figures that came out of Scioto Downs. And that may not be due solely – but to at least a large extent – to the fact that they were the first track to start back up following the earlier season's shutdown. With a couple of weeks' head start on others, they were the only game in town for a while. And then when other tracks did start back, Scioto had enough eyes on it from prior that it was able to sustain its momentum.

Conversely, tracks that started later and got lost in the shuffle of the usual day to day, did not see gains. Such was the case at Harrah's Philadelphia which saw handle decline post-shutdown, and the track's director of racing Barry Brown attributed that decline to starting back later than other tracks.

The same relationship of fewer tracks to higher handle is seen right now at this time of year. The only evening tracks in the U.S. during most weeknights are Yonkers, Pompano and Northfield. These three tracks face minimal competition from even the thoroughbreds and can work together on these nights in coordinating race times. It's the reason that these tracks routinely see their highest race-night handles of the year in December including a few \$1 million dollar nights.

Hoosier likely won't have Sunday nights exclusively to itself, but it'll be close. In Chicago tradition, Hawthorne has raced on Sunday evenings and should likely do so again next year. But I'd assume the tracks will ensure that they complement each other rather than directly compete with one another. It'd be something similar to when Balmoral and Woodbine harness used to race concurrently on Sunday nights.

The other change approved for the upcoming Hoosier season is that racing will be conducted on Thanksgiving eve and on Thanksgiving Day. Perhaps coincidental, the latter was suggested in this column a couple of weeks ago ([full story here](#)) in comparing the success of the thoroughbred tracks that race on the U.S. holiday while it remains a dark day in harness racing outside of Canada.

It'll be a tremendous opportunity for Hoosier to be the lone U.S. track in the sport racing that day, and handle will be bound to reflect that. If I could make one more unsolicited suggestion, the track should add a stake or two to that card for good measure. You could have something like a \$100k Pilgrim Pace Invitational and a \$100k Turkey Trot Invitational; it would really make for a highly-anticipated card.

At Yonkers, the big change is the dropping of its Saturday card and replacing it with a Wednesday. With that move, the track will keep the traditional five-day-a-week schedule but will now run Monday straight through Friday. On the surface it might sound dire to not race on the night of racing with the best quality horses, but from a handle perspective it's completely the right move.

First and foremost, Yonkers now gets away from having to compete with the Meadowlands on Saturday. A cause of contention for Yonkers has been trying to coordinate race times against inconsistent drag times at the Meadowlands, so this will resolve that on Saturdays. And as an aside, is it really not possible for the Meadowlands to again not race more than two days any week in

2021? I've said this before, but how hard could it be to bring back winter-series racing and that alone could almost fill two other cards each week in the winter months.

Back to Yonkers though – even though they race their best horses on Saturdays, it's their Monday and Tuesday cards that always produce the highest handles of the week. Saturday never comes close.

The idea is that Wednesday handles will produce handle comparable to their figures from Monday and Tuesday, as the competition from other tracks is far more kind on a Wednesday than it is on a Saturday. It's true that on-track attendance and on-track handle would suffer as a result without Saturday, but with people becoming more and more accustomed to wagering from home now, I'd think that effect would be negligible. With the change, the 5-day a week total at Yonkers next year will be higher than normal.

For both Hoosier and Yonkers, the idea behind the scheduling is to put their product in the most favorable positions possible. Racing whenever possible against limited competition has been proven to generate higher handle and has the possibility of attracting newer interests in those products. They are positive steps heading into the new year.

Legendary Meadowlands executive Joe DeFrank dead at 87

Word came just before press time that legendary Meadowlands executive Joe DeFrank died peacefully Saturday (Dec. 12). He was 87. DeFrank had been in failing health for some time and was in hospice care at home in New Jersey.

The announcement was made on Facebook by DeFrank's daughter, Michelle Goudreau.

DeFrank, who was inducted into the Harness Racing Hall of Fame in 1994, is perhaps best known as the first director of racing at The Meadowlands when it opened in 1976 – remaining in that position throughout the track's golden period.

He introduced the Meadowlands Pace, the sport's first million-dollar race and the Woodrow Wilson, which grew to a purse of more than \$2 million. DeFrank was also instrumental in bringing the Hambletonian to the Meadowlands, as well as convincing numerous star

horsepeople – Hall of Famers John Campbell and Ray Remmen among them – to relocate to New Jersey to race at The Big M.

When Garden State Park opened in 1985, DeFrank was appointed racing secretary in addition to his responsibilities at the Meadowlands.

A biography on the Harness Racing Museum's website ([full story here](#)) said DeFrank: "became addicted to harness racing as a youngster at Batavia Downs, near his home in Holly, NY. There he met his mentor and long-time friend Don D'Andrea, who later recommended to 1985 Hall of Famer Jim Lynch that DeFrank be given a chance as an assistant in the race office at Hilliards Raceway, Ohio in 1956. Four years later DeFrank had already taken entries at Baltimore Raceway, Green Mountain Park, Grandview, Northfield, The Meadows, Painesville, Windsor, Freehold, Brandywine and Ponce DeLeon."

The Meadowlands followed and cemented DeFrank's legend in the annals of the sport.

Harrah's Hoosier Park will race into December in 2021

The Indiana track will also spend more than \$2 million on capital improvements with most of that on a surveillance system for the barn area. "I think it just goes along with our commitment to integrity," said vice president and general manager Rick Moore.

Harrah's Hoosier Park will conduct a 2021 harness meet that will extend into the month of December, marking a first for the Indiana oval. The Indiana Horse Racing Commission (IHRC) approved a plan Thursday, (Dec. 10) where the Anderson track will conduct 160 days of racing over 37 weeks. The idea behind the plan, negotiated between the track and the Indiana Standardbred Association (ISA), is to offer more racing opportunities late in the year.

"The way our business model is, most horses race weekly. We haven't changed the number of race days, but it's going to be slightly different," said ISA president Joe Putnam. "We added a couple more weeks on the very end of the meet; they will be three-day weeks. By adding a handful of weeks, that's just more opportunity for everybody to stay home and continue to race."

The 2021 campaign will kick off with opening weekend cards on Friday, March 26 and Saturday, March 27. Hoosier is slated to move to a three-day second week to open the month of April before expanding to four days a week the remainder of the month on a Wednesday through Saturday plan. In mid-May, the track will offer five days of racing, with a schedule that is a departure from the past. Hoosier has dropped Tuesday racing in favor of Sunday cards for 2021.

"I like the fact that we have four days for the first month and a half when you don't know what the winter will be and you don't know how many horses are going to be ready. I think it's going to help us keep full fields and 13 or 14 races," said Rick Moore, vice president and general manager of racing at Harrah's Hoosier Park. "We're trading Tuesdays for Sundays. We're going to try it. We're not going to stick with the status quo; we're going to try some things. If it doesn't work and we don't see the handle we think we're going to see, we'll move back to Tuesdays. We're at least going to give it a good, honest effort, and see what it does for us."

The schedule will contract to four days each week beginning in October, and to three in November, with the meet closing in the first week of December. Pari-mutuel racing has not been held in the month of December in the Hoosier State since Indiana Downs' (now the



thoroughbred-only Indiana Grand) inaugural 19-day meet in 2002. This season, the racing calendar was extended at Hoosier when compared to past meetings, with good results.

"This year we raced to the 21st of November, so it was a couple weeks longer than previous seasons. It seemed like there were plenty of horses available, plenty of opportunity," said Putnam. "I think it worked out pretty well, so we're just expanding upon that."

When the transfer of horse racing licenses to Eldorado Resorts Inc. was approved by the IHRC in July, one of the stipulations included the establishment of a Racing Capital Escrow Fund with \$25 million earmarked to spend over a 10-year period. As part of that commitment, projects with an estimated price tag of \$2.15 million are underway at Hoosier Park. The most significant of the investments is a barn area surveillance system which will cost \$1.5 million.

"I think it just goes along with our commitment to integrity. Not saying anyone is not doing the right thing, but let's ensure that everyone is doing the right thing here on track," Moore said. "We want Hoosier Park to be known as having the fairest playing field of any track in the country. When you do that, I think you'll see new barns coming here. I think that will attract folks."

Other items include rebuilding Barn 4 on the backside, purchase of a garbage truck and spreader, and replacement of dorm floors. Moore said the barn had served as a catch all, and is currently being prepared for the installation of 60 stalls, which are on order. All of the work will be complete before Hoosier Park opens for live racing in 2021.

"They are sticking to their commitment. There are several different projects and new equipment. Stalls back in Barn 4. Security cameras in the barns. Just committing to keeping a first-class facility and also taking the integrity part of the business serious," Putnam said. "This just further commits to that, and their standards also. Joe Morris alluded to it, setting the gold standard. It is kind of setting the bar high. I feel like our bar has always been higher than some. It's sort of setting the standard for the whole country."

Close race for leading stallion honors for 2020

It's a tight race and two great pacers – Bettor's Delight and Somebeachsomewhere – are battling for first place.

No, this race isn't taking place on a track, but, instead, in the sire statistics compiled for stallions in North America. As of Saturday (Dec. 12), with only a few weeks left in the bizarre year of 2020, Bettor's Delight has offspring with earnings of \$16.5 million while Somebeachsomewhere is

just a nose behind with nearly \$16.4 million. Both stallions are some \$6 million ahead of third-place Captaintreacherous.

The stats are compiled by the US Trotting Association and available on its website.

Bettor's Delight has an edge partially because he had more soldiers in his 2020 army than Somebeachsomewhere. This year, 635 pacers by Bettors Delight have competed in North America while Somebeachsomewhere had 507 starters.

Over on the trotting side of the ledge, there is no race. Muscle Hill is dominating the sire stats just as easily as he dominated his pursuers on the track. His offspring have earned \$9.6 million this year while Chapter Seven is far behind in second place with \$7.8 million.

In the weeks remaining until the final races of the season, it's likely that Bettor's Delight will maintain or increase his lead over Somebeachsomewhere and wear the crown as the leading stallion in the sport.

The richest warriors in the legions of pacers representing Bettor's Delight include the recently-retired millionaires Bettor's Wish (\$2,601,233) and Horse of the Year favorite Tall

Dark Stranger (\$2,020,195).

The ageless gelding Bettor's Edge padded his bankroll in 2020 to go past \$2.2 million as an 11-year-old.

We can also think back to such Bettor's Delight offspring as All Bets Off, Lazarus N, Darlin's Delight, Bettor Sweet, Shebestingin, Bettor Sweet, and so many more.

Bettor's Delight will turn 23 on Jan. 1 and many can recall his storied racetrack rivalry with Real Desire. Bettor's Delight was as handy as a Swiss Army Knife and Real Desire was virtually supersonic at times. The duels delighted racing fans.

The meteoric Somebeachsomewhere died in early 2018 and his top performers in 2020 were the mare Kissin In The Sand (\$1.7 million) and a quartet of geldings Dorsoduro Hanover (\$1.9 million), Somewhere In LA (\$1.8 million), Filibuster Hanover (\$1.8 million), and This Is The Plan (\$1.7 million). Career earnings are shown.

THE SON ALSO RISES

Somebeachsomewhere is dead but his heir apparent is obvious because Captaintreacherous ranks third on the overall sires list as his 2020 pacers banked more than \$10.4 million. He accomplished that with only 343 foals of racing age while the other stallions in the top six on the pacing list had in excess of 1,000 foals at the racing wars.

MUSCLE HILL TOPS TROTTERS

The results on the list of trotting sires is much like the results when Muscle Hill raced. To paraphrase a famous tribute: *"Muscle Hill in front... the rest nowhere."*

That's hyperbole, of course, but Muscle Hill is almost \$2 million ahead of his nearest rival Chapter Seven as Muscle Hill's offspring have earned \$9.6 million in 2020 while Chapter Seven checks in at \$7.8 million. The others are far behind.

I had the pleasure of seeing Muscle Hill both seasons he raced, but I contend that he never actually *raced*. The term "race" implies competition, but Muscle Hill was so superior to his pursuers that his races were, in fact, more exhibitions than competitions.

He's transferred his extraordinary skills on the track to his offspring. For a brief review, I'll just mention the names Marion Marauder, Manchego, Resolve, Ariana G, Southwind Frank, Mission Brief, Ramona Hill, Bar Hopping. What The Hill, Green Manalishi, and When Dovescry. Perhaps you've heard of them – certainly you should because they're all millionaires foaled in the past decade. Look for future superstars by Muscle Hill at your local racetracks.

But no one should ignore the impact of Chapter Seven, the 12-year-old son of the ill-fated Windsong's Legacy. He's hit some home runs early in his career and he's getting quality mares at Blue Chip in New Year.

The late Somebeachsomewhere is a close second in the all-ages standings for pacing stallions.

For those who may have fallen asleep during the pandemic of 2020, Chapter Seven was represented at the races this year by Gimpanzee, Atlanta, Hypnotic AM, all millionaires. Toss in others from the past such as Walner and Woodside Charm and you can easily see Chapter Seven's impact. (It's interesting to note that four of the five richest performers by Chapter Seven are females).

The leading money-winning stallions get the prettiest girls and their offspring usually wind up in good hands. That's a big advantage. I find that the "average earnings per foal" statistic found on the USTA website to be very valuable. You will often see a lesser-known name pop up among the famous stallions. Pay attention and do your homework. That's often an indication that a stallion is finding success without all the advantages that the glamor boys enjoy. That may present a breeding or buying opportunity for the smart owner.

Four huge reasons why females ruled the game in 2020

1. For the first time ever two females were favored in the two richest races on the calendar. In the \$1 million Mohawk Million, Donna Soprano was 80 cents on the dollar (and finished second to Venerate trained by Julie Miller). In the \$1 million Hambletonian, Ramona Hill was the favorite and winner for trainer Tony Alagna. The last time a female horse was the favorite in a million-dollar race with the boys was in 2000 when Moni Maker was the bettors' choice in the first \$1 million Breeders Crown event. She was the lead part of an entry sent off at 50 cents on the dollar. She finished second to Magician. Before that, it was in the 1992 Hambletonian when Armbro Keepsake went off the lukewarm 2.20-1 choice but was fourth in the Alf Palema year.

2. The likely 1-2 or 2-1 finishers in the Horse of the Year balloting won the very same race in the same time – the Tattersalls in 1:47.2. Tall Dark Stranger (for Nancy Takter) and Party Girl Hill (for Chris Ryder). Never has this happened before with a male and female horse.

3. For the second time in three years, the fastest 2-year-old was a filly. Test Of Faith recorded a 1:48.4 mile two years after Warrawee Ubeaut won in a 1:48.3 world record.

4. Nancy Takter won three Breeders Crowns and was the unanimous selection as Trainer of the Year. Takter has won five Crowns in two seasons and eight overall. She's likely to

also win her second Horse of the Year trophy with her trainee Tall Dark Stranger the favorite.

Freshmen separated by a hair

Look at the results from Metro Night in Canada and the Breeders Crown at Hoosier, freshmen only. In eight features the combined margin of victory over both tracks was just 2 ¼ lengths.

Exploit won the Metro by a half-length over Bayfield Beach. The She's A Great Lady was won by a head, even though there was a DQ and Caviart Audrey was declared the winner. On A Streak won the William Wellwood by a head over Southwind Tyrion. Venerate won the Mohawk Million by ¾ of a length over Donna Soprano. On Breeders Crown night, Lady Chaos won by a head in the 2YOFT, On A Streak won the 2YOCT by ¾ of a length, Perfect Sting and Summa Cum Laude dead-heated in the 2YOCP and Fire Start Hanover won the 2YOFP by a head.

McCarthy on the clock

Attention Andrew McCarthy: No driver has won the Hambletonian back-to-back since John Campbell did so in 1987-1988 with Mack Lobell and Armbro Goal, respectively. In the 21 years since, the record for the previous year's winning driver is 0-3-2 and 11 times the previous year's winning driver did not make it to the final the following year.

No driver going for two straight Hambletonians in 32 years has been favored to do so, either.

McCarthy won this year's Hambletonian with Ramona Hill. Can he break the streak in 2021?

The great beyond

Six of the 13 winners in the Breeders Crown this year were sired by a horse who have left us. Somebeachsomewhere had four winners, and Sebastian K and Mach Three one each. This is the most of any single Crown year.

Julie Miller - Trainer

Working alongside her husband, Andy, day in and day out is not a problem for trainer Julie Miller. In fact, she considers herself lucky and blessed to be doing what she loves – and get paid for it – with Andy who is not only her husband, but her best friend.

“I am very lucky to work alongside my husband. It all comes down to trust and respect and we have confidence in each other,” said Julie.

Born in 1972 in Marion, IA, Miller grew up on the family farm and began training, grooming, taking care of the track and managing the farm at an early age. She worked for her parents, Owen and Ellen Julius, before getting a job at Fairmont Park under trainer Ron Liles.

Julie got a bachelor’s degree in science from Southern Illinois University, but her first love was and always will be harness racing.

“My family raced mostly in Iowa and Illinois. It was in the early ‘90s while racing horses in Springfield, IL that I met my future husband, Andy Miller.”

Andy is known as “The Orange Crush” due to his orange racing colors and successful career in the sulky. Together, they are called “Team Orange Crush.”

Andy was the top driver on the Chicago circuit before coming east and finding even more success. He became the 22nd driver in North American history to get 9,000 sulky wins.

Although Andy does most of the driving, occasionally Julie gets her turn in the sulky.

“I love to drive,” she said. “Any opportunity to qualify or drive a horse I jump at. When I was 19 years old I won my first pari-mutuel race.

“Although I would love to drive more, when you’re married to one of the best drivers in the country – and our son is

following in his dad’s footsteps – my chances are limited.”

Julie won her first race as a trainer in 1993 at Quad City Downs. Her career as a trainer took off in the late 2000s when she and Andy relocated to the east coast. In 2007, her stable cracked the \$1 million mark in earnings and was victorious in more than 100 races for the first time in 2009.

Today, the Millers race mostly on the east coast following the Grand Circuit to Indiana, Kentucky, Canada and Ohio.

“My favorite tracks to race at are the Red Mile and the Meadowlands for the best Grand Circuit races take place there.

“We currently have a 30-horse stable at Gaitway Farms in New Jersey. We own 3 broodmares and for us that’s enough for I am foremost a trainer and not a breeder.

“But it is a thrill when you breed one and he goes on to be a good one. As far as my best horse – there have been so

many who have touched my heart, but I would have to say VENERATE was the best horse I raised. He was the smartest and fastest horse I have ever been involved in developing and gave me my biggest thrill by winning the inaugural Mohawk Million.

“But any horse that overcomes any obstacles to be the best they can be and race to the best of their ability holds a place in my heart. Besides VENERATE, MET’S HALL and DESIGNED TO BE are at the top of the list, too.”

What does Julie look for when purchasing a yearling?

“When I buy a horse, of course conformation and proportion are very important, but most of all, they need that ‘wow’ factor. Athleticism and charisma is a must, but ‘a good feeler’ and how they move in the field are all signs of a leader.”

Julie said here favorite horse is the one that give the best effort. She doesn’t have a preference for trotters or pacers.

“They just have to have the will to win.”

Undoubtedly, a horse named LUCKY JIM would definitely fit the bill for he was Millers’ top trainee, winning 17 of 18 races, earning \$1 million and being named 2009 Older Trotting Horse of the Year. LUCKY JIM trotted a world record

of 1:50.1 in the Nat Ray at the Meadowlands and went on to win the Breeders Crown.

The Millers have had remarkable and successful careers, and it’s just beginning. This year on Nov. 20 Julie received one of the best gifts for her 48th birthday when she was at Freehold Raceway and her horse won her 2,000th race as a trainer.

The icing on the cake was that her son Tyler drove their horse KEYSTONE ORION as he crossed the finish line first.

Does having her son in the sulky worry her – especially after Andy was involved in a serious racing accident in 2014 that required eight hours of surgery and months of recovery time?

“Any sporting event has risks, but I try to focus on the horse in the race and have him prepared for the best performance at the event,” Julie said. “As far as our son, Tyler, I asked him to graduate from college and then we would support him in his goals. He has chosen to follow our footsteps and make a career in racing horses, so we are behind him 1000 per cent.”

"Neigh, neigh, my good man. These tales all had a timestamp. I never, ever, wager on harness racing from November through April fool's day. Every year I go on a harness racing hiatus during the winter months. As much as I enjoy the sport, for me, winter racing has always felt like a boring slog."

"Ah, now I see where you're heading. In these difficult sporting times, winter racing looked much better."

"After Frisbee golf and poker reruns, gambling on winter harness racing looked like a Las Vegas floor show. My afternoon turned into a festival of handicapping and races."

He asked, "How did you make out on the wagering front?"

"Well, let me put it this way, my FUNDS AVAILABLE is currently showing 60 cents, so, in my mind, I finished ahead."

"Interesting math. Interesting mind."

"Interesting afternoon, where I accidentally proved a point."

"Which is?"

"If EVER harness racing should be sending out a good product, the next several months should be pedal to the medal. No holds barred, no stones unturned, no experiment off the table, no..."

"Okay, I get it."

"Compared to the sporting dreck available, harness racing can rise. If we stay open and pep things up, there are possibilities. I'm a perfect example. The void of sports found me breaking one of my golden rules of sports gambling."

He sighed, "Good in theory, but what does pep things up mean?"

"Two ideas come to mind, one concrete, the other squishy."

"Pour the concrete first," he said.

"I know. But what's the downside? Who gets hurt? You log in to see the races and get a little entertainment. Or you log in to watch your friend sing a song or perform a scene and stay for the horse races."

He scratched his head while digesting my madness. When he finally spoke, I heard a little excitement in his voice, "Sort of a random variety show. Hardcore handicappers have a mute button. They could skip the show. Real-time viewing would be more dynamic, but during COVID, segments on Jpeg files would work. Traffic monitored, data analyzed, revolutionary, and it asks nothing of the sport except a platform."

He came back down to earth and mused, "The big question for racing is who will try to put on a show, who would fill the roles, and what's their motivation."

Bill Robinson dead at 74

Standardbred Canada reported Friday (Dec. 11) ([full story here](#)) that well-known trainer William 'Bill' Robinson of Caledonia, Ont. died Friday at the age of 74.

Robinson's start in the business came when he and some friends claimed a horse for \$1,500.

As a trainer, Bill Robinson's horses earned more than \$54.8 million, captured 2,738 races in 8,998 starts. Fifteen horses he trained won over \$1 million dollars each, with three colts winning more than \$2 million in a single year.

His most notable early success stories were Dream Maker and Lime Time in the late 1970s. He went on to condition Canadian Hall of Fame inductees Mach Three (\$2,376,700) and Precious Bunny (\$2,281,142) along with O'Brien Award winners Riyadh (\$2,763,527), Presidential Ball (\$3,021,363), Art Major (\$2,723,217), Cams Card Shark (\$2,498,204), Dragon Again (\$2,343,428) and 1997 Triple Crown winner Western Dreamer (\$1,812,176). More recently, he campaigned millionaire Nickle Bag (\$1,240,110).

Robinson-trained horses have won numerous divisional honours in Canada, with O'Brien Award winners the likes of Pacific Rocket, Ellamony, Stout, Paling Avenue and Armbrø Keepsake.

He was a four-time winner of the O'Brien Award for Trainer of the Year (1993, 1994, 2002, 2003), and two of his horses won the O'Brien Award for Horse of the Year: Precious Bunny in 1991 and Cams Card Shark in 1994. He was also the winner of the USHWA Award for Trainer of the Year in 1993.

Horses trained by Robinson captured the majority of harness racing's major stakes events, and on multiple occasions. Robinson-trained horses have won the North America Cup (4 times), Meadowlands Pace (3), Little Brown Jug (3), Jugette (1), Breeders Crown (3), Confederation Cup (3), Canadian Pacing Derby (4), US Pacing Championship (3), Adios (2), Art Rooney (3), Provincial Cup (3) Messenger (3), Windy City Pace (3), Nassagaweya (5) and Maple Leaf Trotting Classic (1).

An obituary posted Saturday (Dec. 12) on the Miller Funeral Chapel website ([full story here](#)) said: Bill will be greatly

missed by his partner of 29 years, Katrina, and their daughter, Jennifer, sons, Brett and Shawn and their mother, Caroline, grandchildren, Taylor, Blake and Jake, sister, Mary (the late Chuck Martin) and his nephew and nieces: Mark Martin (Maxine), Kim Kichinko (John) and Tracy Kichinko (Michael). Bill was pre-deceased by his sister, Margie (the late Ray Norton).

The family would like to thank Dr. Alan Gunning for his exceptional care and support of Bill, Dr. Katherine Phillips and the third-floor staff of West Haldimand General Hospital, and the many wonderful PSWs and nurses who helped care for him at home. Your attention to his care, and kindness to the family – during an exceptionally challenging year – was very much appreciated.

Cremation has taken place. Given the current pandemic, no visitation or service is planned at this time. A celebration of Bill's life will take place next year. Whataworkout displayed talent during his limited racing career which saw him notch victories in the Valley Victory elimination and the Kindergarten Stake as a 2-year-old. He only made two starts at 3, which included a 1:54.3 victory at the Meadowlands.

At 4, he earned his life mark of 1:52.4 winning at the Meadowlands after finishing second, by a neck, in a leg of the Graduate series at Tioga. His career was brought to a premature end due to a racing injury.

A beautiful horse, Whataworkout's sire is Muscle Hill who continues to be the leading trotting sire in North America.

Whataworkout's fee will be \$2,000.

His oldest foals were 2-year-olds in 2020.

JL Cruze wins Big M feature

It's been five years since JL Cruze became the first trotter to break the 1:50 barrier at The Meadowlands, and while the 9-year-old Eric Ell trainee may have lost a step or two over the years, he once again found his way to the mile-oval's winner's circle Friday night (Dec. 11) in the featured \$20,000 high-end conditioned trot.

After getting gunned down a week ago when encountering bitter pressure while on the lead, driver Dexter Dunn opted to race in the pocket behind confirmed speedball Warrior One, who four starts ago was positively electric in a wire-to-wire 1:51.4 lifetime score.

Sent to the gate as the 3-1 second choice, Warrior One put JL Cruze in the pocket out of the first turn and cut out fractions of :27, :55.4 and 1:24.4 on the point. JL Cruze gradually made his way off the rail on the far turn and steadily wore down Warrior One through the lane on the way to a 1¾-length score in 1:51.4. The consistent gelded son of Crazy—Topcat Hall won for the fifth time in 2020 from 21 starts while hitting the board 17 times.

"He's unbelievable," said Ell. "He still loves what he's doing. I didn't think he left as well last week, so we injected his hocks, which is like putting some grease in his joints. It allows him to move a bit better."

Owned by William Kenneth Wood, William J. Dittmar Jr. and Stephen J. Iaquina, JL Cruze paid \$4.20 as the even-money

favorite in recording his 40th win from 122 lifetime starts to up his bulging bank account to \$1,534,267.

"Honestly, I think he's a better horse from behind but he's got great gate speed and it seems he ends up on the point a lot," said Ell. "Tonight, out of the two-hole he was raging, but can do it either way. I'd like to keep racing him at The Meadowlands if there's a race for him. We're going to keep trying."

UNY-USHWA names best of Batavia Downs meet

As the 2020 Batavia Downs meet closed on Saturday (Dec. 12), the Upstate New York Chapter of the United States Harness Writers Association announced the top human and equine performers for this past season.

These awards would normally be presented in the winner's circle on the final night of racing during the annual UNY-USHWA Night of Distinction. However due to state restrictions with regard to the ongoing global pandemic, that was not the case this year. The award winners were given gift certificates in the paddock in lieu of the usual trackside ceremony because no one is allowed on the apron.

This will be the first time the Night of Distinction has not been held since its inception in 2008.

The following were the best on the track from the 2020 Batavia Downs season.

Driver of the Meet —Jim Morrill Jr.

A two-time dash title winner at Batavia Downs already, Jim Morrill Jr. notched his third after winning 101 races, finishing 11 wins ahead of the second place Billy Davis Jr. who won this award last year. In 401 starts at Batavia Morrill also had 70 seconds and 51 thirds for a .391 UDR and winnings of \$500,000 for the meet. Morrill, who scored his 7,500th career victory at the Downs this past November, currently sits 13th in North America for UDR among all drivers with 500 or more starts and his overall mark of .383 for the year is the highest he's had since the 2016 season.

For all of 2020 Morrill has 742 starts, 180 wins, 133 seconds and 92 thirds and \$1,267,773 in earnings.

Trainer of the Meet— Gerry Sarama

Not only did Gerry Sarama register career training win 1,000 at Batavia this year, he also won 62 races, finishing 31 ahead of his nearest competitor to claim his first training title at the Downs. Sarama also had 34 seconds and 26 thirds during the meet with total earnings of \$275,112.

Sarama has had one of his best overall years training in 2020 with 87 wins, 60 seconds and 55 thirds out of 426 starts while posting a UTR of .326 and earnings of \$475,635.

That UTR is the highest Sarama has had in 22 years as a conditioner. Sarama also trained two of the meet's three equine award winners.

Pacer of the Meet— Black Is Back (Western Terror—Magic Moments) 1:52.1, \$288,875

Black Is Back made 16 starts at the Downs and won six Open I Handicap paces while finishing second and third twice each, banking purses of \$33,645 in the process. He registered his season's best time on August 29 when he toured the facility at Batavia in a sharp 1:53.4.

This is the second consecutive year Black Is Back has been named Horse of the Meet at Batavia Downs.

Black Is Back is owned by Curtis Edholm and Mihajlo Zdjelar Sr. and is trained by Mihajlo Zdjelar Jr.

Trotter of the Meet— Il Mago (Kadabra—Northern Style) 1:52.3, \$899,763

Il Mago came to western New York through a private purchase back in July and won his first two races upon arrival. Since the Batavia meet began, he has been in the Open I Handicap trot every week and has dominated that class all meet. In 14 starts Il Mago has won seven, was second twice and third once more and earned \$35,390 during that time. His best win time at the Downs was 1:56.4, a mark he hit twice during the meet.

The classy 11-year-old has 55 lifetime wins and is currently just \$237 short of \$900,000 lifetime and has a legitimate chance to cross the \$1 million dollar threshold before he retires.

Il Mago is owned by Mike Torcello and trained by Gerry Sarama.

Claimer of the Meet— Sir Richie N

Sir Richie N started the year racing at the Meadowlands and found his way to western New York through a private sale in January. Although he had moderate success earlier in the year, it was nothing like he would see when he got to Batavia. Sir Richie N raced in claimers ranging from \$4,000 to \$10,000 during his 18 starts and he won 10 of those along with three seconds.

His fastest win came on Oct. 3 when he paced the Genesee County oval in 1:55. His efforts earned him \$30,630 in purses and a very strong following at the windows.

Sir Richie N is owned by Mike Torcello and is trained by Gerry Sarama.
